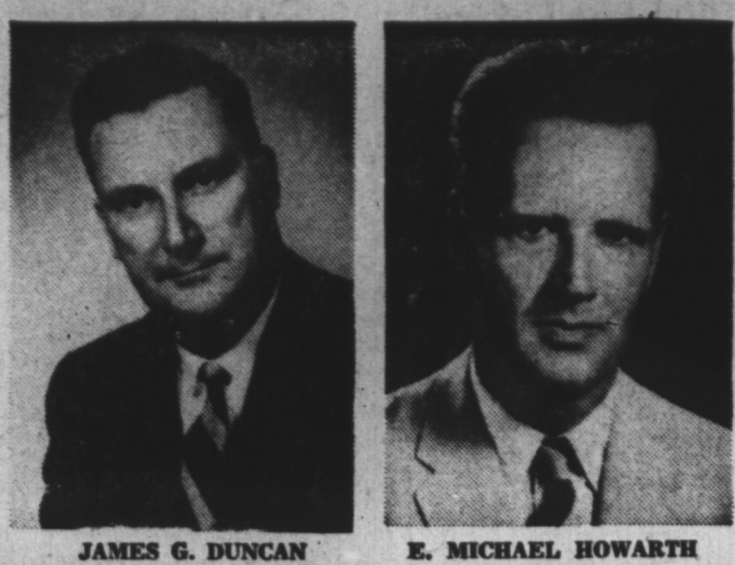


Soldier Flies To Germany

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National Officers To Address Regional Conference Of CA's

H. Gordon Williams accompanied by Randolph W. Manning will represent P.E.I. chartered accountants at the regional conference of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of the four Atlantic provinces on Nov. 9 and 10 at the Brunswick Hotel in Moncton. The host and sponsor of the conference will be the New Brunswick Institute of Chartered Accountants.

One of the features of this meeting will be the attendance of James G. Duncan, F.C.A. of Edmonton, Alta., who was elected president of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants at its 57th annual meeting held in Vancouver in September.

E. Michael Howarth, executive secretary of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants, will also be present and will address one of the business sessions.

The conference will begin today with a buffet luncheon. G. Kenneth McKenzie, president of the New Brunswick Institute of Chartered Accountants will welcome the members at that time. This will be followed by a discussion of the 1959 national conference as seen through the eyes of a representative of each of the Atlantic provinces. A film "The C.A. in Canada" which had its premiere at the national conference will be shown.

This film was primarily produced to interest prospective students in accounts in the opportunities available to a man of C.A. training. The final business of the day will be an address by James Duncan on the annual national conference.

This evening the New Brunswick Institute of Chartered Accountants will be hosts at a dinner. The guest speaker will be Mr. Duncan who will address the conference on "The C.A. of the Future".

Tuesday morning's sessions will consist of discussions on provincial matters relating to the profession with special emphasis on staff recruitment and auditing and accounting practices through

CWL Conference Discusses Improvements To Schools

The Community Centre in Charlottetown was the locale for the third and final Catholic Women's League regional conference for 1959 when some 132 representatives of 16 parish councils met for an afternoon and evening session yesterday.

Mrs. J. F. Steele of Charlottetown, first vice-president of the Provincial CWL Council, was the chairman for this conference which was attended by the following parish councils: Covehead, Corran Bay, St. Dunstan's Basilica, Holy Redeemer, St. Pius X, Hunter River, Kelly's Cross, Kinkora, Fort Augustus, Mt. Ryan, St. Ann's Lot 65, St. Andrew's, North and South Rustico, Tracadie, and Vernon River.

After the opening prayer by the provincial director, a welcome was extended by Rev. F. Cunery, C. S. S. R., director and Mrs. John A. MacDonald, president of Holy Redeemer Parish Council.

A panel discussion on the national convention was then presented by Rev. George MacCormac, Mrs. Fred Macmillan and Miss Iphigene Arseneault, all of whom had attended this Convention in Saint John, N. B.

Rev. J. Edmund Roche of St. Dunstan's University outlined, in a very lucid manner, steps which must be taken to improve the educational system in the province. Afterwards, in discussion groups, the implications of consolidated schools and larger units of administration were given consideration.

A question and answer period was entered into very enthusiastically by a great many of those present, and concluded what was considered to have been one of the most successful regional conferences to date.

At the supper hour a buffet provided by members of the Holy Redeemer, St. Pius X and St. Dunstan's Basilica parish councils, was very much enjoyed. All were privileged to assist at Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament in the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer at 7 o'clock.

Big Market Seen For P.E.I. Spuds

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — South American businessman Diego E. Bordas said here Saturday that he was considering the possibility of importing island potatoes to Venezuela for eventual trans-shipment to Puerto Rico which requires an annual import of 1,000,000 bags to meet its home needs.

Mr. Bordas was in Summerside on behalf of the Bordas Corporation of New York, Puerto Rico and Columbia for which 30,000 crates of island spuds are being loaded at Summerside aboard the freighter "Thomas Schulte" for shipment to Venezuela.

Mr. Bordas said here Friday that Venezuela is looking to this area as a possible supply center for their seed potatoes. He is personally interested in developing business between Prince Edward Island and South America and is exploring the possibilities of buying potatoes for regular shipment to Puerto Rico which now imports most of its potatoes from the United States.

Mr. Bordas believes there is a strong possibility of Prince Edward Island taking a good part of the Puerto Rican market because of the better quality potatoes produced here.

The potatoes now being loaded at Summerside are being supplied by Canada Packers Limited and the stevedoring is under the supervision of MacFarlane Produce Limited.

2 Island Jerseys In R.O.P. Listings

Only two Island Jerseys are listed in the R.O.P. listings for September, 1959, as published in the October issue of the Canadian Jersey Breeder.

In the mature class, five-year-old Hampstead Star's Gloria, owned by J.H. Clark, New Wiltshire, placed 12th in the 64 animals reported. During the 305-day test period this Jersey produced 9,161 pounds of milk containing 567 pounds of butterfat testing 6.19 per cent.

In the three-year-old Junior classification Hedzelee Jester Joyce, owned by Clark Brothers of New Wiltshire was fifth in the 24-member class. Her record was 8,595 pounds of milk containing 458 pounds of butterfat testing 5.33 per cent.

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
