### Federation Issues Statement

The Executive of the Federation of Agriculture issued the following statement after its Thursday evening meeting:

While the Executive recognizes that some dislocation is bound to occur in livestock marketing, it nevertheless believes that a really serious situation will develop.

Approval was expressed for the interest displayed by both Premier Shaw and Premier-elect Campbell and their efforts to facilitate transportation of livestock to other plants. While some delay is inevitable for livestock trucks at the ferries due to the great tourist traffic the Federation would not like to see our visitors inconvenienced still further by livestock priorities. The use of the old Scotia for livestock and other trucks appears to be indicated.

It is suggested that there should be no real cause for concern on the part of people with cattle to market if normal marketing intentions are carried out.

### Scotia Goes Into Service

Canadian National Railways yesterday pressed a fourth ship into service on the Northumberland Strait crossing between Borden and Cape Tormentine, N.B. in an attempt to keep pace with a record flow of visitors between Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.

J.G. Davis, manager of CNR's Maritime area, said today the Scotia II will go into service with the Abegweit, Prince Edward Island and the Confederation. She will operate out of the Confederation's dock and will operate, as much as possible, opposite the Confederation.

The number of scheduled crossings of the Strait will increase from 38 to 14 a day, a record number of sailings, and the ferries' capacity will be increased to handle about 3,685 vehicles a day.

Mr. Davis said 196,707 persons used the ferry service during the first six months of the year, an increase of more than 20,000 over the same period last year. Traffic totals last month jumped 11,400 more than June, 1965.
