

# No Changes Contemplated In Pearson's Shadow Cabinet

OTTAWA (CP) — No changes are contemplated by Liberal leader Lester Pearson in the shadow cabinet of the official Opposition in the Commons.

"We have a very good arrangement now," he said in an interview. "I see no need for changing it now."

Mr. Pearson will continue as party spokesman on foreign affairs. Former Opposition leader Louis St. Laurent will head a committee dealing with justice.

## Only In Last Few Years Retarded Child Being Aided

Mrs. A.M. Johnston, secretary of the P.E. Island Association for Retarded Children, was the guest speaker at an open Branch of the association held on January 15 in the Civic Auditorium with Mrs. Amy Leard, Vice-President, in the chair.

Mental retardation, Mrs. Johnston, said, is as old as the history of man but it is only in the last few years that something constructive has been done. The retarded children differ from the average child only in that thought processes are not as quick. He has the same capacity for love and enjoyment and his potentialities should be stressed. The cause of mental retardation are not known and much research must be done. There is an excellent public health center in Charlottetown and Dr. Beck and his associates do all they can to advise and guide parents. Retarded children need help and should have the same as blind children or those affected with polio, heart conditions or cerebral palsy.

There is a class for trainable children now in Charlottetown and much good work is being accomplished. The Association is trying to establish an institution or a training school in Charlottetown for all the non-trainable children on the Island.

Mrs. Johnston brought a film from Charlottetown and Mr. Beck showed it at the meeting. This film, "No Less Precious", was made in the United States for the National Association for Retarded Children and showed some of the work being carried out in schools for the mentally retarded.

This is a tremendous problem and help must come from all levels of society.

Mr. Rice, principal of the Summerside elementary school, reported that a survey is being made in the school and when that is completed they would know how many children there are with an I.Q. of from 50-70.
