

Magnificent Chorus By The Don Cossack Chorus

An audience which filled Queen Charlotte High School auditorium to capacity heard the famous Don Cossack Chorus here on Saturday night. Given under the auspices of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, the concert was enthusiastically applauded, and proved a thrilling experience in its combination of magnificent choral singing and spectacular dancing.

Composed of the best vocal talent and dancers obtainable among the White Russian emigrants who fought Communism in Russia, the Chorus under the direction of Nicholas Kostroff has given thousands of concerts in its eighteen years of existence. The current season marks its seventeenth anniversary of transatlantic tours and its second appearance in Charlottetown.

The Chorus is particularly impressive in its rendering of Russian religious music, to which the opening part of Saturday's programme was chiefly devoted. The numbers included two very fine selections from Tchaikovsky, "Blessed Be The Lord," and "O Holy God," the latter being in the form of prayers intoned by a deacon, and answered

by the chorus. Also very beautifully rendered were "Credo" by Gretchaninoff, "Ave Maria" by Donizetti, "God Save Thy People," by Tchesnokoff, and "The Lord's Prayer," by Malotte, which was specially arranged for chorus and given in the original English.

The other parts of the programme were both varied and interesting. They included the following numbers: "Along the Peeterskaia," "Serenade," "Signals, a Cossack battle song," "The Twelve Robbers," old ballad; "Monotonously Rings the Little Bell," popular melody; "Snowball Tree," folk song; "The Song of General Platoff," Cossack war song; "Leszinka," Caucasian dance; "Slavic Polka," "Stenka Razin," a song about the Volga; "The Snow has Blown Over the Steppes," "My Sweet Lady" a gay Cossack folk song; Soldier's Song, "The Happy Wanderer" and "Kozatchok," a dance to which the Chorus has given wide popularity.

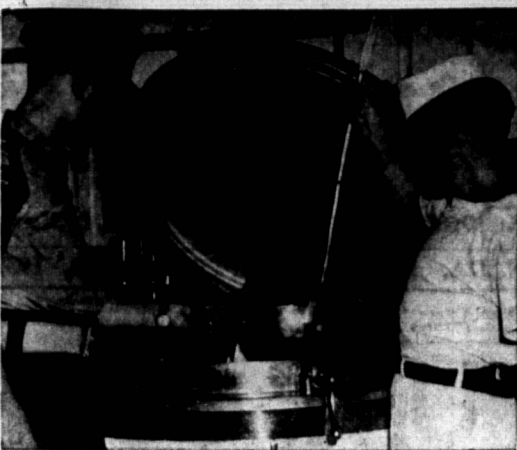
Several of the numbers featured fine tenor and bass soloists and were rendered with marvellous precision and dramatic power. There was no instrumental

accompaniment, nor was any required. The voices—blending in perfect harmony—rising and falling in unison, sometimes barely audible and at other times filling the hall with majestic sound—kept the audience entranced. The program was a lengthy and satisfying one, but it could have gone on much longer and retained its magic spell.

The Caucasian dances were, of course, a special feature and one for which the Chorus is world famous. A star in these performances is Gabriel Soloduhin, whose danger dance was an exciting interlude in Saturday's program.

The concert was attended officially by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse and Mrs. Prowse, Premier Matheson and Mrs. Matheson, and City Councillor Gerald Foster and Mrs. Foster.

Rotary President R.C. Parent addressed the audience briefly on behalf of the Rotary Club, expressing appreciation of the very large attendance and stating that the club's fund for crippled children.

Q. Why do people take cold when the weather suddenly changes?

A. They don't, according to two Cornell University doctors. In a four year study of student's sniffles the physicians found the temperature change, not the weather, and getting tired had very little to do with catching a cold. The doctors kept a week-by-week record of how many students visited the Cold Clinic. The records matched year after year. There was a peak number of visits after each vacation period, with the biggest peak of all at the beginning of the school year when the weather was unusually good. There was almost exactly the same number of colds at opposite extremes of weather conditions—the hottest and coldest days, the wettest and driest, or days with the greatest and least ups and downs in temperature.

First Group Of Pickers Expected Here On Tue.

A press report from Sydney which appeared in the Charlottetown papers on Saturday in reference to the movement of potatoes pickers to Prince Edward Island was inaccurate, according to officials of the National Employment Office in Charlottetown.

The report stated that seventeen bus loads of pickers would arrive in the province over the week-end. No arrangements were made by either the Charlottetown or Summerside Employment Offices for any pickers to arrive during the period mentioned. The first group of pickers, four bus loads in all, will come to the Island by way of the Wood Island Ferries on Tuesday, October 1st. On Thursday October 3rd four more bus loads will cross to the Island by the same route. All of these pickers will go to growers in the Summerside Office area.

So far the Charlottetown office has been able to recruit locally all of the pickers needed in its area which comprises Kings and Queen's counties, Prince County where many farmers have large acreages under crop every year provides work for about eighty percent of the men imported. The Summerside

area will require more than the eight bus loads of men who will arrive during this week, and for the most of October the mainlanders will be arriving as they are needed.

After the Charlottetown Office has exhausted its list of local applicants it also will call on help from Nova Scotia points. The total number of workers to be brought in from outside points will probably total more than four hundred.

All of the arrangements for the potato movement are made through the close co-operation of the Regional Unemployment Insurance Commission Office in Moncton and the local offices in Summerside, Charlottetown, New Glasgow, Sydney, Sydney Mines and Inverness. Any available help in New Brunswick is needed, to lift the tuber crop in that province and in the state of Maine.

Blue Cross Joins APEC

Substantial increases in membership in Maritime Blue Cross-Blue Shield were reported to the mid-year meeting of the Maritime Hospital Services Association held last week in Moncton. Blue Cross participants rose last year to 355, 381, an increase of 12 per cent, while Blue Shield participants during the same period rose to 202, 517, an increase of 17.05 per cent. Maritime delegates were told. Recent amendments to the M.H.S.A. charter of incorporation were reviewed at this meeting, including where-by dental and nursing contracts can be made in P.E.I.

The Board also voted to become a member of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.

Experts Frown On Mass Flu Immunization

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A panel of medical experts has reached the conclusion that mass immunization against Asian influenza doesn't make sense.

The group met Friday night at the request of the San Francisco Medical Society to assess the status of the Asian type virus.

Among those on the panel were Dr. Karl F. Meyer, emeritus director of University of California's Hooper Foundation, and one of the world's foremost experts on epidemic diseases and Dr. Lowell Rantz, Stanford professor of medicine.

Dr. Rantz said: "If we were to give the vaccine to 1,000,000 persons across the board right now, we would have more deaths and illnesses from the vaccine than we have with the flu."

Dr. Donald M. Campbell, president of the medical society, commenting on the clamor for vaccine, said: "I'd say there is a good deal of hysteria or near-hysteria... I'm giving the vaccine only to relieve the near-hysteria."

In Washington, Dr. Car Dauer of the public health service indicated, he thinks some of the statements made in San Francisco are unfortunate. The health service has urged "maximum possible immunization" against Asian flu.

From the start, Dauer said, the public health service has found only one way to check the disease and protect individuals, "and that is by vaccination. Nothing else would stop it."

As for the statement by Dr. Rantz regarding vaccine deaths, Dr. Dauer said "I don't think the public health service would agree to such a statement as that."

Retired Baptist Minister Dies

LAWRENCETOWN, N.S. (CP)—Dr. Isaac Allen Corbett, a retired minister and one of the oldest members of the Maritime Baptist convention, died Friday night in this Annapolis Valley community, about 100 miles west of Halifax. He was 90.

His pastorates included Woodstock, Fredericton, Pokok and Hillsboro in New Brunswick, and Sydney, Paradise, Canso and Annapolis Royal in Nova Scotia. He was a native of Five Islands, N.S.
