Religion and Life

A vigorous campaign is being conducted among us by an organization which claims to be an advocate of peace. This is neither the time nor the place for opinions about the principles and methods of its leaders although there are some men connected with them whose genuineness is above question.

The unfortunate part of the whole affair is that the association of some of its leaders with Moscow, their special pleadings for Russia and denunciation of western nations are arousing antagonisms among our people against the whole movement and causing many minds against the real peril of war.

Many of the most earnest minds among us feel that the sword is hanging over our heads by a hair. The nations are arming against each other. Fears, suspicions and enmities are being stirred up in all directions. The nations seem to be playing around a powder barrel where a spark might set off an explosion that would wreck civilization. If ever the Christian world needed to watch and pray lest another world war be precipitated upon us it is the present hour.

There is no question about the Christian position in such an emergency. The dream of the Old Testament was of a time when men would, "Beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks, when nation would not lift up sword against nation neither would they learn war any more." (Isaiah 2:4). The Messiah was to be the Prince of Peace. The birth of Christ was celebrated by the angels' song, "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace, goodwill toward men." (Luke 2:14).

Peace with God and the peace in the soul which Christ's indwelling brings, and peace between man and man are among the most precious promises of the New Testament. At the close of His last conversation with His disciples, Jesus said: "These things have I spoken unto you that in Me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33).

This covers far more than the inner calm amid surrounding storm which Christ brings to the individual. It extends to our relationships and assures us that the spirit of Jesus governs them.

All who speak in the name of Christ echo His pronouncements in the face of the present critical situation.

To a Canadian who asked the Pope for a message to our people, he said: "Tell them to pray for peace."

The voice of the world-wide

Presbyterianism has had this to say: "With sudden violence the hydrogen bomb has made us realize that humanity is on the brink of destruction. . . . We can no longer be content to be just Church-members; Christ must rule our lives—the whole of our lives—and He must be our Master in every sphere of our activity. Today it is Christ or chaos—there is no other issue."

The Executive Committee of the World Council of Churches issued this statement last February: "The hydrogen bomb is the latest and the most terrible step in the crescendo of warfare which has changed war from a fight between men and nations to mass murder of human life. Man's rebellion against his Creator has reached such a point that, unless stayed, it will bring self-destruction upon him. All this is a perversion; it is against the moral order, by which man is bound; it is sin against God. . . . As representatives of Christian Churches we appeal for a significant new effort for peace. We know how strenuously the government has discussed peace in the past. But sharp political conflicts continue and the atomic danger develops uncontrolled. We urge the governments to enter into negotiations once again, and to do everything in their power to bring the present tragic deadlock to an end. . . . This is the hour to listen afresh to the Word of God who is the Lord of history. And this is the hour for earnest prayer to Him. For the fate of mankind is in His hands."

From every responsible Christian leader there comes this call to prayer. Christ is still in command. He makes even the wrath of man praise Him—still more man's failures and mistakes. In our private devotions, in family worship, in the services of the sanctuary let all pray for peace.

Follow prayer with action. Man must co-operate with God. If we would have peace all our movements must be toward peace. Every pulpit in the land, every newspaper and magazine, every action of government should be an advocate of peace. If any government in the world imagines that the free nations of the West want war, every organ in those nations should declare goodwill. Each of us personally has a part to play. This is not to criticize preparedness; the record of the past few years shows only too clearly that for peaceful peoples to be unprepared is to invite aggression, but make it so clear that none can misunderstand that our preparations are against aggression and never for aggression. Christ's will is peace; as we pray, "Thy will be done," let us work with Him toward its fulfillment!

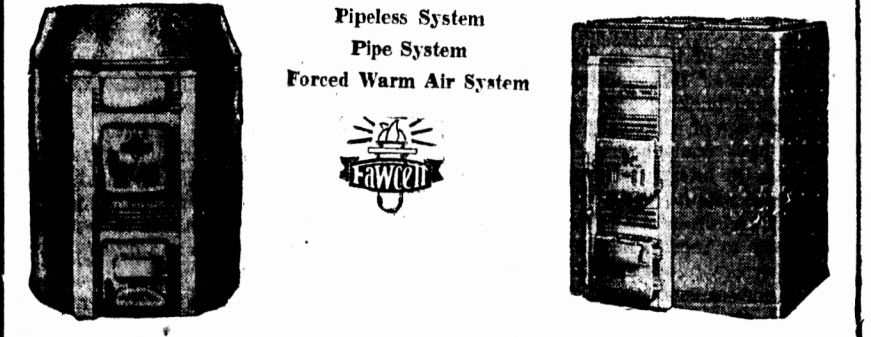
