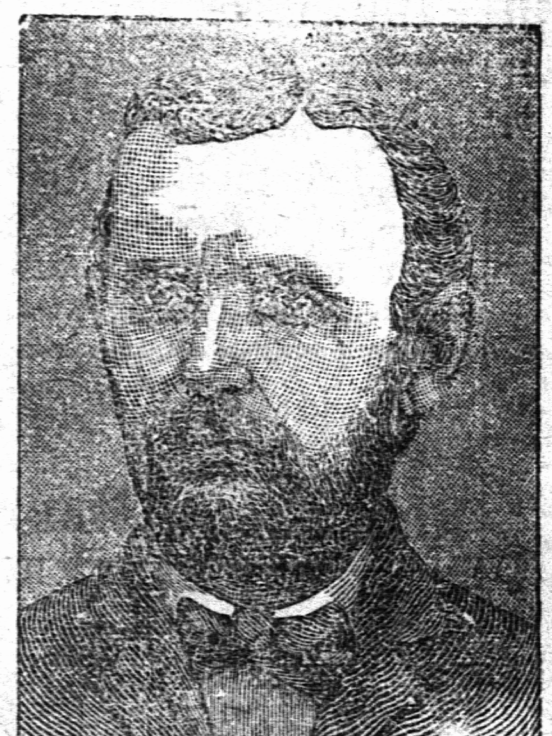

Gladstone Still Gaining.

Result of Salisbury's Conference With the Queen.

A COMPROMISE PROPOSED IN THE TIMES.

(SPECIAL TO THE GUARDIAN.)

LONDON, July 18.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon the parties stood:

Government..... 311. Opposition..... 347. Majority for Gladstone 36. Still to be elected..... 12.

The Liberals today gained the North Division of Wiltshire, and Vale, Clwyd Division, Denbighshire, by large majorities. Both seats have been held by Unionists, who were opposed at the last election.

Lord Salisbury had a conference with Her Majesty, and it is officially announced that, as a result, Government will meet Parliament instead of resigning.

In the Times to-day Sir Edward Watkin, Unionist member, proposes a settlement of the Irish difficulty by a compromise between Gladstone and Salisbury—and by building a ship canal across Ireland and a tunnel between Ireland and Scotland.

The remaining 19 seats changes are unlikely. Three were held by Unionists, and 5 Irish and 4 British by the Opposition. Gladstone's majority will therefore be about 45.

LONDON, July 17.—The Standard referring to the Liberal victory in the Forest of Dean Division, says: "Sir Charles Dilke's return constitutes no trifling addition to Gladstone's embarrassment in deciding claims for cabinet offices."

The leading subject of gossip is the question whether Gladstone will venture to offer a seat in the cabinet to Sir Charles Dilke in the face of the almost inevitable elections in 1893.

A seat will be found for Lord Salisbury's son, Viscount Cranborne, in Kensington, by conferring a peerage on Sir Algernon Borthwick, proprietor of the London Post.

It is said to be understood in official liberal quarters that Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt will be first lord of the treasury and government leader in the house of commons under Gladstone's direction.

MONTREAL, July 18.—Great anxiety is felt for the safety of the tug J. R. Booth and four coal barges which left Oswego last Friday. It is feared they have been swamped. Four other barges of the Kingston and Montreal Forwarding Company are now ashore in Lake Ontario coal laden.

FROM ST. JOHN'S

ECHOES OF THE GREAT FIRE.

St. John's, Nfld., July 15.—Warm weather continues here, and consequently the houseless ones are not suffering. Relief in food and clothing is being systematically distributed under the committee appointed by Sir Fred. Carter, chief justice, administrator of the government.

It is probable that a special session of the legislature will be called to deal with the rebuilding and landlord questions. The greater part of the land burned over belongs to absentee landlords and tenants will not rebuild on short leases with onerous conditions attached.

The people are agitating for the creation of a land court and for the purchase by the government of the whole water front. The problem is one difficult of solution.

A naval force under Commodore Sir Baldwin Walker, is engaged blowing down dangerous walls and chimneys. The safes belonging to many establishments have been opened.

The contents of the bank vaults, the lower and supreme court records and the savings bank books were found in good condition. The records of the crown lands department were all destroyed, as also were the manuscript of important acts passed at the last session of the legislature, and no copy of which exists.

The principal mercantile houses had English made safes, chiefly Milner's. All proved worthless, their contents being destroyed, while Taylor and O'Flaherty safes all came through the fire unscathed internally.

In one case there were Milner and Taylor safes in the same building, the contents of the former were destroyed, the latter were retained. Consequently Canadian safes are in great demand.
