There was agreement on a proposal by Secretary of State Christian Herter to work toward closer co-ordination of political, military, economic and scientific policies.

OSTLIER MORTGAGES Of more immediate concern to Canadians and their pocket-books was the announcement Thursday that the maximum interest rate on housing mortgages was increased to 6% from six per cent.

NATIONAL HOUSING ACT Mortgages of \$12,000 for 25 years now require monthly repayments of principal and interest of \$82.21. Previously, payments in that amount were \$76.78.

LOWDOWN URGED Canada may be trying to do too much too fast. James O'Byrne, governor of the Bank of Canada, said Monday that Canadians should borrow less from other countries and either use more to pay for the country's development or not attempt so much.

EISENHOWER'S WEEK President Eisenhower left Iran Monday for Tehran, capital of Iran, and Athens, in a speech to the Greek Parliament, he said his message could be summed up in three words: "Peace in freedom."

IN BRIEF John L. Lewis, who formed the Congress of Industrial Organizations in a great U.S. union drive in the 1930s, announced Tuesday he will resign shortly as president of the United Mine Workers after 40 years in the post.

A defective oil heater was blamed for a fire in St. John's, Nfld., Wednesday that took seven lives—including those of four children less than nine years old.

Archbishop Makarios was elected to be the first president of Cyprus when the island becomes an independent republic Feb. 19.

The United Nations ended its 1959 General Assembly Sunday. Canada helped promote a final compromise splitting a Security Council seat between Poland and Turkey for a year each.

Roger Touhy had 23 days of freedom. Released from prison after serving nearly 26 years of a kidnapping sentence, the Chicago prohibition-era gangster was shot down late Wednesday by unknown assassins.

THE MARITIMES WEEK There were new developments this week in a three-week-old murder investigation at New Glasgow.

RCMP Thursday formally charged Thomas Urquhart of

New Glasgow, a 31-year-old unemployed laborer, with the Nov. 24 slaying of Joseph Wood of Stellarton, N.S.

Wood was found dead Nov. 25 in a New Glasgow sheet metal plant. Police said he had been shot. He had apparently been cleaning the plant when he died.

Problems in the coal industry returned to the news with the first open squabble between the miners' union and Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation. The union wanted a fact-finding committee—set up to study the province's coal troubles—supplied with the per-ton cost of coal production. Dosco refused. Both sides issued a series of statements, and the rift was reliably reported to have government and industry officials concerned.

Ships continued to have their troubles. The jinxed freighter Georgios A, with five writs tacked to its mast, ran aground in Sydney harbor for the second time. The vessel is tied up in Sydney by court action against her owners.

The 14,000-ton Liberian tanker Sweet Maria limped into Halifax Thursday with a 10-foot hole in her side, suffered in collision with an unidentified object—presumed to be a derelict—off the Nova Scotia south coast.
