## Local and Other Items

EAST PRINCE.—This is election day in East Prince.

THE WEATHER.—Moderate to fresh westerly winds, fair and decidedly cold.

GOOD LIGHTING.—Many flattering comments have been expressed regarding the manner in which James Paon & Co's store has been lighted for the Christmas trade. The effectiveness of their display is much enhanced by the electric lights, which were arranged and put in by Mr Waddell, Superintendent of the P E I Electric Company.

DIED YESTERDAY.—The death occurred yesterday, at the residence of Mr. W. S. McKie, of Mrs. James Bullman, of New Glasgow, a sister of Mrs McKie. Mrs. Bullman came to the city about three months ago for medical treatment. Her body was taken home by the afternoon train yesterday. Her bereaved husband and family have the sympathy of all.

THE ICE FORMING.—Ice has formed in the docks and along the flats, and there was considerable thin ice floating about the harbor this morning. The Princess left for Pictou at the usual time.

BARY PRIZE WINNER.—In a voting contest for the most popular baby in St Joseph's parish, Boston, which closed on Monday evening, Louise, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. James C. McMahon, formerly of Charlottetown, won the principal prize, a valuable piano. The amount she received in votes totalled \$900. Her nearest opponent earned \$500. Congratulations.

A PATIENCE ACCIDENT.—The three year old daughter of Mr W A Carr, St Eleanor's, met with a very painful accident last Sunday. The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says that while in the act of getting off a chair on which she was sitting the child tipped and fell forward on the stove—her two hands getting very badly burned from the wrists to the finger tips. It is feared that she will lose the use of some of the fingers.

THE SKATING RINK.—Ice is being made as rapidly as possible, and the rink will be open for skating on Monday evening, Dec. 26th (Christmas). STEAMER MOVEMENTS.—The Northumberland left Summerside for Point du Chene this morning. It is not yet known yet whether she will return to Summerside or come to Charlottetown.

ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian reports that a man named William Bryenton, of Longing to Lot 9, was a few days ago arraigned before Stipendiary Magistrate McQuarrie on a charge of forgery, and sent up for trial in the Supreme Court. The correspondent says: The witnesses testified that the accused had stolen the deed of his father's farm, came in town and mortgaged the farm for \$125, getting \$25 in advance. This was last February. Last Saturday he was seen again for the first time since the raise. The clerk employed in the office that had advanced the cash recognized him and telling him the balance of the cash was ready for him, got him into the office, and when there the police were telephoned for and Bryenton placed under arrest.
