The steamer lay disabled for eight hours. The exact nature of the trouble was not revealed, but sufficient was learned to know that had not the defect been discovered when it was the steamer would have been towed by some passer-by back to Merville or Liverpool.

FORT AUGUSTUS CHURCH.—It is pleasing to learn that Mr. W. C. Harris, jr., architect, and Mr. Payette, superintendent of the construction of the Cathedral in this city, both, after personal inspection, pronounce the walls of the Fort Augustus Church to be uninjured by the recent fire.
