U. S. BANKING FAILURES. Over Seven Hundred Suspensions Since 1867. Statistics compiled from official data show that from January to September this year 569 state and private banks in the United States failed, and that 72 have resumed business. In the same time 153 national banks failed, 70 of which have resumed. The following table gives the number of failures of state and private banks since January 1, 1893:

NEWS NOTES.

In sheep judging at the world's fair, Ontario sleep took all the prizes in the Lincoln class, except one second and one fourth prizes. The Brazilian Bank has received a telegram to the effect that one of their staff was killed by a shell, during the bombardment of Rio. What animal can make the most noise? The elephant. During the breeding season in the forests of India and Ceylon, the trumpeting and roaring of the animal is continuous and terrific, and can be heard for miles. The feline family are wont to scare their prey thoroughly by their overpowering noise. Thus the roar of the adult lion is terrific, the whimping being enlarged so as to give the animal a larger volume of air proportionately than any other animal. The male gorilla has an awful, loud-sounding voice. When attacked it utters a short, jerking, acute bark, like that of an angry dog. To this succeeds a low growling, which might be mistaken for distant thunder.

The Sultan of Johore, against whom a petty English girl has brought suit for \$3,000 damages, claiming breach of promise to marry, has sailed for Singapore from Brindisi. The sultan's departure has revived interest in the interesting suit to which he is a party. The facts are about as follows: Miss Jennie Mignall, a young lady with a good position in society, gifted with accomplishments of a high order, and of attractive appearance, seeking damages from the Sultan of Johore for breach of promise, and also asks for the return of a diamond buckle. Miss Mignall resides at 20 Devonshire Place, Brighton, and when introduced to the highest sultan of the state and territory of Johore, she was not aware of the majesty of his position, but subsequently his true position was communicated to her. The story of the wooing should prove interesting, but for the moment it must be deferred. The Sultan is well known in this country, and has for some time past resided in Calcutta, Bonchurch, and Inveright. His highness has been conspicuous by his show of diamonds and handsome presence at most of the state functions which have recently taken place here. The state of Johore occupies the southern part of the Malay peninsula, and is one of the most prosperous in the east. It is traversed by a railway, and exports a large quantity of the finest timber. The Sultan of Johore's solicitors accepted service of the writ, which was issued August 25, 1893. The defendant, as already stated, is at the present time reigning monarch, and in consequence he might be able to raise a plea of personal privilege exempting him from the jurisdiction of the courts.

SEARCHING FOR MONEY.—A gentleman from Queen's County, N. B., told a St. John Sun reporter on Friday, when called on at Tennant's Core is necessary in a search for money. He claims to have an authentic record of a large sum of money being buried somewhere along the shore by an old French settler. He is not certain as to the exact sum, but says that the amount is certainly a large one. As the land has been cleared since the money was buried, it will be somewhat difficult to locate it, but he thinks he will be able to do so as soon as he gets the lay of the land.

DROWNED IN A WELL.—Mrs. Elizabeth Melman, a lady of 74 years of age, living at Broad River Head, near Port Houton, Queen's County, met with her death early on Sunday morning, 24th inst., in a very strange and unexpected way. She lived with her son and daughter-in-law. They, on rising on Sunday morning, were alarmed when they did not as usual find her about the house, and after a search were horrified to discover her drowned in the well. It would appear that the deceased had risen early with the view of spending the day with a friend, that she had taken a pitcher to fill with water, that she had first removed the curb and lifted out the creamer, then, after filling the pitcher, it is supposed she over-balanced herself and fell headlong into the well. Though the well contained only one foot of water, yet falling in this position brought death swift and certain.

A CLOCK CALL.—Three men of the schooner Torjion, of La Have, N. S., viz: Truman Spindler, Obediah Wentzel and Whitman Croft, were very nearly drowned one day last week off English Point. They were returning from their travels with their dory heavily loaded. The sea was rough at the time, and when about a mile from their vessel the dory filled and turned bottom up. Two of them being good swimmers, got hold of a strap on the bow and held on. The other one made out to get hold of the stern of the dory, and although washed off several times, was unable to swim, he managed to scramble back again. In this perilous condition the three hung on for about an hour when they were seen by those in the vessel who put out to their rescue. When taken on board they were very much exhausted. They are all young and vigorous men, and to this fact is due their almost miraculous preservation from a watery grave.
