WHAT IT COSTS TO RUN THE LIQUOR BUSINESS.

It is said that you can reach a man through his pocket quicker than any other way; but the astounding figures of the liquor traffic do not seem to have the same effect as in some other matters.

We talk of millions so flippantly that we have grown to imagine them unimportant.

This Dominion of ours counts its population by millions, but how small we appear beside the great population of Europe. Yet we have a traffic which counts its liquor business by millions, and we hardly wait to think what it means. A direct cost to the consumer of \$39,879,854 seems small by the side of the figures of the United States or Great Britain, but it is by no means small when we compare populations and add the indirect as well as the direct cost.

The net loss to the country is by no means insignificant when we look at the figures.

There are 13,000 men engaged in the liquor traffic in Canada, and it has been estimated that the labor of this army of men in productive labor would aggregate \$7,748,000 annually.

Statistics gathered from the majority report of the Royal Commission show as follows:

Amount paid for liquor by consumers.....\$ 39,879,854
Value of grain, etc. destroyed..... 1,888,765
Cost of proportion of pauperism, disease, insanity and crime, chargeable to the liquor traffic..... 3,014,097
Loss of productive labor..... 76,285,900
Loss through mortality caused by drink..... 14,304,000
Misdirected labor..... 7,748,000
Total.....\$ 143,122,716

But then on the other hand they tell us these are receipts, and it surely balances the account, if it does not give us a balance in favour of the liquor traffic. Let us see:—

REVENUES.
Dominion Government.....\$ 7,101,557
Provincial Governments..... 924,358
Municipalities..... 429,107
Total..... 8,455,022
Net loss..... 134,667,694

That's all; not much of a loss surely for the population of the whole Dominion; but what an increase of business there would be next year if this amount was in the hands of the spending class. The boot and shoe factories, cotton mills, furniture factories, flour mills, sugar refineries, tea establishments, and every conceivable business would be rushed day and night to supply the demand for those things which the thousands of drunkards and their families have not now, but would have if the money was in their hands, instead of in the hands of the brewers and rum sellers. There would be no danger about the revenue, but the Government would be so flush with money, we should soon have a reduction of rates and taxes, or a vast improvement in public works, better roads, better bridges and better everything. Don't let the rummies fool you into thinking you would not be better off. Let them see you cannot be fooled into voting away your own happiness, peace and money to support this body and soul destroying traffic.

WHEY.

We clip the following from the report of the Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying: Whey is a valuable feed for hogs. There are about 7 lbs. of solids in every 100 pounds; and that quantity of whey fed properly in combination with other feeds, should produce 2 lbs. of increase in live weight. Whey is a poor diet when fed alone, although hogs will live on it and gain in weight. Whey may be turned to lard, but it does not give good results, when fed alone. To young growing pigs it may be fed with profit on clover pasture. The use of a field in that way puts in a capital condition for the growth of a crop of Indian corn for fodder purposes the following year. Whey should be fed in a sweet and clean condition. A clean and comparatively sweet whey is wholesome, whereas a very sour whey is dangerous. Often its use is injurious to the swine. The whey tank at a cheese factory should be above ground; and for the sake of the value of the whey for the production of pork, the tank should be cleaned thoroughly at least once every week. Indian corn, ground or unground, should not be fed alone with whey. It is unprofitable in that combination, and results in the production of very fat bacon. A good mixture would be (a) one-third shorts, or bran, (b) one-third ground oats, pease, barley, wheat, mixed or single, and (c) one-third ground Indian corn. The best results from Indian corn are obtained when it is fed in combination with skim-milk, or buttermilk, which supply the flesh-forming materials in which the corn is deficient.

WILL PROHIBITION COME.

"No good voting for prohibition, it will never come." This is a worn out childish excuse for not voting. Upon what do you base your statement? Is it upon the assumption that the parliament of Canada will wilfully ignore the voice of the people, and that the people thus ignored will quickly allow themselves to be rat upon by their own representatives. If this is your opinion you misjudge both the politicians character and the temper of the people. To define the parliamentary character is to solve the problem. The Commons and the Senate of Canada are composed of either statesmen or politicians. The probabilities are that the politicians are in the majority. But this is immaterial. The statesmen will work for whatever will up-build his country and benefit or prosper the people. This insures his vote and support, every time, for prohibition. The politician, on the other hand, will vote and work every time for whatever will benefit himself and aid in securing his own seat and in furthering his own interests. If he represents liquor constituents he will vote liquor. If his people are on the side of temperance his selfishness must outweigh personal feelings and his vote will be recorded in the interest of the people to whom he must look for re-election. The electors of Canada hold the thumb-screw of parliament. Do you insult our people by the declaration that they will allow themselves to be overridden by parliament? Do you assume that the Parliament of Canada would dare to disobey the decisive mandate of the people? In the name of reason and common sense do not entertain this low estimate of your government, and try to cultivate a more ennobling opinion of the people. As true born citizens let us do our part. The result will be what we make it. If our vote for prohibition is a decisive one it will have the power of an imperative command from a people who will undertake to secure obedience and when the people have spoken with sufficient emphasis there is little doubt that prohibition will be granted and more cheerfully than many imagine. Then make the vote a rousing big one for a small vote will not bring prohibition and the people of Canada should shoulder the responsibility and not the governing power which opened to them the opportunity.


