#### HALIFAX GIRL GETS PLACE ON OLYMPIC TEAM

MONTREAL, July 12—A Canadian Olympic track and field team that lines up as impressively as any in the past was announced early today after two days of trials in Molson Stadium. Ten men and six women were selected for the Olympic trip. They will sail next Friday.

Five other men and one girl were told they would be added to the team if they raised all or part of their expenses. The Olympic committee will contribute towards the expenses of five of these.

After tryouts that produced a high standard of performance and brought out 20-year-old Howie McPhee of Vancouver, a native of Sydney, N. S., as a distinct sprinter for the games, chairman P. J. Mulqueen and his committee had only minor difficulties deciding on the lineup.

McPhee, winner of the 100 and 200-metre dashes and holder of a new Canadian record for the metric furlong, headed the sprinters. He and Bruce Humber of Victoria will run in both sprints at Berlin. Johnny Loung of University of Western Ontario and Marshall Limon of Vancouver will run the 400-metre dash and Loaring also will start in the 400-metre hurdles.

Phil Edwards will make his third Olympic bid in the 800 metres. He placed fourth in the event at Amsterdam in 1928 and third at Los Angeles in 1932. Yesterday he won the trial in one minute, 53.6 seconds and seemed a better runner than ever.

Other first-string Olympians are Harold Webster of Hamilton, marathon; Larry O'Connor of Toronto, 110-metre hurdles; Sam Richardson of Toronto, broad jump and hop, step and jump; Joe Haley of Trail, B. C. high jump and Sylvanus Apps of Hamilton, pole vault.

Women athletes selected are Aileen Meagher of Halifax, 100-metre dash; Hilda Cameron and Jeanette Dolson of Toronto, 100-metre dash; Dorothy Brookshaw of Toronto, relay; Betty Taylor of Hamilton, 80-metre hurdles; Margaret Bell, Vancouver, high jump. McPhee, University of British Columbia, who stands as one of the best sprinters ever developed in Canada, broke a 28-year-old record in winning the 200-metre final in 21.5 seconds. Several factors made the achievement the outstanding event of yesterday's program.

It was raining lightly and the track was soft when McPhee streaked away from such fine dashmen as Humber, Orr, Gordon McHenry of Toronto, Earl Deacon of Hamilton and Martin Naylor of Vancouver. Within 50 metres the powerful McPhee had a big lead. With no one to force him he got down in time that was three-tenths of a second better than the 21.8 record established in 1908. Orr was second and Humber third. Earlier, before it started to drizzle rain, McPhee won the 100-metre final in 10.8 with Humber at his shoulder.

Miss Marion Morris won the ladies' crown by defeating Miss Evelyn Sinclair 6-2, 6-3 in two well-played sets.

Irlam's victory in the finals came only after a bitter struggle with Miss Sinclair's reach and came out better than her opponent on long rallies.

The club's mixed, men's and ladies' doubles tournament will be played shortly.

#### Calumet Budlong Is Winner

TRURO, N.E., July 12—The great Toll Gate, big back geoid imported from Ontario by H.M. Sweeney of Bridgewater, N.S., was defeated in the free-for-all race here yesterday by Calumet Budlong, owned by Mrs. Margaret Ballard of Sydney.

In the most exciting race of the meet, Toll Gate lowered his track record by 3-4 second in the first heat, but lost the last two heats to the speedy Calumet. Times were 1:10 1-4, 2:10 1-2, and 2:11 1-2.

Signal Senator, another of H.M. Sweeney's fine, won the 2:17 class taking the first heat of the mile race in 2:11, equalling the old track record. The Senator won all three heats.

The 2:26 class, only other race of the meet, had 12 entries and was run in two elimination heats, the first four in each heat qualifying for a sudden death final. The race was won by Silk Girl, 12 1-2, grey mare owned by F. Murphy of Halifax.

#### Jack Lovelock Beaten By Wooderson In Mile Event

(C. P. Cable by Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, July 12—Britain's Olympic hopes today held several new British records in field events but found adverse weather conditions too much of a handicap to shatter any world marks in the two-day Amateur Athletic Association meet which ended Saturday.

Stanley Wooderson, England's main hope for the 1,500 meter championship at the Olympic Games, once again demonstrated his mastery over New Zealand's Jack Lovelock.

Before a record crowd of 50,000 at White City Stadium, Wooderson beat the New Zealander by a yard in the one mile race. His time, 4:15, was considered good over a track made heavy by intermittent rains.

A feature event was the Marathon, run from Windsor to White City. McNab Robertson, a Scot, finished the long grind just six yards ahead of a Yorkshireman, Ernie Harper. His time was two hours, 35 minutes, 2-5 seconds.

D. O. Finlay of the Royal Air Force established a new British record of 14 3-8 seconds in the 120-yard high hurdles.

An English record was established by J. Pendergast, a medical student from Jamaica, in the discus throw (141 feet, five inches).

The Dutch contingent taking part in the meet scored some notable successes. M. B. Oendard won the final of the 100 yards in 9.8, equalling the English record.

Holland retained his A.A.A. title in the weight putting, while the Desnevetoers relay squad won the 440-yard relay race.

#### Cardinals' Ace Hurler Injured

#### Middle Champ Is Defeated By Steele

SEATTLE, Wash., July 12—Fred Steele of Tacoma, Wash., is the new holder of the world's middleweight boxing championship. He won it Saturday night with a decisive 15-round decision over Eddie "Babe" Risko of Syracuse, N.Y. The Tacoma boy scored the fight's only knockout in the first round when he put Risko on the floor for a six-count. Steele weighed 156 1/2 pounds, Risko 158.

The Tacoma boy scored his knockdown with a vicious right to the champion's jaw just a few seconds before the end of the round. Midway through the fight he opened a cut over one of Risko's eyes, and a couple of rounds later similarly damaged the other eye.

A crowd of 25,000 saw the title change hands.
