

City Boxer Returns From Dominion Boxing Trials

Stevie MacDonald, the talented young City boxer who took part in the Canadian Amateur Boxing Trials in Toronto last week, returned home yesterday evening.

MacDonald was eliminated from the Dominion competitions when he lost on a decision to Norman Hickey of Toronto, the amateur flyweight champion of Ontario.

The City boxer attributed his defeat to loss of weight the day before the fight and a late fight at the boxing trials.

MacDonald lost seven pounds from the time he left here on Wednesday evening until he weighed in at Toronto the following day. He weighed 116 pounds when he left Charlottetown and had planned to fight in the bantamweight division.

He spent Wednesday night flying and arrived in Toronto at 6:30 Thursday morning. When he weighed in around noon he tipped the scales at 109 pounds and was forced to fight in the flyweight division.

Stevie had planned to fly to Toronto on a day flight but was unable to get plane accommodations.

There were 20 bouts the opening night with Stevie's first being Number 18. When he climbed into the ring it was about 12:30 a.m. Toronto time or 1:30 a.m. Island time.

"I figure I won the first round but after that I was dead," said

MacDonald in an interview last night. Stevie, who had trained for six weeks, had counted on conditioning to carry him through.

One of the things that impressed MacDonald was the superior condition of the boxers. He said that many of them had the use of gyms and boxed as many as 12 or 13 rounds a day in training.

Jim Hurley, whom Stevie defeated for the Maritime bantamweight championship in 1952, will represent Canada at the British Empire Games in Vancouver this summer. Hurley reached the bantamweight finals in Toronto before being defeated by a former Italian boxer. The Italian boy has not been in Canada long enough to become a naturalized citizen, so Hurley will go to Vancouver in his place.

Stevie claims that he has written his mind to his ring career. Before leaving here he stated he was quitting after the fights regardless of the outcome.

Queried about the matter last night he said he had not changed his mind. "I'm hanging them up," he stated. "I don't get amateur fights on the Island and probably only once a year in the Maritimes."

However, Stevie's father, Kane MacDonald, thinks the love of the ring runs too deep in his son's blood for him to retire. "You'll be back next year," predicted the father as Stevie declared he had thrown his last right.

St. Catharines Teepees Wins Junior Hockey Title

TORONTO (CP)—St. Catharines Teepees won the Memorial Cup Sunday, walloping Edmonton Oil Kings 6-2 before a meagre 2,848 fans at Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens. The victory gave Teepees their first Canadian junior hockey title four games to none with one game tied.

The opportunist Teepees, who took advantage of a weak Edmonton defence throughout the series, were presented with the Memorial Cup on the ice right after the game.

Team captain Brian Cullen, a two-goal scorer in Sunday's contest, accepted the big silver mug from Jack Roxborough, past president of the Ontario Hockey Association and Canadian Amateur Hockey Association representative.

ENDS WITH FLOURISH

Brian Cullen, a 20-year-old player in his last junior hockey game Sunday made his exit in style, scoring twice and assisting twice in Teepees' victory.

Other St. Catharines scorers Sunday were Hugh Barlow, Hank Ciepla, Barry Cullen and Wimpy Roberts.

The Edmonton workmen were Norm Ullman and John Bucyk. Teepees went through the shirt-sleeve series undefeated, being stopped in their chase to take the best-of-seven series four straight only by a 3-3 tie in the fourth Saturday night. Teepees won 6-2, 5-3 and 4-1 in the first three games.

Sunday's game was in marked contrast to Saturday night when 4,100 were kept roaring throughout as Kings carried Teepees to a 3-3 tie after 10 minutes of overtime.

Play was ragged and rough, with 24 penalties—including two majors and a 10-minute misconduct—being called in each club.

Brian Cullen sent Teepees winging within 28 seconds of the first period. The Edmonton defence lapsed from the opening face-off and it took Cullen only nine seconds to find the mark for a 1-0 lead. At :28, Cullen did it again, putting the game practically out of the reach of the tired-looking Oil Kings.

Ciepla scored again before the half-way mark of the first period and despite a man advantage for nearly four minutes in the late stages, the Kings could count only once. Ullman and Bucyk teamed on a goal-mouth passing play with Bucyk scoring from close-in.

Roberts scored on a play with Ciepla in the second to send Teepees ahead 4-1 and Barry Cullen made it 5-1 early in the third while Kings were one man short and Teepees two short. Ullman scored on a breakaway with Bucyk mid-way in the last period, but his goal was wiped out nine seconds later when Barlow ended the scoring on a play with Brian Cullen.

The victory marked St. Catharines' first memorial cup in 12 years in junior competition and kept the cup in the East for a sixth straight time. Barrie Flyers won it last year. The last time it went West was in 1948 when Port Arthur won the title.

Oil Kings gave their supporters a little hope Saturday night with a brilliant performance that had

MacDonald worrying a bit. In a 60-minute effort that saw fast, end-to-end play for 70 minutes, Kings came up with their best performance of the series.

Chuck Holmes blazed a knee-high shot from a St. Catharines one face-off mid-way in the third period to tie the count, and neither goal gave an inch thereafter.

Ray Kinasevich and John Bucyk led given Kings 1-0 and 2-1 leads in the game after a scoreless first session, but Hughie Barlow, with two, and Cec Hoekstra put Teepees ahead 3-2 early in the third.

Saturday night's game was rough and rugged, but never ragged. Brilliant goal tending by A. Jacobson of Kings and Marv Edwards kept the fans on their feet.

Ted Williams Brilliant In Return To Starting Lineup

Ted Williams made a triumphant return to the starting lineup Sunday with two home runs and eight hits in nine times at bat for the Boston Red Sox in a doubleheader at Detroit.

Williams, sidelined since he broke his collarbone on the first day of spring training, went hitless in two trips Saturday when he went into the game as a pinch-hitter. But Sunday he really came magnificent. Ted hit three singles and drove in two runs in the first game, with Detroit, 7-6 on Matt Batts' pinch single.

In the 14-inning game, Williams played the first eight and slammed two homers, a double and two singles for a perfect five-for-five, le drive in five more runs, a total six innings when the second game was called. Rookie Paul Penson was the hero, hitting a four-run homer in the 14th, 9-8.

As a result of the day's work Williams now is batting .727 with eight hits in 11 trips.

Cleveland took over first place in the American League by sweeping two from Philadelphia, 12-7 and 6-0, with Mike Garcia pitching a one-hitter in the second game. Joe Demaestri singled to centre in the fourth to spoil Garcia's no-hit chances. Garcia faced only 29, walked two and struck out five. Jim Hegan and Al Rosen hit homers in the 16th first game attack.

Canadian Amateur Boxing Champions Declared Sat.

TORONTO (CP)—Ten new Canadian boxing champions were declared from an entry of 78 fighters Saturday night as the three-day British Empire Games boxing trials wound up in a flurry of ring action.

The winners along with 10 alternates, will represent Canada at the July 30-Aug. 7 B. E. Games in Vancouver.

The heavyweight final climaxed the eliminations that brought together the top amateur boxers from all provinces except Newfoundland and New Brunswick.

Gerry Buchanan of Montreal fought back from near defeat to become the new Canadian amateur heavyweight boxing champion with a split decision over defending champion Jim Saunders of Winnipeg.

The blonde 18-year-old winner weathered a storm of blows in the second round that had him hanging. He bounced back in the third to score repeatedly with jabs and hooks that staggered his heavier opponent. Buchanan weighed 185 and Saunders 215. All bouts were three three-minute rounds.

After the bouts, only the status of bantam champion Benny D'Amico of Toronto was still in doubt. The 20-year-old fighter came from Rome, Italy, 2 1/2 years ago and must prove his eligibility to become a Canadian citizen to compete in the games.

Dennis White of Montreal, national boxing chairman of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, said Jim Hurley of Brantford, Ont. would replace D'Amico on the team if the latter is ineligible. Mickey Bergin of Montreal decided to score a unanimous decision over Hurley for the title.

In other finals, Terry Boucher of Vancouver, defeated a defending champion Pat Supple of Montreal for the flyweight title on a unanimous decision. Bud Palmer of Champion, Alta., scored a technical knockout over Vancouver's Bud Pearson in the second round for the featherweight crown.

Mickey Bergin of Montreal defeated Jack Barclay of Vancouver in the light welterweight division. Sonny Forbes of Toronto won a split decision over Vancouver's Norm Jorgenson. In the light middleweight ranks Will Greaves defeated Vancouver's Steve Phare.
