The Northern Light arrived at Georgetown from Picton yesterday with a full cargo and thirty passengers.

The Duchess of Marlborough Relief Fund amounts to £107,871, of which £86,662 has been expended.

No crossing at the Capes to-day. The mails which crossed yesterday arrived in the city at 11 o'clock this forenoon.

A WASHINGTON despatch of April 7th says a comet was discovered at Ann Arbor at midnight. It had a tail three minutes long.

It is rumored that Messrs Rathbun & Son, of Bothwell, Ont., will shortly ship 10,000 doors, which have been manufactured at their extensive sash, blind and door factory in Millpoint, for Sydney, N. S. Wales.

DROWNED AT SEA.—The brig "Servian," McDonald, at Vineyard Haven, 5th inst., from Sagua for Boston, reports March 29th, Thomas McGrath, seaman, of St. John's, N. E., fell from aloft and was drowned.

REMEMBER the Methodist Sabbath School Missionary Anniversary, this evening at 7 1/2 o'clock, in Brick Church, Prince Street. The meeting has gained a reputation for interest second to none of its kind in this community, which will doubtless be sustained this evening.

FIVE thoroughbred Clydesdale stallions from the celebrated farm of Mr. Simon Beattie, of Annan, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, were received at Toronto, on the 9th inst., for sale. They are said to be magnificent animals.

THE BIDDULPH TRAGEDY.—The Grand Jury at the Middlesex assizes found a true bill, on the 5th, against James Carroll, John Kennedy, Martin McLaughlin, Thomas Ryder, John Partell and James Ryder, junr., for the murder of John Donnelly.

THE DUKE OF NEWCASTLE, the Marquis of Anglesey and the Earl of Fife, who died within a year, were the three most heavily insured men in England, the companies being hit for \$3,250,000, while two other noblemen who have just died had between them \$1,250,000 in the same companies.

FOR the information of the Patriot's correspondent, "Festus," we may state that William Murphy, Esq., Secretary of the Gas Co., is not the author of the letters signed "Felix," which appeared in the EXAMINER last week. Nor has "Felix," to our knowledge or his own, any interest in the Gas Co., of this city.

THE barque "Josephine," of Summerside, P. E. I., Evans, Tralee, in ballast, 33 days, bound to Baltimore, arrived at Halifax on the 9th. The Captain reports: Experienced fine weather until March 14, lat. 53, long. 32, encountered a severe hurricane, was hove on her beam ends, and remained in that position for upwards of five hours, and was forced to cut away spars to right vessel; lost three topmasts, topgallant masts, topgallant yards and main yard; also all sails, rigging and gear attached. The "J." will make immediate repairs there, and proceed to her destination.

SCUTTLE A SHIP. The trial of Captain William Tower, formerly master of the barque "Brother's Pride," on the charge of scuttling that vessel, was commenced before Chief Justice Allen, in the Circuit Court, St. John, N. B., recently, and is still in progress. It is the first case of the kind ever tried in that city, and necessarily excites great interest. The counsel for the prosecution, in opening the case, said the total insurance on the vessel and cargo amounted to \$71,000, divided as follows: The vessel, \$21,500; on advances, \$3,000; on freight, \$8,500; on cargo, \$38,000. The insurance was effected in English, New York and Toronto companies. The prosecuting attorney pointed out that the hull was valued at \$16,000, while the freight to be earned on the voyage would be only \$4,530. The vessel was scuttled on the voyage from Cienfuegos to New York in May last, while having on board what was alleged to be melado, but what was really a worthless article. The registered owners of the vessel were Judge Palmer, D. J. McLaughlin, and C. A. Palmer. The cargo was consigned to Acosta & Co., New York. Henry Thomas, who was boat-swain of the "Brother's Pride," and who laid the information against Captain Tower, swore that he bored four holes below the water line, and that when the vessel was filling with water she was abandoned off the coast of Florida. Although she was only twenty miles from land no attempt was made to reach the shore. After being abandoned she was set on fire.

A fire at Dixon, Ill., Wednesday night caused a loss of \$200,000. Two persons were killed and six injured by a falling wall.

The ex Empress Eugenie, before starting for Zululand, presented her Imperial Crown to the Church of Notre Dame des Victoires, Paris.

THE British Columbia Legislature was opened at Victoria on the 5th inst. The Lieut. Governor's speech notes the movements toward railway construction on the mainland section, and asks for legislation better calculated to secure the construction and completion of a graving dock, and the restrictions of Chinese immigration.

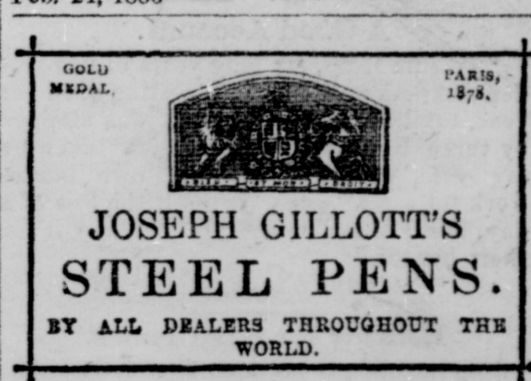
