Maritime Social Work Talks Slated For City

"Interpretation of social work to the public" is to be the theme of the Maritime conference in social work which convenes in Charlottetown at St. Dunstan's University in June 1959. Eugene MacDonald, director of child welfare for the P.E.I. department of welfare, is the chairman of this conference which meets over two years in one of the Atlantic Provinces. It was held in St. John's, Newfoundland, in 1957. Commission Will Take Steps To Increase Water Pressure

The decrease in pressure of water in the area surrounding the Provincial Sanatorium has been noted on several occasions during recent months. A survey indicated that the water pressure in that area has dropped 50 per cent in the past year. At a meeting of the Commission of Sewers and Water Supply on Thursday afternoon, a spokesman for the commission said that they were going to rectify this matter in the spring when the 10-inch main on Kirkwood Drive will be extended through to Spring Park Road and the North River Road to connect at the high school with the present main. He added that although this connection would increase the quantity of water in that area, it would not increase the pressure; only prevent it from decreasing. Says Saint John Not Set Up For Shipbuilding

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The major reason why the Saint John Dry Dock Co. Ltd. did not receive a share of \$155,000,000 in contracts for six new destroyer escorts is that federal authorities are convinced the Saint John shipbuilding plant is not equipped to handle this type of work. This information came Thursday from Veterans Minister Brooks, New Brunswick representative in the federal cabinet. Opinion that the Saint John plant was not "geared for special type of destroyer escort construction" was shared by the Canadian Maritime Commission and the Department of National Defence, Mr. Brooks said in a telegram to a union work committee.

Carol Ann's Fate In Jury's Hands

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—The fate of Carl Ann Fugate, sweetheart of killer Charles Starkweather, was placed Thursday in the hands of a jury of seven men and five women. Her lawyers quoted the 15-year-old murder defendant as possessing "a very abiding faith in the jury" as she awaited a verdict which could mean life imprisonment or death in the electric chair. Carl is charged on two counts of first degree murder with aiding and abetting Starkweather in the Jan. 27 killing of Robert Jensen, 17, of Benet, Neb. One count charges premeditated and malicious murder, the second count, murder in the perpetration of a robbery. Identical charges brought mass killer Starkweather, 19, a death sentence last May. ONE OF 11 VICTIMS Jensen was one of Starkweather's 11 admitted murder victims. Judge Harry Spencer instructed jurors they may find Carl innocent or guilty on either first or second degree murder on the first count. On the second count the only alternatives were innocent or guilty of first degree murder. First degree murder is punishable in Nebraska by death or life imprisonment. The jury sets the penalty. Second degree murder is punishable by imprisonment of 10 years to life.

Bodies Of 18 Lake Seamen Are Recovered

CHARLEVOIX, Mich. (AP)—Hope of finding more survivors of the sunken Carl D. Bradley was all but gone Thursday at headquarters of the Charlevoix coast guard group. Meanwhile, mass funeral services and an official day of mourning were announced at Rogers City, Mich., the little northeastern Michigan town of 3,873 persons, home port for the huge cargo vessel and home for 31 of its 35 crew members. Apparently only two men, Frank Mays and Elmer Fleming, both of Rogers City, survived mountainous, storm-lashed Lake Michigan waves which broke the ship in two Tuesday night. The Bradley vanished about 45 miles west of Charlevoix in 33 feet of water. Eighteen bodies have been recovered. A total of 150 persons, including state police and volunteers, joined coast guard foot patrols of tiny islands in the vicinity of the sinking to hunt for more bodies, possible survivors and equipment from the Bradley. They support the cutters Sun Dew and Hollyhook, three helicopters and an amphibian and two state police aircraft combing the Bradley's watery grave area. Searchers Thursday discovered empty life jackets and an empty capsized lifeboat on the southeast end of High Island.
