World Baptists Meet In Canada

HAMILTON (CP) — Baptists from every continent in the world gathered at McMaster University Monday night for a five-day meeting of the executive committee of the Baptist World Alliance.

Dr. Theodore F. Adams of Richmond, Va., presided over 120 delegates representing 100 different Baptist conventions and denominations with a total membership of 21,000,000. They are to discuss matters such as evangelism, religious liberty, church doctrine, and Sunday schools. A scheduled resolution proposes an organization of Baptist laymen similar to those which now regulate the activities of lay women and young people.

Rev. Yakov I. Shidkov, minister of Moscow's only Baptist church from Iron Curtain countries, told a press conference preceding the church and one of four delegates Alliance's first meeting that religion is not only holding its own in Russia but is steadily gaining new members.

He said the Baptist Church in Russia, with 4,000 congregations,

was gaining from 10,000 to 15,000 new members a year. By the Russian constitution all religions had equal freedom of worship—though not freedom of propaganda.

Dr. Arnold Ohn of Washington, general secretary of the alliance, said commissions have been named to make a thorough study of problems and opportunities facing Baptists throughout the world.

On church doctrine, he said: "We have not really studied in recent generations. We have accepted the work of our forefathers. We have sometimes been repeating slogans without giving serious study to questions facing our generation."

Major programme emphases will include Promotion, Leadership, and Relationships with the city, in Christian education of Junior and Teen-age boys, and Older Boys' Parliaments.

Plans will also be laid for the launching of the revised inter-denominational Tuxis programme for church boys between the ages of 15 and 17. This new programme, revised in the last five years, is to be unveiled at the meeting.

The Conference has been called under the sponsorship of the National Boys' Work Committee, the Board of Christian Education, The United Church of Canada.

Eyewitnesses Tell Of Horror In Murder-Suicide Case

QUEBEC (CP) — A detective captain described by his chief as a jovial man plunged Tuesday night into the St. Lawrence River with his daughter, 12, in his arms after apparently drowning his two younger children.

Three eyewitnesses told Wednesday how curiosity turned to horror as the hefty man grabbed the shrieking girl by the legs and jumped into 60 feet of water off a harbor pier.

Dead are Capt. Roland Masse, 42, crack member of the city detective force, his children Lisette, 12, Michelle, 10, and Richard, 4. The captain's body was found Wednesday. The bodies of his children, possibly swept downstream by the swift current, have not been recovered.

Seaman Jan Stolk of Gouda, Holland, aboard the freighter Prince Wilhelm III, described

how he watched a man struggling with a little girl.

SAT AND LOOKED

"At first I thought there was a daddy going to spank his naughty little girl on the pier. So I sat and looked."

Closer to the detective and suddenly aware of impending tragedy was harbor watchman Roland Deschenes who shouted: "Roland, don't do that!" He personally knew the detective.

The girl cried: "Don't do it papa."

Deschenes said Capt. Masse's only reply before leaping was "It's too late, it's too late."

Chief of detectives Alme Gull-jemette, long-time friend of the dead police captain, said the drownings were the result of a "voluntary act attributable to a nervous depression Masse had been suffering from some time."

National Boys Work Meeting Is Planned

A National Conference aimed at revitalizing the youth programme in Canada's Protestant Churches has been called for August 27-30, 1957, at Geneva Park, Ontario. From coast to coast, 50 key area Boys' Work leaders in Church boys' programmes of Tyro, Sigma-C, and Tuxis, for boys 9-17 years of age, will gather at the National Leader Training Centre of the Y.M.C.A.

Delegates will include representatives of the United Church of Canada, The Maritime Council of Christian Education, The Ontario Council of Christian Education, The Board of Religious Education of the Baptist Convention, each of the seven Older Boys' Parliaments from across Canada, the National United Church Committee on Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Boys' Work.

FEELING DEPRESSED

His wife, recuperating from nervous shock, said her husband had been feeling depressed for three months.

Quebec's police personalities were astonished at the news of the captain's death. All had high praise for the officer.

Charles -Edouard Cantin, deputy attorney-general of Quebec, described Capt. Masse's death as tragic. He said he was one of the most devoted members of the municipal force.

Mayor Wilfrid Hamel said he felt "crushed" by the death of one of the pillars of the force.

Mrs. Masse said her husband arrived home shortly after 6 p.m. Tuesday. He asked the children to come with him for a brief ride to Quebec harbor to watch the arrival of a big ship.

No date has been set for a coroner's inquest.

Cases Heard By Magistrate

Three business operators of Charlottetown each charged with failing to return their Unemployment Insurance records to the local Unemployment Insurance Commission Office, were each fined fifteen dollars and costs or ten days by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court this morning.

Under the Highway Traffic Act residents of Freetown, P.E.I., Lower Sackville, N.B., Cambridge, Newville, Mass., Listowel, Ont., McAdam, N.B., Central Railway and Savage Harbour were each fined ten dollars and costs or ten days. The charge of driving a motor vehicle whilst his operators permit was suspended was dismissed against a resident of Crapaud.

Facing three charges, two of causing a disturbance in a public place and one of damage to property, a North Rustico youth was fined twenty-five dollars and costs or twenty days on each count.

Under the Temperance Act, a North Rustico man was fined twenty dollars and costs or thirty days for the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. A similar fine was imposed upon a Charlottetown resident for the possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased on his own individual permit.
