

Local and Other Items.

No EXAMINER to-morrow. WALLACE ROSS, the craftsman, has gone to England. THE MARKET to-day was small. Prices unchanged. A LETTER from Dr. Jenkins will appear on Wednesday. REV. R. McLENNAN was registered at the International Hotel, Halifax, on Saturday. SENATOR HOWLAND and wife leave by this afternoon train for Georgetown, en route for Ottawa. THE Scott Act cases before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon were adjourned until Wednesday. THE city schools will be reopened after the Christmas holidays, on Wednesday, 2nd January, at 9 o'clock, a. m. A full attendance of pupils is expected. By the advice of his musical friends, Mr. Earle has decided to place the admission fee for his concert at twenty-five cents. This is a popular price, and will ensure him a bumper house. THE next meeting of the Educational Institute will be held on the evening of Friday, the 4th of January, in the Upper Prince Street School. Subject for discussion: "The Course of Study in the Public Schools." Choir to be taken at eight o'clock. WE regret to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. Read, wife of the Ven. Archdeacon Read, which occurred at her residence yesterday morning. Mrs. Read was in her usual health on arising, but she shortly became very ill, and suffered much from suffocation. Dr. Taylor was called in attendance, but she died a short time after his arrival. We sympathize with the Ven. Archdeacon in his sad bereavement. By a letter received from Mr. H. C. Outridge, Hamilton, Bermuda, we learn that the schooner "O. K." Blanche, master, freighted by him, which sailed from this place on 26th November, arrived at Hamilton on 10th December, after a very stormy passage. Cargo badly damaged; lost overboard four horses, two cows, all the pigs, four turkeys, and half of the geese. The surviving horses are terribly bruised and cut. Shifting Ordnance Competition. Detachments from the several batteries of the P. E. Island Brigade of Garrison Artillery have been, for some time past, actively engaged in preparing themselves to compete for the prizes offered to the garrison batteries of the Dominion, by the Dominion Artillery Association, in a shifting ordnance competition, and on Friday and Saturday evenings of last week the detachments from Nos. 1 and 2 Batteries competed, Brigade Major Freedland acting as umpire. The shift was as follows:—A 24-pounder gun, of 50-cwt., lying upon two short skids, twelve feet in rear of a platform measuring twelve by eighteen feet, in the centre of which stood its carriage, was taken completely around the platform, by the left, and returned to its original position on the short skid—a distance of some 150 feet. It was then carried forward and mounted upon its carriage, the carriage left in its original position, and all stores clear of the platform. This was done by the detachment from No. 1 Battery in the incredibly short space of two minutes and thirty seconds, No. 2 Battery's detachment being only seven seconds behind them—their time being two minutes and thirty-seven seconds. Both detachments were in splendid form and worked admirably. From the word go, until the gun rested on its trunnions in its carriage, the men worked with the greatest steadiness, and without the slightest confusion. Every man knowing his work and doing it with a will. The gun seemed fairly to fly over the skids, and the skids over the gun, so quickly were they placed, and so quickly did the gun traverse the space. The celerity, ease and steadiness with which this shift, a rather difficult one, as great care had to be used to avoid the platform in taking the gun round, speaks volumes for the drill of these batteries. We hear that the time made by the Kingston Cadets, who also competed in this shift, was three minutes and forty-nine seconds. Both our lads have, therefore, beaten them by over a minute. No small victory to make over a permanent force, who have all the means and appliances necessary in contests of this kind, immediately at their hand. We have not yet learned the time made by any other batteries that may have competed, but we think we may safely congratulate No. 1 Battery in having again upheld its proud position of being the premier Battery of the Dominion, and No. 2 as being a good second. This latter Battery, it should be remembered, is composed almost exclusively of recruits, this fall being the first time they have had any drill whatever, in drills of this nature. No. 3 Battery (Georgetown) compete this evening, showing great pluck on their part, seeing that they have serious difficulties to overcome, and very few of the opportunities for drill and practice afforded to their sister batteries of the Dominion; and when we consider the great efficiency this brigade has attained, we certainly think it is due to them that they should receive greater encouragement and support on the part of the Department of Militia and Defence than they do. A rifled gun or two should be added to their armament, or at least an opportunity given them of learning their use by sending them to Halifax or Quebec during a portion of their annual drill. As an instance of the want of attention paid to their wants, we may state the fact that No. 2 Battery, though some time enrolled, are still without great coats,—a more important part of a soldier's outfit than even his tunic. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Judge Lynch Again. YAZOO CITY, MISS., Dec. 29. Excitement has run high here all day. To-night parties from different parts of the country came into town. This evening 200 armed men proceeded to the jail and gained an entrance without much resistance. One prisoner, W. L. Toole, resisted, and was shot dead in his cell. Robt. Swayze, Nancajah Parker, and Richard Gibbs were taken from jail and lynched. The above parties are charged with being principals in the murder of the Posey brothers and Jasper Nichols, on the night of the sixth inst. Another Horror. WALLA WALLA, W. T., Dec. 29. As Sheriff Thompson and Jailer Williams were visiting the cells at the jail here last night, they were attacked by Elfus and Owen, two condemned murderers, who knocked them senseless with bricks they had secreted. On the jailer showing signals of recovery, they took a knife from his pocket and hacked him to pieces. They then fled. The whole country is in arms. A committee of action was promptly formed and has started in pursuit. The Orange Body to be a Fighting Force in Ireland. LONDON, Dec. 29. The Globe published a circular that has been issued to the Orange Grand Master of Ireland, advising the enrollment of an Orange volunteer force, or militia, to be composed, if possible, of old soldiers, in order to strengthen the Orange Society as a fighting force. The Government will be petitioned to allow these volunteers to be armed with rifles, which will be kept in the nearest Orange hall or barracks.
