Red Casualties

The Eighth Army announced that Communist casualties Monday through ground and artillery action totalled 1,444, a slight downward revision from its earlier figure.

Since Jan. 25 when Lt.-Gen. Matthew Ridgway, Eighth Army commander, opened his "limited" offensive, the Reds have lost 113,898 men dead, wounded or captured by official count.

The U.S. Eighth Army commander was officially corrected to locate a large concentration of possibly 30,000 Reds farther north than first reported.

Next sightings confirmed that the Reds now were near Hongchon, an important road and rail junction 27 air miles north of Wonju and only 22 air miles south of the 38th parallel.

Before the heavy Chinese counter-attack that failed last week, U.N. patrols had inched within five miles of Hongchon.

Repairing Port

At the big port of Inchon, 22 miles southwest of Seoul, U.S. Army engineers were helping navy shore teams get the harbor shipshape.

The navy announced the British cruiser Belfast and the Australian destroyer Warramunga joined the U.N. flotilla pounding the Wonsan sector, 90 miles above the 38th parallel on the east coast.

The Allied navy has been hammering at Wonsan for a week. So far there has been no explanation for this activity aside from its location on the main Communist supply route from Northeast Korea.

Continued from page 1 of price, wage and other controls in United States made such controls inevitable in Canada.

Referring to earlier statements by Cabinet Ministers that they hoped to control inflation by making controls in United States would make controls unnecessary in Canada, Mr. Drew said:

"I am not prepared to accept the proposition that in this sovereign nation of ours it is sufficient for us to say that we are going to rely on Uncle Sam for whatever legislation is necessary to deal with a suggestion of this kind."

Mr. St. Laurent said there certainly is room for divergence of views as to the manner in which Government should exercise powers to contract or prevent increases in prices.

"There was no doubt that further substantial increases in prices would be a serious danger to the economy of the country.

"There are those who claim that the protection of price increases by inflation in the free countries is one of the potential arms of our potential enemies in the present cold war," said Mr. St. Laurent.

"To be in a position to adopt such measures as the situation may from time to time require, the Government was asking for passage of the emergency-powers bill. The bill would not give the Government the same broad powers it could have obtained by proclaiming the War Measures Act. There would be some restrictions.

For instance, Parliament, through passage of a resolution, will have power to rescind any order passed under the new legislation.

Around The Armouries

The top story to come out of the Armouries this week concerns the return to his former unit of one of the Island's most distinguished soldiers of the last war.

He is Lt. Col. J. D. Stewart, D.S.O. E.D. (above), a onetime private in the ranks of the old P.E.I. Highlanders who now joins its successor, the P.E.I. Regiment (17th Recce) as Honorary Lieutenant Colonel.

Col. Dave, as he is known to thousands of soldiers, is receiving a royal welcome and men of all ranks are eagerly awaiting his first appearance on parade.

He first joined the ranks of the old militia as private with the Highlanders in 1928 and served continuously until the outbreak of war when he went on active service.

He had risen through the ranks to be mobilized as commandant of D Company. In 1940 with changes taking place the Highlanders went as reinforcements for other units and Col. Stewart took his company to the North Nova Scotia Highlanders, remaining for two years until his appointment as second in command of the unit where he was highly regarded.

Once again, however, the needs of the service changed his position and he was mobilized as commandant of the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders in 1943.

Members of the regiment deem it an honor indeed to have this distinguished soldier finally come back to them in such a high post.

This column offers sincere congratulations to both. To one for having regained a fine soldier, to the other for having returned to a fine unit.

New Diesel Engine Delivered To C.N.R.

MONTREAL, Feb. 20 — The first 2,100 horsepower diesel-electric road locomotive to be received by the Canadian National Railway, part of an order of 20, were delivered to the railway here today by the Montreal Locomotive Works.

They were an "A" unit, which is a lead unit with engineer's cab and a "B" or booster unit. The two locomotives will be paired together to produce 3,200 horsepower and will go into the fast freight service between Montreal and Toronto tonight on the first run.

These will be the most powerful diesel locomotives in Canadian National Service and it is expected that six more units will be received from the builder later this week and enter the same service.

The new delivery raises the C.N.R. diesel fleet to 180 locomotives, of which 122 are switchers, 38 are road locomotives, and 20 are road switchers.

Butter Stocks

OTTAWA, Feb. 20 (CP)—Canada's butter stocks at Feb. 16 were a little more than a third of what they were on the same date last year.

The Bureau of Statistics today reported stocks in nine Canadian cities at 9,813,000 pounds compared with 29,000,000 on the same date a year ago.

Holdings were smaller in each of the nine centres.

Stocks by cities, with totals for the same date last year in brackets: Quebec, 270,000 (991,000); Montreal, 2,041,000 (7,341,000); Toronto, 1,191,000 (7,253,000); Winnipeg, 3,007,000 (8,150,000); Regina, 314,000 (699,000); Saskatoon, 196,000 (237,000); Edmonton, 1,813,000 (2,112,000); Calgary, 526,000 (916,000); Vancouver, 456,000 (1,299,000).

Prominent B. C. Educationist Dies

VICTORIA, Feb. 20 (CP)—Mme. Elma Sanderson-Mongin, one of British Columbia's leading educationists, died here yesterday.

Born in Langres, France, she came to Canada nearly 40 years ago. Mme. Sanderson-Mongin was head of the French department at Victoria College, a post she held 20 years before retiring in 1930.

She was decorated by the French Government for her contribution in stimulating interest in the French language and French culture in Canada.
