After surrendering the lead to Frisco Creed heading into the backstretch, O'Brien moved out at the top of the lane, opened daylight, and then sawed off the fast-closing Scotchite to win by half a length. Raider Frost was clocked in 2:01 2/5. Scotchite grabbed second in the last few strides from Debora Frost, which led Hawkins Hoos to the wire by half a length.

O'Brien, who doubled for the Camp establishment the previous day, started his skin with Axel Rod, another "rich" mount in the fourth race. He was an easy wire-to-wire victor in 2:06. The little reinsman then turned in a masterpiece behind Camp's "Time Me" in the fifth. He was trapped behind horses until they reached the mid-stretch, and then with the grace and skill of a broken-field runner, he weaved his way inside and then out, to get up for a half-length win over Darn Tooting in 2:03 3/5.

WON RIBBON "Joe Lighthill picked up the next blue ribbon with Keen's Flash, taking the \$2,600 Lawrence Welk purse by a nose, as he outgamed Scotch Mercury to spoil O'Brien's bid for five straight wins. O'Brien then closed out the afternoon when he won the "C" Pace, purse \$1,600, with the three-year-old Explorer.

With reference to the above races, the following also appeared in the same issue of "The Harness Horse"—"Joe O'Brien's four wins in six tries on Tuesday was only the sixth driving quadruple in Western Harness Racing Association history. The others were by Poy Funderburk in 1947; Joe O'Brien, in 1953; Howard Beissinger, in 1957; Russ Valies Key, in 1959; and Besseneer again in 1959.

At Rockingham Park Salem, New Hampshire, last Saturday night, Henry Jones, driven by Bob Ryan, won the sixth race on the nine-day program. The time was 2:08—the fastest time of the night.

The "Pic-Six" winning pool was divided between two men who picked five winners out of the six designated races. They each received \$7,000. The attendance, despite the very cold weather, was 8,746, and \$245,613 passed through the pari-mutuels.

TRACK SLOW "We have had a couple of inquiries as to who bred the paret Rainbow Clegg, that took a new race record at Rockingham Park last week when he won in 2:06 4/5. He was bred by John Christopher of Tignish.

Reinbow Clegg won again at Rockingham on Thursday night, November 26, in the B-1 Pace, for a \$1,200 purse. The track was very slow and the time of the mile was 2:12 4/5.

The Delaware Horse Sales, held from November 16 to 18, saw 541 horses sold for a total of \$481,974. The top price paid was \$14,000 that Walter Michael paid for Dundee Lassie, p. 3, 2-year-old, recorded a half mile track. She is a full sister of the top winning pacer of 1959—Belle Acton, p. 3, 1:38 3/5, that is in the stable of Billy Haughton.

LOT OF INTEREST Quite a lot of interest is being taken by horsemen in the Maritimes in the new track that will open at Kingsway Downs, near Kentville, N.S., this summer. All through the Annapolis Valley there is a wave of racing enthusiasm, and the location of the track will be an asset. It will be located at Cambridge, just off the Halifax-Yarmouth Highway, some seven miles west of Kentville.

The plant will cover a total of 83 acres, and is immediately west of the Cambridge drive in theatre in the centre of a population of over 50,000 people within a 50-mile radius. Unlike other Maritime tracks, which are half-mile ovals, the new track will be five-eighths of a mile, and plans are being set up to make its grandstand and stables equal to, or better, than any in the Maritimes. Stalls for 80 horses will be built, with an area reserved to build more stables in the future, should they become necessary.

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Joe Brown Defends Title Against Charnley Tonight

By HAROLD V. RATLIFF HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Old Joe Brown, who has been laughing at the years and the youngsters trying to take his world's lightweight crown, makes his eighth title defence tonight against another of the youth brigade—big-necked, solid Dave Charnley of Britain.

Charnley, the 24-year-old ex-boxer of Darford, Kent, who hopes to be the first Englishman since Freddie Welsh in 1917 to hold the lightweight championship, expressed confidence that he would win. But he wouldn't speculate on how he might do it.

Brown, the 34-year-old Negro from Baton Rouge, La., who has held the title 3 1/2 years, was more emphatic, as he usually is. He said he would knock out the British challenger, an opinion seconded by Brown's manager, Lou Viscusi.

Billy Cannon Wins Trophy

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Cannon, Louisiana State halfback, Tuesday was named the 25th annual winner of the Heisman Trophy as the outstanding college football player in the nation.

Cannon, a 6-1, 210-pound senior, won by a substantial margin over his nearest rivals, quarterback Richie Lucas of Penn State and quarterback Doc Meredith of Southern Methodist, the sponsoring downtown athletic club announced.

The trophy will be presented Cannon by the guest of honor, Vice-President Richard Nixon, at the Downtown A. C. annual Heisman dinner here on Wednesday, Dec. 9.

SEASON MARKS Cannon, 23 and a native of Philadelphia, Miss., gained 598 yards rushing, returned eight kickoffs 191 yards, had 15 punt returns for 221 yards, caught 11 passes for 161 yards, punted 44 times for a 40.3 average and scored seven touchdowns for LSU, third ranking team nationally in this week's Associated Press poll.

He led LSU to an unbeaten season, a Sugar Bowl victory over Clemson, and the national championship last season. He and his mates will play Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans Jan. 1 in a rematch of their Oct. 31 game which Cannon won 7-3 on an 89-yard punt return for a touchdown with 10 minutes to play.

Married and the father of three daughters, Cannon drew 519 first place votes, 147 second place and 78 third place ballots to finish with 1,929 points in nationwide voting conducted by the Downtown A.C. Lucas was second with 613 points and Meredith third with 226.

Alabama Accepts Bid To Meet Penn State

By WILL GRIMSLEY NEW YORK (CP)—Alabama, which has one of the flossiest of bow records, accepted a bid Tuesday to play Penn State Dec. 19 in Philadelphia's new Liberty Bowl. This completed the line-up for the big post-season football games.

The top 11 teams in The Associated Press' latest poll — Alabama is No. 11—all have bowl commitments and the crimson tide becomes the fifth so honored from the bowl-minded Southeastern Conference.

In the seven major games more than half the talent is provided by the deep South and Southwest. The Southwestern Conference challenges the Southeastern's whopping list with three teams.

Muzz Patrick Orders Goalies To Wear Masks

NEW YORK (CP)—Muzz Patrick, general manager of New York Rangers, Tuesday ordered all junior and juvenile goalies in the Ranger farm system to wear face masks similar to the type introduced by Jacques Plante of Montreal Canadiens.

"I'm sold on the masks now," he said. "No one was more skeptical than me of the value of facial protection, but now I'm convinced that they're here to stay."

Patrick said the junior and juvenile goalies will have masks moulded to fit their faces properly.

Dejohn, Valdes Are Winners

LONDON (AP)—Lanky Mike Dejohn of Syracuse, N.Y., and strapping Nino Valdes of Cuba beat British heavyweights in a pair of disappointing fights at Wembley's indoor stadium Tuesday night.

A sellout crowd of 11,000 saw Dejohn gain a narrow, well-booked decision in 10 rounds over Dick Richardson, a Welsh milkman, and Valdes stop Brian London, a cut-up Londoner.

The 35-year-old Cuban opened a cut over London's left eye, forcing the 25-year-old Briton to retire at the end of the seventh round of the 10-round co-feature.

It was London's first fight since he was knocked out in the 11th round by Floyd Patterson, then the world heavyweight champion, at Indianapolis last May 1.

Neither Valdes nor London displayed any power or skill. They spent most of the time in clinches. At times it looked more like a wrestling match.

Valdes, who weighed 218 to London's 211, was a major disappointment to the fans. In three previous bouts in England, he scored devastating knockouts. Before coming here, the onetime top-ranking Cuban had lost two straight fights in the United States.

Dejohn, who gave away three pounds at 201 1/2, ran his winning streak to three. The crowd booed the decision of British referee Bill Williams. Many thought Richardson's mauling tactics had won the bout.
