

Flyers Defeat S'side Aces 4-2

Orin Pots First 3 Goals; Coach Allie Scores Fourth

The Parkdale Flyers defeated the Summerside Aces in a regular Island League fixture at Civic Stadium last night by the score of 4-2.

750 fans who had to wait about forty minutes for the game to start because of the late arrival of the Parkdale team and an ensuing argument as to what penalty should be imposed because of this delay. The Flyers said they would not play the game if a penalty were imposed and the penalty was finally waived.

Orin Carver scored the first three goals for the Flyers, and brother Allie added a fourth. Skip chipped in with a fine display of forechecking which disorganized many Ace rallies. Orin opened the scoring at the 6 minute mark when Allie swiped the puck from an Ace rearwardman, passed over to Orin whose fast shot beat Mann cleanly.

Orin sniped the second on an unassisted effort with the teams skating four men a side. It was a fairly long shot but lightning fast and caught the upper right corner. The period which ended 2-0 for the visitors was fairly rough, breaking into fistfights on two occasions. Cutcliffe and Orin Carver and Josey and Coker Grady being the participants.

The lone goal of the middle session was scored by Orin Carver while Ulric Gallant was sitting a major penalty for drawing blood from Kip Ready with a high stick. The goal was the result of a pretty three-way passing play. Skip Carver taking his time to put the puck on Orin's stick as he was coasting in from the left side.

The Aces made a spirited drive in the final frame, outscoring the Parkdale club 2-1 but never got closer than within two goals of the visitors total. Gallant battered one

in from directly in front of the cage at 5:53. Allie Carver got that one back four minutes later on a smart effort pushing a slow shot which tucked just inside the post with brother Orin doing decoy duty on the left wing. Gallant tipped in a Reeves' blast from the Flyer blue line for the final goal of the evening.

Ulric's two goals earned him the Holman "Most valuable player" award. Both Mann and Roper were sharp in their cages, Mann stopping 30 and Roper 25 shots, many of which on both sides were difficult to handle.
