# IN THIS CORNER

Sydney Millionaires chances of gaining a play-off berth were further lessened last night with their loss to the Islanders. With 16 games left to play the Millionaires are ten points or five games out of a play-off berth. In order to make the grade the Mills will have to win about 12 or 13 of their remaining games. Playing coach Cliff Roach however has not given up hope.

"We're still the champions," said Roach last night, and if we have to go down like champions. He noted that the Millionaires were getting slimmer with each passing game but he added that they were not giving up the ship.

And Roach also has hopes that he may pick up two more points at the expense of the Islanders. He recalled that he had protested the use of Paul Saindon by the Islanders in a game which the Islanders won 4-1. If the C. A. H. A. ruled Saindon ineligible the Millionaires would automatically get the two points, he believes. Last night it was learned that the C. A. H. A. had ruled Saindon ineligible to play in the M. M. H. L. on the grounds that he did not come from a professional club. Saindon however, is still a professional although he did not play with Providence this season and it is likely that the Islanders will protest this latest ruling of the C. A. H. A.

Hard driving Wilf Field with a quick mind and quick tongue and a hatred of losing teams has been very much in the news during the past several days. First came the report out of Halifax that Field was offered the coaching job of the Buffalo Bisons and on its heels came the damaging report that Field had been having trouble with several of his players. Although he denied any knowledge of player-trouble there was evidence that such was the case when the capable Kenny MacKenzie left by plane for his Winnipeg home over the weekend.

The flare-up might possibly have been the result of the long 90-game schedule with its heavy demands on physical and nervous systems. At any rate there were signs during the past couple of weeks that things were not quite right at Halifax. The line of Dewey Thompson, Ken MacKenzie and Johnny Morrow, which had carried the mail for the Saints during the month of January, has scarcely been noted in the scoring summary. Even as long as three weeks ago there were reports that MacKenzie would be parting company with the Saints.

It was a coincidence that both reports should come out of Halifax at about the same time. Possibly the players brought the matter to a head in the hope that Field would take the Buffalo job. The opening was made for him by the suspension of Murph Chamberlain by the American Hockey League President. It would appear that Chamberlain is finished for the season in Buffalo and Art Chapman, the Buffalo Bisons' general manager, has always had a high regard for Field. If things should get any worse at Halifax Wilf might have a change of heart and take the Buffalo job.

For those who closely follow the point-scoring race among individual players in the Big Six, the report of secretary-treasurer Chris McAlden in Halifax over the weekend must have proved a surprise. In second place with 80 points was Moncton's Morrey Hamilton. The report stated that Hamilton had picked up 12 points during the week to leap-frog the Islanders Willie Marshall and the Miners "Bud" Poile. Secretary-treasurer McAlden's report always covers games from Saturday evening of one week until the Saturday morning of the next.

# Islanders Drop Sydney 4-2 To Take Second Place From Saints

For one minute at the start of the third period last night the Sydney Millionaires stubborn defences fell apart and the Charlottetown Islanders counted for two goals, which proved to be winning ones, as the Islanders dropped the Mills 4-2 and took over sole possession of second place in the M.M.H.L.

The Islanders hammered away at the Millionaires for the first forty minutes and the best they could do was score two goals while the visitors picked up one. In the second period alone the Islanders outshot the moneyman 10-1.

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Big Walter Pawlyshyn paced the Islanders drive last night by scoring two goals and assisting on another. Bruno Favero and Bullet Boy Gray were the other Islanders marksmen.

The breezy Frank Bathgate, a former swashbucker and still swashbuckling although wearing a blue and white uniform, scored Sydney's first goal. George Robertson fired their second on a one-man play early in the third period.

The score, however, far from told the story of the game. The Mills played it defensively all the while and were content to let the Islanders carry play to them. Play was ragged at times, especially in the second period when the Islanders kept the play in the Sydney end for the best part of the twenty minutes.

But the Millionaires tenacious checking came close to paying dividends. The Islanders went into a 10 lead early in the first period and the score remained that way throughout the rest of the session.

In the second stanza the poking-checking Sydney forwards and their defense kept blocking shots and spoiling plays although the Islanders swarmed around inside the Millionaires' blue-line. In the first 14 minutes of the period the Mills had one shot at Ray Frederick and that by big Dunc MacIntyre.

Play was late getting underway as referee Larry Heffering did not arrive on time. The game started with Pete Mill as referee and Jack Ready and Arnold MacCallum as linesmen. The boys did a good job and were relieved of the duties in the second stanza by Heffering.

Walt Pawlyshyn put the Islanders one goal ahead at the 2:27 mark of the initial period.

# Races To Top The Hambletonian

YONKERS, N. Y., Feb. 26 (AP)—William H. Cane, president of Yonkers Raceway and director of the famed Hambletonians announced today the establishment of two three-year-old futurities that may become the richest stakes in harness racing.

The twin futurities, for foals of 1952, will be raced at Yonkers at 1 1/16 miles starting in 1955. One is the Yonkers futurity for trotters, and the other the Empire futurity for pacers.

The Hambletonian, staged at Goshen, N. Y., each summer since 1930, was worth \$95,000 last year. The new Yonkers races may hit \$100,000 and more.

Under conditions the races, breeders will share in 10 per cent of the total purse. The Hambletonian and the Kentucky futurity now offer two per cent to breeders.

The first payment April 1 is \$10 to the nomination. A second payment of \$15 is due Dec. 1, 1952, with a \$200 payment Dec. 1, 1953, and \$250 on Dec. 1, 1954. The final payment is the starting fee for the race, either \$500 or \$1,000, depending on the total payments.

Yonkers Raceway will add a minimum of \$25,000 to each stake.

# Hunting And Fishing License Increase Is Discussed At Meeting

A proposed increase in resident hunting and fishing licenses was the subject of much discussion at the Fish and Game meeting held at the Vocational School last night. President E. K. MacNutt presided.

It was recommended by the committee that the present resident angling and hunting licenses which in the past have been presented to the public as a combined license, be issued in the future as two separate ones, and that the present rate of \$1.00 for the combined license, be changed to \$1.00 for hunting and the same amount be applied to the fishing license. It is estimated that an additional revenue of from \$2,000 to \$4,000 per annum will be received if this recommendation is approved. It will apply only to such residents of the Province as are now required by the Fish & Game Act to hold licenses.

The subject of non-resident fishing licenses was also broached with a resultant proposed increase from \$3.00 to \$5.00 for adults, while children under 16 years of age would be required to pay a \$1.00 fee.

**Limitations Suggested**

A proposed limitation on the number of hunters and dogs allowed in the field at one time was also discussed, with the committee arriving at the decision that in respect to farmers and farmhands, future hunting parties should be reduced to 3 hunters and one guide and with no more than two dogs in the field at one time.

It was also suggested that a committee be appointed to study the conservation program in schools throughout the Province, and that the executive of this committee draft out a program for the study of Conservation and Education in general, with regards to setting up a training program for the schools and various organizations.

Among the items discussed at last night's meeting were: issuance of badges to be worn in conjunction with licenses for both resident and non-resident sportsman, an increase of present non-resident hunting fees, and bag limits.

All of the proposed recommendations will first be submitted to other provincial branches of the Fish and Game Association for suggestions and approval, then will be channeled through to the Department of Industry and Natural Resources for their consideration and final approval before being put into effect.

# McLenahan To Join Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 26 (CP)—Frederick's Roly McLenahan, all-star rearguard in the American Hockey League last year, will join Sydney Millionaires of the Maritime Major Hockey League for a three-game tryout.

McLenahan, who was called up by Montreal Canadiens as an "insurance" rearguard for the playoffs last year, has been playing coach of Fredericton Capitals, busy defending Maritime Intermediate champions.

McLenahan was sought earlier in the season by a number of Maritime Major League clubs.

Although his status as an inter-mediate has not been cleared because of failure of Montreal Canadiens front office to clear him in time to register with Fredericton, the rough-going rearguard has been granted permission by C.A.H.A. secretary manager George Dudley to play three games with Millionaires.

Millionaires may also try to bring up veteran Tic Williams of Truro Maripages of the A. P. C. League for three games. Williams played with Sydney in 1939 and 1940, and has been scoring goals ever since in the APC circuit.
