

Discusses Qualifications Of Amish Sect As Settlers

OTTAWA. (Special — One reason why the government of Canada is cold towards applications of Amish and Mennonite sects to settle in Canada is that these cults object to accepting citizenship of a country and do not participate in elections and other democratic procedures. This was revealed in the Commons Monday by Citizenship and Immigration Minister Pickersgill in reply to a question asked by Neil A. Matheson, Liberal M.P. for Queens.

Mr. Matheson asked if the Amish Mennonite people are being admitted to Canada and if not why not? The same question was asked

recently by J. Angus MacLean, Conservative M.P. for Queens. Mr. Pickersgill hastened to say that there is no barrier against the Amish by reason of the religion.

A small delegation of the Old Order Amish sect from Indiana was in Charlottetown last summer and showed keen interest in settling on the Island. Recently, one of them was barred from the country "because he did not satisfy the immigration officers."

"The Amish are a people that 'Keep themselves to themselves' They are hard workers and admittedly excellent farmers but

stick to the farming methods of their forefathers. They will not use automobiles, tractors or trucks sticking to horses. They are also opposed to the use of electricity.

PROBE VANDALISM

City Police assisted by Cpl. Gordon Humphrey of the Identification Section of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police are investigating a spree of vandalism which occurred in the YMCA building in Charlottetown on Sunday night or early yesterday morning. The vandals entered the building by smashing through a basement window and further smashed several more windows and doors until they reached their destination — the front office and mechanical coke vendor near the main entrance.

Although the damage looks extensive due to widely scattered debris, it is reported by Y authorities that \$100 will go a long way in repairing the loss after the building has been cleaned up. Canteen supplies are all that is thought to have been stolen with a damaging attempt being made to rob the coke machine of its cash.

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Addresses Rotarians On Recent Visit To Burma

"I have formed a very high opinion of the Chinese business and professional men in Malaya and Singapore and believe that the United States will eventually recognize Red China, as Canada and Britain now does," Gordon Milligan said in addressing Rotarians at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Rotarian Milligan, who recently returned from Burma where he was on loan from his company to assist in the supervision of the installation of modern electrical equipment arranged for under the Colombo plan, speaking particularly of Burma said that Communist influence was not in evidence there.

"It was a sad day for Burma when independence was granted by Britain. Everything worthwhile there has been inherited from the former regime and with the five or six States, traditionally at loggerheads with each other now trying to dominate, the situation is not too good." Mr. Milligan described how opposition to the Government was demonstrated in blowing up trains, installations, buildings etc. while the party in power was endeavouring to develop the country as rapidly as possible.

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Minor Damage To Magnificent In Severe Storm

OTTAWA (CP) — The aircraft carrier Magnificent has received minor damage in a severe pounding from one of the winter's worst North Atlantic storms, naval headquarters said Monday.

The 18,000-ton carrier is en route from Glasgow to Halifax after carrying Canadian troops and equipment to Egypt to join the United Nations Emergency Force. The navy said the storm slowed the Magnificent almost to a standstill. Winds up to 80 knots and seas as steep as seasoned sailors can remember have caused the ship to roll as much as 25 degrees.

The Magnificent was barely making headway as she sought to protest her cargo of more than 50 RCAF Sabre jet fighters, most of which are lashed to the flight deck. The planes are being returned from the RCAF air division in Europe for use by auxiliary squadrons in Canada.

The carrier is due at Halifax Friday but the navy said she could be delayed unless weather conditions improve.
