

Etcheverry Passes Al's To 30-21 Win Over 'Cats

HAMILTON (CP)—Sam Etcheverry turned to Red O'Quinn as his main passing target to guide Montreal Alouettes to a 30-21 victory over Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the opening game of the Big Four football final Saturday.
