## Lehru Will Insist On Soviet Fighter

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Prime Minister Nehru told Parliament Thursday that foreign threats to cut aid would not influence India's decision about buying Russian MIG jet fighter.

"One thing is certain — in coming to a decision we are not going to be governed or influenced by pressure tactics from outside or hopes that would come if we do not do it."

Nehru said the matter of buying the Russian planes "came up because the United States is supplying Sabre jet aircraft to Pakistan."

"In that case the responsibility is theirs for taking a step which creates these far-reaching repercussions," he added.

Nehru declared that the government has not yet taken a final decision on buying the MIGs. But he added:

Nehru also told parliament an Indian air force team is in Moscow completing details for the proposed purchase of jet engines for India-designed HF-24 supersonic aircraft.

India had earlier planned to equip the aircraft with a British engine but this idea was abandoned because of the high cost.

## G.A. Callbeck's Named New Director of USTA

George A. Callbeck, Summerside, veteran Maritimes horseman and former champion hink and fox rancher, has been appointed a director of the United States Trotting Association's District Eleven, which encompasses the Maritime Provinces.

Callbeck, 62, succeeds Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, who is retiring at the age of 86 and has been named a director emeritus by the USTA and other directors of District Eleven. MacKinnon, nominated last winter for the Trotting Association's Hall of Fame, had been serving the second year of a current three year term.

Callbeck was born at Augustine Cove and has been a director of Summerside for the past 38 years. He was appointed to the position of director to fill Col. MacKinnon's unexpired term by the other members of the District Eleven board of directors, John Cruickshank of Halifax, James A. Ferguson of Sydney Mines and George E. Woodside of Fredericton, N.B.

Retiring from his life time vocation, far farming, last year so he could devote full time to his racing stable, Mr. Callbeck has been a director and part-owner of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association since 1946. He was the first president of the P. E. I. Harness Racing Club, holding that office from 1954 through 1959.

Mr. Callbeck first became interested in harness horses back in 1913 when the late Hon. John Richards arranged with the new director's father to have Captain Aubrey (2:07 1/4) stand for service at the Callbeck farm. The elder Callbeck was one of the Island's leading live stock breeders, specializing in Clydesdale horses and Yorkshire Swine.

A highly successful driver and trainer of standardbreds, as well as owner and breeder, the Summerside man currently has a stable which includes Ann Cleeg, Ann's Dream, Echo Ridge, Eddy, North Anway, Fur Anway, Mister Anway and Only One C, all of them home bred excepting Echo Ridge 2:04.

In 1959 Callbeck drove his six year old gelding Mighty Lee to a Charlottetown track record (2:03.45) in the presence of Her Majesty The Queen. Later, with the same horse, he set a track record (2:04) at Sackville Downs.

(Continued from page 1) exempt from the tariff surcharge. The five-per-cent tariff surcharge would apply to some \$2,000,000 in imports of a less essential nature."

The 15-per-cent rate would apply to a group of luxury items including wines, spirits, jewelry and perfume. The 10-per-cent rate would apply to a group of imports including automobiles, furniture, chinaware, clothing, radios and TV sets.

MAX REDUCE DEFICIT Mr. Diefenbaker said the new tariffs, plus the reduction in the tariff-free exemption on tourist purchases, will result in a \$200,000,000 annual improvement in Canada's international balance-of-payments situation.

The government also would cut spending by \$200,000,000 in a full year — details were not given in the statement and this, combined with increased revenues from the tariff surcharges would have the effect of reducing the budgetary deficit by about \$450,000,000 in a year.

There was no immediate indication what the effect would be on the price of gold, which Mr. Fleming predicted budgetary spending of \$6,525,000,000 and total government expenditures of \$8,780,000,000. These figures do not include \$75,000,000 in old debt pending payments or \$662,000,000 in special tax revenues to the pension fund.

Mr. Diefenbaker said Canada's official exchange reserves have fallen to "approximately \$1,100,000,000" — a shrinkage of nearly \$400,000,000 so far this month from their level of \$1,492,500,000 at May 31.

His statement announced that "to reinforce these reserves immediately" Canada is borrowing \$300,000,000 from the International Monetary Fund and has arranged a line of credit of \$400,000,000 with the Export-Import Bank in Washington.

On top of this, the Bank of Canada had made reciprocal currency arrangements totalling \$250,000,000 with the U.S. federal reserve bank and \$100,000,000 with the United Kingdom. These arrangements were not further explained in the statement.
