IN WEST QUEEN'S.

THE Patriot is worried about Mr. W. S. Stewart's candidature in West Queen's. This is to be expected. Mr. Stewart is an exceptionally strong man, and will give the Patriot's Knight more trouble than he wants. Mr. Stewart is in the field to win, and the chances are excellent for carrying the riding. The people are thoroughly disgusted with Sir Louis and his Government. They have been deceived and will resent the deception on election day. No mistake will be made by electing Mr. Stewart. He is well informed upon the public questions of the day, a keen debater and an able man in every respect. The Laurier Government is doomed, and when the Conservatives obtain power the people of West Queen's will have an energetic representative to look after their interests in the person of Mr. Stewart.

MORE GRIT DECEPTION.

ACCORDING to a Winnipeg despatch there is intense indignation among the farmers of Manitoba over the duplicity of the Government in the matter of binder twine. It was understood that twine was to be furnished the farmers at cost price, plus the cost of handling, and the farmers were jubilant. The harvest is fast ending, the threshing is on and the twine has not yet appeared. It was stated that an agent of the Government was at the Winnipeg Fair to take orders from farmers, but Mr. Hugh McKellar, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, states that though he and Mr. Gregg, editor of the North-West Farmer, made diligent search for this agent he could not be found. The farmers of this province are wondering how many more practical jokes the Government is going to spring upon them. It will be one of the things Clifford Sifton will be asked to explain when he goes west.

THE GOVERNMENT'S RECORD

DURING the past four years, says the Brockville Times, the Grits have had fair chance to prove their claims to be competent rulers as compared with their Conservative predecessors. Public opinion has had time to form. If the people get a fair opportunity to express this opinion, and their votes are not tampered with, we believe that public opinion will turn the Grits out of power. The Conservatives were not perfect, but in their long reign of eighteen years they never made such a record of rank rascality as the professed purists known as the Laurier government. The Laurier administration has not only

dropped its free trade plank and adopted the Conservative protective policy, but has held an unparalleled orgy of prodigal extravagance and gross corruption. The election scandals of the Grit "machine," whereby the votes of honest men were deliberately fished and fraudulent ballots substituted, has for disgraceful wrongdoing by a political party, never been surpassed in America. The record of the Laurier administration is pockmarked with scandals and obstructive investigations, and if public opinion in Canada is not again such a record we are much mistaken in the Canadian character.

AN OBNOXIOUS PAMPHLET.

THE Quebec Soleil, the Toronto Globe and other Grit newspapers recently published what they claimed to be the facsimile of a pamphlet criticising Sir Wilfrid Laurier for having permitted Canada to take part in the wars of the Empire and being too much in favor of Imperialism. It is known as French Pamphlet No. 6, and these papers claim that it was issued from Conservative headquarters, with Sir Charles Tupper's approbation, for circulation in Quebec. Incidentally these same papers have been fiercely denouncing Sir Charles for having one policy for Quebec and another for Ontario. It transpires, however, that Sir Charles knew nothing of the pamphlet in question until it was brought to his notice by an interviewer a few days ago, when Canada's grand old man promptly and emphatically repudiated it. "I never heard of the pamphlet to which you refer until today," said he "and I have not yet read it. I need scarcely say that if it contains such expressions as you describe, I have no hesitation in repudiating them utterly. They in no sense reflect my views or those of any section of the Liberal-Conservative party. Moreover, they are in direct contradiction, not only to my own public utterances, but to all the public utterances of all the French-Canadian leaders of our party on this subject. Sir Adolphe Caron, Mr. Bergeron, Mr. Casgrain and Mr. Monk have been most outspoken in declaring themselves, not only in the House of Commons but before large audiences of their own race, in favor of Canada sending troops to the Transvaal, and I am satisfied that they accurately represent the views of their constituents. I only desire to add that, upon this question—as upon all others, I have but one policy for all Canada. That policy may be right or it may be wrong, but at least it has the merit of being precisely the same in Ontario as it is in Quebec." This emphatic statement of the Leader of the Liberal-Conservative party should put a stop to the attacks that are being made upon him.

GATHERING OF SCOTTISH CLANS

Parade This Morning---A Big Time at Souris.

The annual Gathering of the Clans, which was postponed from Wednesday is being held today on the Souris Driving Park. The occasion is one which is looked forward to by all Scotchmen with eager expectancy, and today, despite the postponement and the morning clouds there is a large attendance. At half-past seven this morning the members of the Caledonian Club assembled at their

rooms on Queen Street where the procession was formed. It consisted of the Highland Brigade in uniform, and the Caledonian Club in plaid and bonnet, headed by their pipers and the Band of the 82nd Battalion. The route of procession was down Queen to Water street and thence to the Railway station.

A special train of cars in charge of Conductors Munroe and Cox left the station a few minutes before eight and after increasing

its load of living freight at the different stations arrived at Souris at 11. The village was attired in its best to welcome the sons of the Heather. On all sides was displayed the Tartan, dear to every Scottish heart, and the general appearance of the eastern metropolis betokened that for one day at least it was given over to the reunion of Highland and Lowland Clans. The procession was re-formed at the railway station in Souris

and paraded through the principal streets which were lined with spectators, first from north and south, from east and west, the people had assembled. After the parade the scene of activity was changed to the Driving Park, a mile and a half from the village, where the sports are taking place. The list of entries for the professional events is a large one and includes the old veterans who have competed at these games for many years.

In the public schools of Baltimore the eyes of 53,067 pupils were examined by the tests ordinarily used, and the results are interesting and suggestive: 9,051 pupils were found to have such defective eyesight as to make school work unsafe; 53 per cent. of the children were not to be in the enjoyment of normal vision, but curiously enough the percentage of defective eyesight increased with the age of the pupils. The report recommends yearly examinations hereafter of the pupils' eyesight. The large percentage, nearly one-fifth of the total number examined, found to be in no condition to do school work at all, is a warning to parents and school authorities all over the country. It shows great negligence and ignorance on the part of parents, where the responsibility rests in the first place, and where periodical examinations of the pupils' eyesight by school authorities will place it at last.—Philadelphia Inquirer.
