

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Monday, April 10, (Continued.)

INDEPENDENCE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

A bill for securing the independence of the General Assembly was read the second time and on moving that it be referred to committee.

Hon. Mr. Strong said the bill was designed to remove temptation out of the way, so that members of the Legislature might discharge their duties with independence and impartiality. It had to do with two phases on the subject. Dual representation, which implied that a man should be in two places at one and the same time, would be abolished.

When certain members of the Legislature accepted seats in the Dominion House, there was no law to prevent them, but it was not their intention to offer for seats in the Legislature again.

Hon. Mr. Munn understood his honor to say that a member of the Legislature might compete for any public work which was let by public competition, and it would be considered a contract, but according to the clause he (Mr. Munn) thought it would.

Hon. Mr. Strong said it would certainly be less objectionable for a member of the Legislature to take a Government contract when the work was thrown open to public competition, than if patronage were bestowed directly upon him.

Hon. Mr. Richards wished to know how the bill would effect a shipowner who might contract with the Government either directly or indirectly, to carry any cargo for the Government.

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Hon. Mr. Walker considered that the people were the best judges as to whether a man was worthy to be entrusted with a public office.

Hon. Mr. Strong was aware that there was a difference of opinion as to whether a member of the Legislature should be allowed to do any work for the Government, but the bill did not make any alteration in that respect.

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There is no other man in the Dominion whose financial reputation is as great, and whose opinion on matters of trade and commerce is as highly valued, as Sir Francis Hincks.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment, and it was then read the third time and passed.

A petition of John A. McLeod, of New London, praying for remuneration for the loss of a schooner at New London harbor on account of the buoys not being in position, was presented by Hon. Mr. McEwen, and was read.

Hon. Mr. Munn said that as the petition was praying for a money grant, it should have been sent to the Executive Council.

Hon. Mr. Strong said the petition was one of a peculiar nature, and was desirable that their honors should be acquainted with the circumstances upon which the petitioner grounded his claims.
