

Meetings were held irregularly throughout the year. Sometimes there would be two meetings in one month and then for a stretch of several months, there would be none. Lectures started at 4:00 p.m., usually on a week-day. Lacking slide projectors and movie films as visual aids, lecturers brought specimens or examples of their subject and frequently prepared elaborate illustrations.
