The many colors and many sides of nature were on view last night

at the 14th annual exhibition of the Prince Edward Island Art Society opened at the Harris Memorial Galleries.

Addressing the members of the Canadian Legion in Summerside this evening at their annual Remembrance Day banquet, Col. J. D. Stewart, Mayor of Charlottetown in speaking of the defence of Canada said that "We Canadians could be the Belgium of the next war. We have a huge country and it is wide open at the top. I think that there are two things that we can do, and should be doing—first, we should have as substantial a warning service as is possible in the north country and at the same time push our efforts in Arctic research to the limits, so that when we do go north, if we have to, we will know what to do and how to live and fight and survive when we get there."

FRIDAY

Ranging from evidence in a specific appeal to constitutional discussions, attorneys yesterday in Supreme Court argued the merits of the appeals from Potato Marketing Board convictions.

The observance of the two minute silence from 11:00 a.m. to 11:02 was followed by the firing of three volleys by a firing party from "C" Squadron, 17th Recce Regt.

In a simple, impressive ceremony held at the King's County Memorial Hospital in Montague, yesterday, the veterans of two World Wars, and the citizens of Montague and surrounding districts in large numbers paid solemn respect and tribute to fallen comrades and loved ones who had paid the supreme sacrifice.

The parade formed at the Legion Hall at 10:30, and pipes by Corrado Rod Martin and Pipers Donald MacLeod and Allan Cameron, it proceeded along Main street to the Hospital. Included in the parade was the color party, members in official scarlet tunics and dress, the veterans of two World Wars, and a detachment of the Light A. A. Regiment.

Uppermost in the minds of all Prince Edward Islanders yesterday was the sacrifice of those who had given their lives in four wars so far from home. Many recalled their personal losses.

In tiny settlements, in villages, in towns and in the city, the people joined with the rest of the world in paying heartfelt tribute to the fallen in the annual Remembrance Day ceremonies.

In many of the rural communities celebrations were held in the afternoon, ending with traditional banquets at night.

Canadian Legion Branches holding services included Borden, Souris, Georgetown, Montague, Eldon, St. Anthony's, Ellerslie, St. Stewart, St. Peter's, Morell, Belle River, Alberton, Wellington, Miscouche, Victoria, O'Leary, Tignish, Wheatley River, Summerside, North Rustico and Kensington.

His Excellency Most Reverend James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown dedicated the altar in the Chapel of St. Dunstan's University at a special Mass sung by Rev. Louis Dougan at five o'clock yesterday afternoon, in the presence of a congregation which filled the chapel to capacity.

As part of its fund-raising scheme for needy students, the St. Dunstan's Committee of the World University Service is holding this week-end in the Charlottetown Hotel a unique sale of handicrafts from India.
