

Hall, Trainer Win; Steele Veronis Bout Steals Show

Boson's Dick Hall, 155 pounds of fighting muscle, punched out an unanimous ten round decision over courageous Gary Simon, 154 lbs. of New Glasgow in the main bout at the Sports Arena last night.

Sporting a sharp left that kept Simon off balance, Hall piled up points over his stout hearted opponent whose best punch was a short right hand that had little finishing mark.

There were no knockdowns in the fight and neither fighter was cut.

Judge Earl Smith voted five rounds for Hall, three rounds for Simon and two even. Judge Danny McCormack had Hall ahead six rounds to two with two even and referee Bud Lund scored it 5-3-2 for Hall.

In the semi-final Charlottetown's Don "Duck" Trainer stopped Steve Gonzales of Boston at two minutes and fifty seconds of the first round. Trainer outclassed his shorter opponent and had Gonzales hanging over the ropes when trainer Mickey McGuire

threw in the towel. McGuire himself jumped in the ring and referee Bud Lund disqualified Gonzales.

The feature fight on the card was the six round punching duel between Roy "Tiger" Steele of Charlottetown and Tony Veronis of Boston with the fight ending in a draw.

Steele, in his best form in at least five years, earned the crowd with his brilliant battle against the cover, hard hitting Veronis. Steele piled up an early lead and was ahead on points until the sixth round when Veronis connected with a right hand punch to the jaw that dropped the "Tiger" on his back.

"Tiger" rolled over at the count of three and was on the way up at four. He took the mandatory eight count and battled it out with Veronis for the rest of the way.

It was a savage punching duel throughout. Steele connected frequently with his pile-driving left

hand and often had Veronis in trouble but the well built Boston youngster fought back with plenty of bombs of his own to make it a rousing battle.

Leo "Whipper" Steele, 150 pounds of Charlottetown defense, defeated Dick Reardon of Boston by an unanimous decision in the four round opener. Steele had good first and third rounds and although shorter than Reardon connected with the harder punches.

Dick Hall started slowly but warmed up to his task in defeating Gary Simon. Hall finished with a brilliant flurry in the tenth but even his best punches were unable to stop the German who has never been knocked off his feet.

Simon himself got in some good licks in the fifth round. He scored with two hard rights to the jaw for his best punches of the fight.

Wilf McCluskey handled the first two fights and Bud Lund the two final events.

Yankees Defeat White Sox 2-1

Aa 11th-inning home run by Enos Slaughter and five innings of one-hit relief pitching by so-called "Whitney Ford" brought the New York Yankees a 2-1 victory over second-place Chicago Thursday night at Yankee Stadium.

With it the champs claimed a 6½-game American League lead on a three-game sweep that unfrocked the White Sox as contenders.

Slaughter's shot off 15-game winner Dick Donovan, who went all the way for his fourth defeat after winning seven in a row, broke a seven-inning deadlock. Hank Bauer hammered his 16th homer in the third for the first Yankee hit and the Sox then scored in the same frame on a pair of singles and a fly.

Ford, last year's Yankee ace who has been kept inactive most of the season by a painful shoulder, came on when starter Tom Sturdivant was lifted for a hitter in the sixth. The stubby southpaw struck out four, three in a row, while gaining his eighth victory with the shutout relief.

Ray Robinson Wins Battle For A Money Guarantee

NEW YORK (AP) — Middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson Thursday won a nine-day battle of the conference tables for a money guarantee for the state television and agreed once more to defend his crown against Carmen Basilio at Yankee Stadium Sept. 23.

It was a victory all around for the crafty veteran who had called off the battle of champions Aug. 20 because of a dispute with the International Boxing Club. Sugar Ray now will receive a minimum guarantee of \$255,000 from the theater-TV receipts alone. He also scored when he had Teleprompter Corp. included in the closed circuit deal with Theater Network Television, Inc.

Basilio also shared in Robinson's holdout win. The welterweight ruler will receive a minimum guarantee of \$110,000 from the theater-TV against his 20 per cent. Robinson collects 45 per cent. If the theater-TV receipts, in which they share, go over the mark, they could receive more money.

Under the terms spelled out at a five-hour conference at the state athletic commission offices, Robinson and Basilio also will get the same percentages of the \$300,000 for radio and of the movie deal with United Artists.

UNDERWRITE GUARANTEES

Nat Halpern, president of TNT, made the offer of guarantees. The promoting IBC then announced it will underwrite the guarantees since the main contract is between the fighters and the IBC. Halpern said his outfit already has lined up a record number of 165 theaters in 122 cities in the U.S. and Canada for the fight. Halpern said about 500,000 seats are available. The fighters and the IBC get approximately \$1 a seat from the total receipts collected by TNT from the theaters. In the original offer by TNT no money guarantee was given.

Robinson insisted flatly on the financial guarantee.

"I am happy we finally arrived at some decision," said Robinson. "I don't want to disappoint Carmen on Sept. 23. It's been a great strain on me. I've lost weight—I'm down to 159 pounds—and I've had to take sleeping pills."

Sugar Ray said he will head back to his Greenwood Lake, N.Y., training camp Thursday night.

Overwork Sees To Have Slowed Roberts' Pitching

NEW YORK (AP)—Robin Roberts' golden arm seems to have turned to lead.

Mayo Smith, manager of Philadelphia Phillies, has announced he has dropped Roberts from the list of starters, marking the first time in nearly 10 years that the big righthander has been relegated to a secondary role.

If this marks the end of his starring role, it is a rap against clean living and hard work. Robin, 28, is a model man in every respect.

There isn't another pitcher now active who even comes near the erstwhile speedballer when it comes to 10 years of heavy duty. In each of six seasons, he pitched more than 300 innings, with a high of 347 in 1953. In each, he won from 20 to 28 games. And these were consecutive seasons. Only three other pitchers now active have pitched as many as 300 innings during a season.

Bob Friend of the Pirates did it last year with 314; Bob Lemon pitched 310 in 1952, and Warren Spahn did it twice, 302 in 1949 and 311 in 1951.

Roberts began to weaken last year when, for the first time in seven years, he dropped below the 20-victory mark. He won 18, but he lost 18 to lead the league in that department. This year his record is 8-18 bringing his lifetime record to 187 victories and 138 defeats.

We doubt if Roberts ever protested about overwork. He's an eager-beaver, ready to accept any challenge and he probably

would have fretted himself into a breakdown if denied his regular turn on the mound.

His competitive instinct is so great that his managers—he's had five of them—probably left him in when the going was rough much longer than they would an ordinary pitcher. They knew he would pull the game out of the fire, if anybody could.

We saw Roberts during his first year at training camp. We watched him strike out Joe DiMaggio and remarked then he must be a pretty proud kid. We knew nothing about him other than that he was a bonus baby.

We didn't know we were looking at one of the pitching greats of this generation make his debut.

Don MacEachern made a nice grab of Poirier's foul fly back of first base in the first inning, and Allie Campbell made two nice catches, both off the bat of Donnie Schurman in the fourth and sixth frames. Briton Shows Yanks How To Leave Jet 5 Feet Off Ground

PATUXENT, Md. (AP)—A little Englishman blasted himself free of a U.S. jet plane on take-off Wednesday and lived to drink a toast to "the greatest thing in aviation safety since the parachute."

Navy secretary Thomas Gates proposed the toast after watching FO Sidney Hughes of the RAF perform the first live American test of a British invention to cut the heavy loss of life among pilots whose jet craft fall at low altitudes.

The successful demonstration clinched U.S. Navy acceptance of the American-modified version of the British Martin-Baker ejection seat. An American adaptation made by Grumman Aircraft Corporation of Bethpage, N.Y., was ordered installed in 50 jet trainers.

James Martin, inventor of the seat, told reporters that the United States would be the 29th country to use the device. He said Wednesday's was the second ground level test using a live "ejectee," the first being made in England before acceptance by the RAF.

MAJOR ADVANCE

Rear admiral Thurston Clark, commander of the naval test centre, told Hughes and Martin that they had scored a "major breakthrough in flying safety" for "only a miracle has ever before got a man safely out of a jet plane at ground level."

Clark backed up his statement with figures to show that the navy lost 277 pilots in accidents last year, and that 62 per cent of the accidents involved takeoffs and landings. The accident tables showed that only six out of every 100 men who try to get out of a jet plane under 1,000 feet have any chance of living and that practically none of these few ever managed to fly again.

FO Hughes said after the test he felt "a bit winded."

The trial was run off at the Patuxent River air station, Md., some 60 road miles from Washington, to prove the U.S. Navy's theory that a British-developed ejection seat will save airmen who get into trouble at or near ground level.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y. (AP) — Brooklyn's Sal Maglie said Thursday nobody had talked to him directly about a possible sale to New York Yankees or Chicago White Sox.

The Yankees were reported Wednesday trying to get Maglie for the pennant stretch. But the White Sox' president Chuck Comiskey said: "We have made a substantial offer for Maglie and also for Virgil Trucks of Kansas City."

Still Long Way Off, Ottawa View

OTTAWA (CP) — Chairman A. H. Zimmerman of the Defence Research Board said Monday night a fully operational inter-continental ballistic missile is still a long way off.

Commenting on a report by the Soviet news agency Tass that Russia has successfully tested a missile capable of being directed at any part of the world, he said:

"It is one thing to make a first flight, but a different thing to be in a position to attack anybody." A fully operational missile would not be available for some years.

He said DRB and United States scientists are collaborating on development of a defence against the missile but it would also be "a very long time" before the defence would be developed.

He said he was unable to say whether Soviet scientists were ahead of U.S.-Canadian authorities in missile development.
