Annual Meeting Of P.E.I. Hospital Last Evening

"It is the considered opinion of our medical staff that our medical treatment facilities were not designed to handle our present work load and in order to continue to provide the best in hospital care, these facilities must be improved and enlarged. The increase in the number of people requiring hospitalization, as well as the complexity of modern hospital care and administration, necessitates this expansion," Mr. N. D. MacLean, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the P. E. I. Island Hospital stated in the 72nd annual report of the trustees submitted at a well attended meeting held last evening at the staff quarters of the School of Nursing Hall last evening.

In the course of his report, Mr. MacLean said, there were 4,230 admissions with a total of 42,681 patient days during the year. 3,309 outpatients were also dealt with. Mrs. Jeanna Slaght, who has been a patient for the past five years and showed commendable loyalty to the hospital, resigned at the end of January and was replaced by Miss Lucille Turnbull of Terher, Manitoba who is proving a very acceptable addition to the staff.

Mr. MacLean noted bequests from estates as follows: Miss Rolfe J. Irving, Scotland \$267.50; John A. MacKinnon, Ottawa, \$500.00; P. J. Simmonds, Charlottetown, \$696.27; donations amounting to \$1,006.25. Sixteen bibles were donated by Mr. and Mrs. John Coulson, Sea View and the Lions Club of Charlottetown donated an electric magnet to the hospitals of the Province and left it in the care of the P. E. I. Island Hospital. This magnet is used for drawing metal fragments from the eye.

The report acknowledged with gratitude the work done by the Senior Ladies Aid, Junior Ladies Aid, Wo-He-Lo Club and the League of Mercy. The report stressed the importance of this phase of the work of the hospital, and the expense entailed as a matter of absolute necessity.

The report described in detail the increased work load in the hospital during the past twenty years. The number of patients in 1934 was 1,206 and last year 4,230. Other items, with 1934 bracketed were Outpatients (188) 3309, total number of patients Roll. It was also very encouraging to see that Island sires are doing well in other parts of Canada; because a bull bred by A. MacRae & Sons is the sire of the class winners along with numerous other animals bred by Island sires.

Death Yesterday In City of Mr. Marcus Calder

The death of Mr. Marcus Calder, well known Canadian National Express agent at Charlottetown, occurred at the P. E. I. Island Hospital yesterday afternoon, following a long illness. He was 63 years of age.

Born in Charlottetown, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Calder of Scotland, he was educated at West Kent School and following a course in Business College, entered the service of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. here. After completing his studies as a Morse operator, he was transferred to Summerside and later became manager of the Dominion Express office there. After the amalgamation of the Dominion Company with the Canadian National in 1917, Mr. Calder came to Charlottetown as agent, a position which he continued to fill up to the time of his death.

His marriage to Miss Mave Louise Robinson of Summerside took place in 1917. Mr. Calder, in his general oversight of the express service throughout the province, was widely known and highly respected for his business reliability, coupled with courtesy and affability.

In the musical life of both Summerside and Charlottetown he was outstanding as a choir soloist and accepted ability and also sang with distinction as a member of the "Orpheus 8." He was a prime mover in organizing the first male chorus in the city and was always available to do his part in fraternal and community concerns.

An ardent fisherman, Mr. Calder experienced great enjoyment in this pastime when recreation was in order. He also enjoyed very fully his membership in Rotary and the fellowship of the weekly meetings.

Surviving relatives in addition to his wife are his son, Dr. Ralph Calder, surgeon with the Boyd Clinic, Long Beach, Calif., who has been at his father's bedside for the past week; one brother, A. F. Calder, Charlottetown, and three sisters, Mrs. Jean Richards and Mrs. William MacRae, both residing in New Glasgow, N.S., and Mrs. Seward Baginall, Sydney, N.S.

Commends Government For Aggressive Farm Policies

The policy of the Department of Agriculture in subsidizing ground limestone and 2-4-D weed killer was strongly endorsed in the Legislature yesterday by Mr. Harold Smith, Fourth District Kings' in speaking in the Draft Address debate.

The department's report, Mr. Smith said, shows that 23,000 tons of ground limestone were used last year. "This represents a subsidy paid to farmers of \$54,000.00. This would represent a ton for each acre of crop land in the province only once in 30 years. Since many of our farmers apply lime once in each crop rotation, it could be conceded that much of our land received no limestone whatsoever. Authorities have told us that the most of our farm lands require lime to assure better crops. I believe we should encourage our farmers to continue its use."

"The subsidy on 2-4-D weed killer, through which \$1,000.00 was paid our farmers last year, has done much to promote the control of weeds such as Wild Mustard and Sow Thistle in the province. Those two weeds were in the past and will in the future be a menace to our farmers. And I believe every effort should be made to control those and other noxious weeds."

SEED DRILL SURVEY

"From the seed drill survey conducted by the Department of Agriculture during the last five years, it is evident that our seed grain is not being satisfactorily cleaned before planting. The seeding of dirty grain is one of the main ways in which weeds are spread and that we are frequently losing markets, because of lack of emphasis being placed on the preparation of an attractive and high quality product. Far too often our own consumers choose imported products because it has been cleaned, graded and attractively packaged."

Mr. Smith also stressed the opportunities in the processing of horticulture products. "It would appear," he said, "that the quick freezing method is going to be of prime importance in the future. I believe, however, that we should also have markets for a greater quantity of fresh fruit and vegetables, and that we are frequently losing markets, because of lack of emphasis being placed on the preparation of an attractive and high quality product. Far too often our own consumers choose imported products because it has been cleaned, graded and attractively packaged."

"I also feel that our farmers or producers need guidance in control of weeds, insects and diseases and that our Government would be well advised to continue extension work in this field."

FROZEN FOODS

"With the coming of the frozen foods companies to this province it would appear that our poultry industry would be in for a boon. As we were told yesterday by the Minister of Natural Resources that should this company locate here, they would require very large quantities of poultry meats. At the present time the poultry industry is not in a very good condition. Farmers can not produce

surplus of poultry meats and down goes the price. I believe that farmers would be well advised to start a bunch of chicks this year—as at the present time the baby chick sales are down in Canada and U.S.A. by approximately 20% and we are told a 10% decrease would be to tip the scales.

Mr. Smith believed there was much work in this Province for an agricultural engineer. In the years 1917-1920 approximately 200,000 feet of the drainage was installed, which proved to be economically profitable in every respect. "Why then and not now?" he asked. "Our growing seasons are short at their best and anything we can do to lighten this short season will pay dividends."

He also dealt with other phases of agriculture policy, noting that veterinary service has expanded since its inauguration in 1951. 9,000 animals were treated under this policy during 1954. All concerned should see that full use is made of the calf hood vaccination program in order to protect our cattle from the ravages of Bangs disease. He noted also that since last session the department has formed two new divisions in agricultural engineering, field crops and horticulture.
