UNFORTUNATE JOHNSTOWN

A Stream Overflows WITH DISASTROUS RESULTS.

Several Lives Lost.

Great Damage to Property.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 10.

Fifteen persons were carried down Gay adenite Creek last night. Four bodies were recovered this morning. They were badly bruised. The heavy rain choked the stream and flooded all the district thereabouts. Schribers large mill at this place was carried away. Twenty persons were on Ferry Street bridge when the arch fell into the torrent. The stream was filled with wreckage and humanity. Lanterns were procured and parties went along the side of the stream with ropes to assist in the rescue. Citizens are engaged in removing the wreckage of Schribers mill near the depot, where they think other bodies are lodged. No one knows how many people were drowned, or who are missing. The flood was so great and the current so swift that no help could be rendered with out great danger.

The State Street iron bridge and railroad bridge was swept away. They were large structures.

Yesterday afternoon, during the heaviest part of the storm, Main and Bleeker streets in Gloversville were flooded with water, and a number of residences in the upper part of the town were entirely flooded by water.

Two iron bridges on the Central and Fonda, Johnstown and Gloversville Railway at Fonda are gone.

Four tracks of the New York Central road were washed out at Tribes Hill for 1,000 feet, and the total damage in that vicinity is valued at \$100,000.

UTICA, N. Y., July 10.

The railway situation is summed up this morning as follows: Central tracks washed away at Fonda and Aiken, great damage done not only to Johnstown but down the Mohawk Valley to Amsterdam. There is no definite information as to loss of life.

FIVE GERMAN MEN-OF-WAR

Shell an African Town.

TROUBLE ON MARSHALL ISLANDS.

NEW YORK, July 10.

A special from Zanzibar to the Herald says the German gunboat Piel arrived here this morning from Pangani and reports that that place was shelled yesterday by five German men-of-war. After the bombardment Lieut. Nissman's forces, numbering over a thousand men, landed, supported by 4,000 German sailors. All the Arabs and black men had retired and the Germans declare that they had no losses, which is unprobable. Lieut. Nissman and his forces have occupied Pangani. No German was killed there in the recent outbreak, and this ruthless destruction of the place seems unwarranted. Mombassa is not unlikely to feel the effect of this and the British ship Turquoise is stationed there permanently with her crew under arms day and night.

News from the Marshall Islands, via San Francisco, shows that American traders there are being treated with great injustice by the Germans, and that the recent complaints from Americans and English at Samoa are trifling as compared with what the merchants on the Marshall Islands are compelled to suffer from German greed and intolerance. The German company practically rules the Islands, being backed by the German consul. Foreigners are at the mercy of the Germans, and American firms are gradually being driven out by them. The natives are much dissatisfied but are powerless. They claim that the United States promised them protection, and are surprised that they are not treated with the same consideration as the Samoans.

Hon. Mr. Foster's Marriage.

OTTAWA, July 10.

Interviews with Bishop Lewis, Anglican Bishop of Ontario, and other prominent clergymen are published here this evening in regard to the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Foster, after having had to obtain a divorce from her husband from a Chicago court. Bishop Lewis says no such marriage would be recognized by the Church of England, and he doubts whether such a divorce is valid in Canada.

Rev. Henry Pollard agreed with Bishop Lewis, and added that it was a pity a minister of the crown had contracted a marriage of such a doubtful character.

Rev. F. W. Farries said that according to the laws of this country, a Chicago divorce on grounds upon which Mrs. Chisholm obtained hers is not valid, and therefore her marriage cannot be justified. "It would be a calamity to our country," said Mr. Farries, "to recognize in any way the loose laws of divorce that prevail in the United States, and it is to be regretted that anyone occupying the position of Mr. Foster should, by his action, encourage and endorse the validity of such loose laws of divorce."

The total scores of the Canadian Rifle Team in the match for the Queen's Cup at Wimbledon was 598 points at the 200 yards range, and 557 points at the 500 yards range.

ANOTHER EXCURSION.—We understand that arrangements are being made for an excursion from Causo to Charlottetown on the steamer Princess Beatrice. The date has not yet been fixed, but it will likely not be later than next week or the week following.

MILITARY.—No. 1 and 2 Batteries, Garrison Artillery, met for battalion drill on Victoria Park last evening. Colonel Moore was in command. The parade, although not large was very creditable, and was duly appreciated by both officers and men.

PLEASURE YACHT.—The yacht Winona, belonging to Messrs. Jones and Webb, of Halifax, arrived here from that port yesterday. The Winona is a trim little schooner-rigged craft of some fifteen or twenty tons burthen. She will remain here a few days.

POSTPONED.—St. Paul's Sunday School picnic, which was to have been held at Westville to-day, was postponed on account of the weather until Saturday next, 13th inst. Steamer Southport will leave Ferry Wharf at 10 30 a. m. and 4 30 p. m. Refreshments will be supplied for visitors.

HOW IT IS DONE.—A Washington despatch states that Thomas J. Morgan, commissioner of Indian affairs, has appointed his wife as his private secretary at a salary of \$1,000 per annum, and that Dr. Dorchester, superintendent of Indian schools, has secured the appointment of his wife as special Indian agent, at a compensation of \$6 per day and expenses.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Princess Beatrice, Captain Kelley, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports this morning, bringing a cargo of general merchandise and the following passengers: Hon. Isidore LeBlanc, Mrs. LeBlanc, A. W. Hart, Alex. McKinnon and Captain May. The steamer had heavy winds throughout the passage. She will sail on return this evening.

The Steam Navigation Company have arranged for return tickets from Charlottetown to St. John for \$3.50. 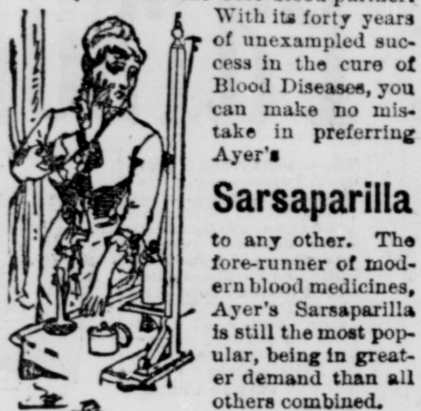
