Durelle And Anthony Are Both Ready For Contest

NEW YORK (CP) — Canada's Yvon Durelle will be aiming for a knockout when he tackles Tony Anthony of New York in their light-heavyweight bout at Madison Square Garden tonight.
Durelle, 28, resting Thursday after tough training, said he is determined to let nothing stop his march toward the world crown held by Archie Moore, who is 41 at least.
The fighting French-Canadian fisherman left most of the talking to his manager, Chris Shaban of Moncton, N.B.
"I'm afraid of those decisions," said Shaban.
"I thought Yvon won when he fought Anthony in Detroit nine months ago. So did the crowd and the television viewers. But it was called a draw.
WANTS ANTHONY STOPPED
"When Yvon stops them I'm sure I'd like to see him stop Anthony.
"In a decision, anything can happen. We were robbed in Detroit, and we don't want any mistakes here."
Despite Durelle's performance against Anthony, 23, in their first fight, the New Yorker was a 7-to-5 choice in betting Thursday — which didn't appear to make sense.
But those in the know said the fighters probably will enter the ring at around even money.
Durelle, restless and strong at 175 pounds, jogged around Central Park Thursday but did no boxing or heavy training. The official weigh-in will be at 12 noon EST today.
EXCELLENT TITLE CHANCE
Harry Markson, managing director of the International Boxing Club, said in an interview Thursday that Durelle's chances of a title bout will be "excellent" if he makes an impressive showing against Anthony.

Jacques, leading in the race for the Vezina Trophy as the goalie allowing the fewest opponent scores, was carried off the ice on the shoulders of the teammate after he fell forward heavily on his face leaving patches of blood in the crease.
