Urban Transit Licenses Said 'Excessive, Unfair'

MURRAY BAY, Que. (CP)—The "excessive" licence and fuel taxes for city transit vehicles mean an unfair tax burden for the passenger, the president of the Canadian Transit Association said Sunday.

T. D. Robertson, treasurer of Montreal's Transportation Commission, made the statement in his opening address at the CTA national convention in this resort centre 80 miles east of Quebec City.

He said the situation is "particularly unfair" because most taxes "are imposed for provincial or state purposes while the urban transit services are carried out entirely within the municipalities... and do not use the state or provincial highways."

Text of the president's address was released to the press in advance of delivery. ONLY A DOLLAR Mr. Robertson noted Manitoba and Alberta charge a \$1 licence fee for a diesel bus while in sev-

eral other provinces the fee is more than \$250 and in one is more than \$400. Fuel tax rates also vary across the country.

Now that there has been a rapid increase in use of buses for urban transit, Mr. Robertson said, "repeal of the overall tax structure is required if transit is to receive equitable tax treatment."

Because of rising labor costs the transit industry operators have had to make frequent fare increases, he said.

PASSENGER BEARS BRUNT "Surely the transit passenger, who must pay these rates, should not be singled out to pay for taxes which have no relation to the welfare of the municipality in which he resides."

Mr. Robertson also said big cities are becoming convinced that only by providing transit "private rights-of-way or lanes of their own" can they survive "the tremendous inrush" of motor traffic. He said in the past there has frequently been a lack of co-

ordination in traffic planning in Montreal. "A number of plans for no political action has ever been prepared but no plan has been prepared but suited to implement them."

CTA, representing transit operators in 35 Canadian cities, is to hold its 1960 national convention at Banff, Alta., June 6-8.

Governor Long Wants Release

GALVESON, Tex. (AP)—Louisiana Governor Earl K. Long, "a governor in exile by force and kidnapping" by his own description, filed for a habeas corpus hearing Friday, contending he was flown to a psychiatric clinic here against his will.

District Judge L. D. Godard signed the writ and set the hearing for Monday at 10 a.m., one day before Long was to undergo a sanity hearing.

Court-appointed lawyers for the 63-year-old governor claimed their client had been forcibly removed from his mansion "his feet, ankles and arms tied to a stretcher" under powerful sedation.

Dunlops Consider Offer By CAHA To Tour Europe

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP)—Wren Blair, manager of Whitby Dunlops, said Wednesday the club is considering an offer by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to tour Europe next November.

The CAHA convention in Detroit Tuesday chose the Allan Cup champions to make the tour after President Bob LeBel announced that an invitation was received by the association.

If Whitby decides to make the trip it will have to pay the cost of the tour except \$1,000 voted by the convention to provide the team with new uniforms.

Crowd Stones 3 Policemen

TRIVANDRUM, India (Reuters)—Three policemen were reported injured when stoned by a crowd Sunday as the campaign against Kerala state's communist regime continued.

The incident was reported from the town of Aror. It followed a clash Saturday night at Ankamali where police killed five persons when they opened fire on 3,000 demonstrators. A sixth person was said to have died of wounds later.

Meanwhile, Armed police patrolled main roads in Ankamali as mourners marched in protest against the deaths.

The Communist government, which has been in power 28 months, said Sunday that the situation in Ankamali was "under control." The town is in the north ern part of this southwest India state, about 300 miles north of here.

SILENT SUPPORT IS USELESS

The polls will soon be open. In a short time the free citizens of Ontario will go to the polls to select and elect their rulers.

They invest their office-bearers with authority to enforce the law even over themselves. No tyrant could claim greater authority than a self-governing nation gives freely to its office-bearers.

The most powerful ruler in the world is the President of the United States, elected to his office by fellow-citizens inordinate pride of their freedom. But the authority required for the maintenance of law and order and for the protection of human rights they entrust freely to the man of their choice.

And we in Canada with a still prouder heritage do the same think with the rulers who we choose.

But many of us are not playing the game with our men in authority. The ruler of a free people is entitled to feel behind him all whom he represents. Yet only a relatively small percentage of the voters actually vote.

"Twenty-nine and a half per cent. of the voters voted in a recent election in Ontario" was a statement made a few mornings ago. Those who failed to vote betrayed a sacred trust.

GOOD AND TRUE Another source of our present weakness is that many who do vote jump at the crack of the party whip.

In any case, the only solid ground of the authority at the head of any democracy is the moral sense and political opinions of its citizens. For every citizen to study the issues before the nation and reach his own conclusions is one of the first necessities of the hour.

"Elections are not won by prayers" was a confession made by a Canadian politician of our recent past. He expected it to be taken as a smart statement of an obvious fact.

But I wonder. Has St. Paul's statement gone clean out of date: "Paul may plant and Apollus water but God gives the increase." Can any of us review the policies and politicians of the last 50 years and conclude that the destinies of men are in their own hands?

Instead, men who thought that they were playing with destiny surring it to gratify their whims tried to see ultimate issues decided by forces whose very existence they had ignored.

The character and calibre of the men running in the election must be our first concern. A wise man is a better bet than a wise policy. Not that the policy is unimportant. There are always issues before us that are vital.

But a good man who differs from us about policies is far more desirable than a weak man who agrees with us about policies in the world.

Our representatives should embody the best in the moral ideals of our people, and we thank God that so many do.

A PRAYER Here is a prayer that has just been suggested for a time like the present—"Make those in authority over us to be capable and honest and may we honor them as rulers by Thy ordinance."

We owe these men full support. Silent support is useless. Their critics are open with their criticisms; their supporters should stand up and be counted in the controversies of the hour.

But here we come back to the point from which we started—the nation's most urgent need is of thoughtful and conscientious citizens who will take the time and trouble needed to think through the issues before the nation and reach and act on their own conclusions.

Confusion reigns in many minds. There is nothing plain and simple in the questions which must be answered in Canada. There is no wise man among us who has all the answers at his fingertips... But when all the citizens face together the things our govern-

ment must decide and do, the conclusions they reach will be wise.

We may question the old saying often so lightly repeated—"Vox populi vox Dei." I have heard that used to justify one of the worst decisions a municipality ever made. And yet, in general, we can trust our people. God will guide all who want to be guided in carrying out His commands.

Raped Co-Ed Takes Stand

BY ARTHUR EVERETT TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A slender Negro co-ed testified Thursday that she wept and begged vainly while four white youths raped her repeatedly last May 2. She denied a defence suggestion that she consented to their demands.

In the soft accent of her native south, the 19-year-old Tallahassee girl told an all-white jury and a crowded, segregated courtroom: "There wasn't anything I could do with four men with a knife and a gun but do what they said to do. . . . I was begging them to let me go. I started crying and they said to shut up."

The girl explained that she expected the men to kill her if she didn't submit. But defence objections were sustained by Judge William May Walker and the remarks were stricken from the court record.

ON TRIAL FOR LIVES The four youths are on trial for their lives in the abduction and rape of the girl whom they surprised in a parked car with her Negro date after a dance at the all-Negro Florida A.M. and M. University where she is a freshman.

All the defendants have pleaded not guilty, with Collingsworth in addition pleading insanity. The other defendants are Ollie Stoutamire, 16, Patrick Scarborough, 20, and David E. Beagles, 18.

Florida records list no case of a white man being put to death for raping a Negro. This has led Negro spokesmen to charge a double standard of justice in an area where stringent punishment is given a Negro who rapes a white.

Florida law prohibits the publication of the name of a rape victim.

Coastal Freighter Reaches Halifax

HALIFAX, (CP)—The sturdy coastal freighter Fauvette docked here Friday with the captain and seven seamen who abandoned the motor vessel Claudette V 4 miles south of Newfoundland Thursday.

The Claudette's skipper and crew, all natives of Quebec, were rescued by the Fauvette after their timber-laden vessel foundered Wednesday night.

A spokesman at RCAF Search and Rescue headquarters here said the derelict Claudette was spotted by a plane from the RCAF base at Trophy, Nfld., at 1 p. m. A.D.T. Friday. The hull was about 30 miles south of the French islands of St. Pierre et Miquelon, off the south coast of Newfoundland.

A federal transport department spokesman said a bulletin will be issued warning of the hazard to navigation.

The skipper of the Fauvette said Friday that when he sailed away from the Claudette Thursday she was awash from stem to stern in a heavy sea. He said it appeared the timber cargo was the only thing keeping the vessel afloat.
