FATAL COLLISION

Narrow Escape of a Captain and Seaman.

WOODS HOLE, Mass., Feb. 6. The steamer Savannah and the schooner Lucy Jones collided near the Crossrip lightship last night. The Lucy Jones sank immediately. At the time of the collision one man was asleep in the forecastle; the remainder of the crew were on deck. The man in the forecastle rushed on deck and succeeded in climbing into the rigging. He escaped the captain's life. The remaining men, consisting of the mate and two seamen, were washed overboard and drowned. One of the latter was Cyrus Thompson, a native of Nova Scotia.

REJOICING IN ONTARIO.

The "Globe" on the Tory Victories.

TORONTO, Feb. 6. There is great rejoicing here over the triumph of the Conservatives in Lennox and Prince Edward. The Globe says: "It is useless to deny that these results are exceedingly disappointing to the Liberals. It is true that in the bye-elections in Canada there is an advantage in favor of the Government of the day. But in Lennox and Prince Edward the Liberals had reason to believe that the advantage would not prevail. Both are border counties. The Liberals had better acknowledge the defeat frankly, without excuses for it, and go into the remaining contests with an increased energy and determination."

Get a Verdict For \$10,000.

A CARELESS CONDUCTOR'S ACT MAKES A RAILROAD PAY A BIG SUM.

A recent Washington despatch says: David T. Winter, a resident of Peabody, Mass., purchased a ticket from Boston to Chicago several years ago of the ticket agent of the Fitchburg road at Boston, paying \$3 above the limited rate for a ticket which the agent told him would permit him to stop off at Olean, N. Y., on the Erie road, if he spoke to the conductor who punched his ticket and told him it would be all right. When he boarded the train at Olean to continue his journey to Salamanca and beyond the conductor refused to accept his ticket because it was punched and with considerable violence put Winter off the train for refusing to pay his fare as far as Salamanca. The next day Winter went back to Binghamton and on his old ticket was permitted to ride to Salamanca without question. He sued the company and on the trial the conductor admitted he had mistaken the ticket for a limited one, but said made no difference as the rules of the road required a stop-over check to be obtained. The railroad company asked that a number of instructions be given the jury in its favor, among others that if the rules of the road required a stop-over check the conductor could not recover and also that he could not plead the verbal statement of the Boston ticket agent. The court declined to give the instructions. Winter was given judgment for \$10,000 and the Supreme Court to-day affirmed that judgment in favor of his administrator, Winter having died since.
