

# Retired Jersey Club Official, James Bremner Dies At 69

**TORONTO (CP)** — James Bremner, 69, of Toronto, retired secretary of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, died in hospital here Friday.

Born in Chatham, N.B., he was an agricultural representative here and at Moncton before coming to Toronto to be secretary of the Jersey Cattle Club, and shortly afterward secretary-treasurer of the Jersey breeders' association.

Mr. Bremner was a former secretary of the New Brunswick Jersey Cattle Association, secretary of the Maritime Jersey Club and secretary of the New Brunswick Potatoes Growers' Association.

Mr. Bremner was a former executive member of the World Jersey Cattle Bureau.

Mr. Bremner was well known among Jersey farmers having at one time worked for the late Senator Walter James, Jersey breeders particularly well known in his pulpit and well written articles in the Jersey Breeder, and a other widely known farm papers.

He was a familiar figure around the showing during Old Home Week, having only last year covered the events of show days for the Jersey Breeder.

Survivors include a brother, J. C. Bremner of Fredericton, N.B., and a sister, Mrs. Helen Home in Toronto.

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# Fishermen At Tignish Favor Ass'n, Trap Limit

**TIGNISH** — A large turnout of fishermen in the Tignish area on Wednesday afternoon, at the Prince Edward Island Fishermen's Association and voted in favor of supporting a lobster trap and license limit at a special meeting held in the Tignish Regional High School Thursday.

Present were Eugene Grant, deputy minister of fisheries, and Urban LeBlanc from the extension department of St. Dunstan's University. Hector Richard, president and Roy MacLeod, secretary.

Mr. LeBlanc outlined the purpose of re-organizing the association to the fishermen. He said if this association was set up province-wide and well supported by the fishermen, it could act as the voice of the lobster fishermen. So far throughout the province he said there were held the fishermen have voted in favor of having the association re-organized and in favor of a lobster trap and license limit.

Mr. Gorman spoke on some reasons why the first association did not succeed. He also spoke of the interest in the federal provincial and federal civil servants who are concerned with the betterment of the fishermen.

A great many questions were asked on setting up the association and a trap and license limit. Mr. LeBlanc said trap limits were expected to be successfully in some parts of Quebec and Nova Scotia.

He said it is something that fishermen themselves wanted and entered and they are making a good living at it.

Norman MacLeod, supervisor for Prince County with the federal department of fisheries, answered questions pertaining to the department.

Other fisheries officers present were Chevle Calbeck, Alberton; H. Reiche, and Reg. Eldershaw, Tignish.
