

# St. Mary's In 2nd Place In Standings After 6-2 Victory Over Islanders

HALIFAX, March 2—(CP)—Halifax St. Mary's moved into undisputed possession of second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League here Saturday, defeating Charlottetown Islanders 6-2 in a wide-open, well-played game.

Halifax held the edge over Charlottetown in the first two periods and, in the third, played a defensive style effectively.

The game was closer than the score indicated. Islanders missed on their good scoring chances and goalie Jimmie Strachan was brilliant.

Halifax scored two in the first period, added three more to Charlottetown's one in the second, and matched a third-period goal.

Billy Warwick shot two goals to lead the Halifax attack and Bob Bowness, Danny Nixon, Joe MacArthur and Hughie Campbell tallied with the others. Larry Travis and Don Bellingher were Charlottetown's marksmen.

Halifax staged a tight defensive style in the finale with two men short but Islanders didn't have the scoring punch.

# Glance Bay Miners Meet Islanders Here Tonight

"Bud" Poile's Glance Bay Miners, fighting to keep ahead of Moncton Hawks in order to gain a play-off berth, are scheduled to meet the Islanders at the Forum tonight in a regular M. M. H. L. game.

For the Miners it will be their second attempt in four days to play a game here. Last Thursday night they were scheduled to play at the local Forum but were snowbound in Halifax.

The Miners intend to come in by plane today. They had planned on taking a train out of Sydney last night but the storm was so severe in Cape Breton that they could not get a car from Glance Bay to Sydney.

The weather is expected to clear today and if it does the Miners will fly in on an M. C. A. chartered flight.

The game is an important one to both the Islanders and Miners. The Islanders need the win in order to better their chances of taking over second place from Halifax while the Miners must win so that they may keep ahead of the Hawks.

The Miners are now three points up on Moncton with the latter playing at Saint John tonight. The Islanders are down two points to the Saints.

In view of the setting and the record of the past performances of these two teams fans are assured of seeing another top-notch performance. All Islanders except Con Bonhomme will be in action.

Coach Lamoureux is confident that the Islanders will nail down second place in the league. Of the 13 games left the Islanders play eight at home and five on the road. On home ice the Islanders meet Glance Bay, Saint John and Sydney twice, Halifax and Moncton once. Away from home they pay a visit to each club before winding up their play on March 18. The Halifax Saints, whom the Islanders trail by two points, have twelve games left.

The weather, however, could be a big factor in changing present plans. A league meeting is to be held next Sunday and should the Maritimes be in for another stormy week with its resulting postponements of hockey games the league officials may be forced to take action. Under the conditions it might not be improbable that the league heads would decide to commence play-offs immediately with all six teams participating.

There has been no indication that this will happen but if it does then the six teams would either play a round-robin series or a series of series between the first and fourth, second and fifth and third and sixth place clubs. In the event of a round-robin series each team would probably play every other squad twice with the top two teams playing off in the end.

Coach Lamoureux and the members of the Islanders team were warm in their praise of Captain Charlie Trainor of Maritime Central Airways yesterday. Charlie piloted the plane which took the boys home from Halifax Saturday night and landed them safely despite the storm. The storm moved in more quickly and in greater force than had been anticipated with the result that it was snowing quite heavily when the plane arrived at Charlottetown. The pilot was forced to circle the airport for nearly a half-hour and made three attempts to land before he brought the plane in on the runway.

A number of residents heard the plane flying overhead and knew that it was the Islanders attempting to land. The boys themselves felt some anxiety but knew they were in capable hands with Captain Trainor, a Second World War ace in the controls. Trainor, it will be remembered, played hockey and football with St. Dunstan's University in the late thirties and, in the opinion of veteran football coach Father Walter MacGuigan, was one of the hardest tacklers ever to wear the garb of the red and white.

It was a tough break for the Saints to lose by so close a margin but they know now that they stand on a par with mainland universities. It was the local College's first year in senior intercollegiate play and they certainly made a showing which is a credit to themselves and a source of admiration to their supporters. We know that next year they will come back and probably win the title.

In the final game here, Jack Reardon scored 29 points. This brought Jack's total for the six intercollegiate games to 138 or an average of 23 points a game. His point total and average are far above that of any other player in Maritime Intercollegiate play. Much of the time he was being guarded by two men but still could not be stopped. His scoring records served as a pretty accurate yardstick for judging his basketball ability.

# French Girl Wins Figure Skating Title

PARIS, March 2—(CP)—France's Jacqueline du Bief won the world's figure-skating championship Saturday night with a spectacular and artistic performance at the Palais du Sports. Toronto's Suzanne Morrow finished fourth.

In the official scoring, Mile du Bief got first-place votes from each of the nine judges and piled up 185.85 judging points. A wildly-cheering crowd of 15,000 acclaimed the girl who had brought France third-place honors in the same event at the Olympics.

Miss Morrow, 21-year-old 1951 Canadian senior women's champion who placed sixth at the Olympics at Oslo, received 43 place points and 185 judging points.
