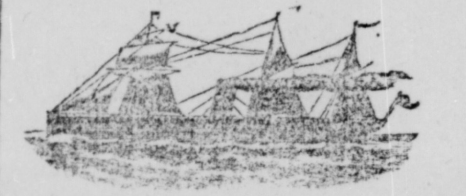

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

amounting to \$174,102. The balance on general account against the Province at the end of December, including Stock Farm deficiency, was \$76,996.62, bringing the total liabilities of the Province to the end of last year and the beginning of this year to \$427,436.18. The cash assets are: Balance debt account at Ottawa amounting to \$775,791.83; balance of and money at credit at Ottawa, \$17,597.67. There is also an amount of land money to the credit of the province at Ottawa on which only \$100,000. This leaves a total of cash assets of \$893,389.50. Besides these there are large and valuable assets in the public buildings and in the Land Office, although the latter is becoming pretty well run down. Deducting the amount of the liabilities from the assets at Ottawa it will be seen that there is a balance of \$465,553.42 to the credit of the province. The revenue is falling away. A few years ago large sums were received from the Land Office the return but last year it dwindled down to \$14,582.99. There is also what may be called an interest account. Last year some \$15,518.28 had to be paid in addition to the \$10,000 a year that had to be given up at the time the 200,000 was withdrawn from capital. The Dominion subsidy has gone down slightly owing to the reduction for the purchase of the Smith estate; and the receipts from ferries were less last year. It is estimated that the land tax will amount to \$32,000, and the income tax to \$6000. The total expenditure this year is estimated at \$279,884, and this is outside of any expenditure that may be made on capital account. He thought that the expenditure for the Administration of Justice would be smaller this year than last, and there were several other savings to be made. But he proposed to make a new expenditure on what might be called a Department of Agriculture, which would be in connection with the Stock Farm. The Stock Farm, he feared, could never be made to pay. If it was to be of any benefit to the farmers money would have to be expended on it. The farm is really an auxiliary to the educational system of the Province. Why should not the farmers receive instruction in their calling as well as those qualifying for the professions. The Prince of Wales College does not pay, but it is doing a good work and no one will object to the money spent therein. But perhaps the college is not doing as good work for the farmers as it is doing for the professions. Brains are as necessary on the farm as elsewhere, therefore there should be special instruction given in this matter that would benefit the people on whom we have to depend. In the matter of education the estimated expenditure is a little over what it was last year. In the last few years teachers' salaries have steadily increased. Last year they struck off a portion for the supplements and he feared that this year they must strike off the balance.
After reading the estimates of expenditure Mr. Warburton said that last year there was a deficit of \$38,000 and the expenditure was not extravagant. He looked forward to a deficit this year. He regretted that it had become necessary to make an appeal to the exhibition grants. But the real object of exhibitions is very often lost sight of and the prizes offered made the chief consideration. Perhaps they have reached their limit as an educator, and this year it is intended to do without them. If the delegation to Ottawa is successful they will not impose taxes. But until the result of that delegation becomes known the burden of the people will not be added to. We fall behind at the rate of \$30,000 or more a year, and all insist that this must be stopped. But how can this be done so that the people will be satisfied? He had great respect for the school system, but it has one defect and that is that it contains no provision for any portion of the cost being borne by the people. If this were done more interest would be taken in the schools and the expenditure would be kept down. He believed a bridge would be built across the Hillsborough and the Government was using its best endeavours to have it made a traffic and railway bridge. Tolls can be collected on this bridge as well as on the ferries. If we are allowed to collect tolls the expenses will be less than they are now on the ferries, and the accommodation will be greatly superior. If the expenditure cannot be reduced, and the arbitration respecting our claims is not obtained the taxes must be increased to meet the expenditure. In the other provinces they pay \$20 or \$30 in tax, where here \$2 or \$3 is paid. Compared with other provinces the taxation here is small. He then took up the matter of revenue, and showed a deficit of \$15,000 which he did not propose to make up this year. Then he reviewed the estimated revenue and compared the various items with the receipts of last year, and in conclusion expressed the hope that at no distant day the revenue would be sufficient to meet the expenditure.

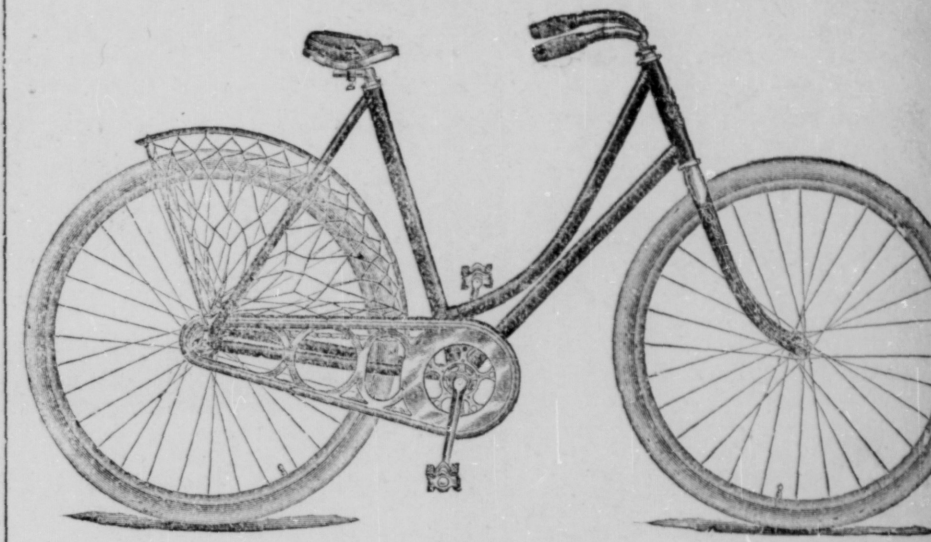

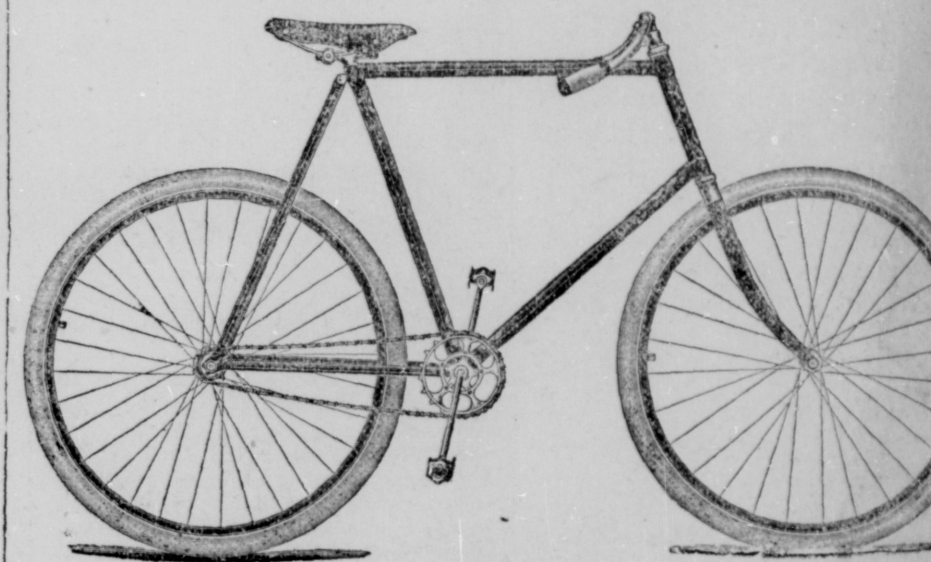
