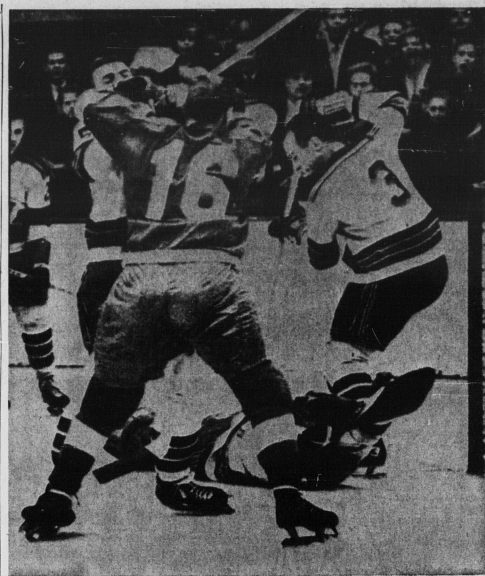

Plante Pays Brilliantly As Blues Bow To Detroit

DETROIT (AP)—Floyd Smith's power-play goal eight seconds after Larry Cahoon was penalized gave Detroit Red Wings a 3-1 victory Sunday night over New York Rangers and foiled a brilliant performance by Ranger goalie Jacques Plante.

Norm Ullman clinched the victory by firing into the empty New York net with 21 seconds to play after Plante had been pulled for an extra attacker. Plante was sensational for the last 10 games.

The masked marvel made 41 saves compared to 25 for Red Wing rookie Roger Crozier in making a tight game of what should have been a runaway.

The Wings, playing their third game in as many nights to the fourth in five nights for New York, outplayed the Rangers from start to finish.

Mikita Scores Twice As Hawks Whip Boston

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks moved to within two points of the National Hockey League lead Sunday night by defeating Boston Bruins 6-3.

By extending their unbeaten string to 10 games including nine victories, the Hawks gained ground on idle Montreal Canadiens, who had an issue with 37 points. The Hawks also remained two points up on third-place Detroit Red Wings, who beat New York 3-1.

Despite the score, the game was close for the first 30 minutes. Chicago moved in front early in the first period on two goals by Stan Mikita, but a goal midway in the first period, while the Bruins were short-handed, by Forbes Kennedy and a successful penalty shot by Dan Prentice early in the second pulled the Bruins even at 2-2.

Prentice drew his penalty shot when referee Frank Udvardi ruled he was trapped by Mikita but he here in Hawk goalie Denis DeJordy on a breakaway.

The score remained tied for only three minutes. It was broken by Hawk rookie centre Fred Stanfield who put a 30-footer behind Boston goalie Ed Johnston after taking a clean shot from Eric Nesterenko.

Rookie DeJordy made it 4-2 for the Hawks in the second period with a deflected goal on Pierre Plote's long shot and the Hawks wrapped it up in the final frame of markers by rookie Denis DeJordy and Johnny McKenzie.

Although Bobby Hull of the Hawks failed to add to his total of 29 goals, he did put three assists on the league-leading points total. He now has 29 points.
