Preliminary Hearing Underway In Evelyn MacDonald Murder

Clarence Perry, 17, of Fortune Cove appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queens County Court yesterday on a charge of capital murder in the death of Mrs. Everett (Evelyn) MacDonald of this town and Shamrock. He was remanded to Queens County jail until Thursday morning to complete the evidence.

The youth was previously charged with the murder of Everett MacDonald and was bound over until the fall session of Supreme Court for trial.

The court agreed that evidence taken in the preliminary hearing of the accused on a charge of murder in the death of Mrs. MacDonald be accepted as evidence in the case of Mrs. MacDonald.

Those sworn in during the morning session but did not testify were Judy Ann MacDonald, Eugene Perry, Helen Ramsay, Earl Chester Coughlin, Donald Gillis and George Coughlin.

SEVEN WITNESSES

Seven witnesses were heard in the morning session. Leigh Russell Coughlin, Fortune Cove, testified that he, James Perry and Clarence Perry went to O'Leary in a 1961 model car driven by the accused. He said they later picked up Helen Ramsay and Judy MacDonald in Alberton that night.

Bruce MacKenzie, Baltic, brother-in-law of the late Everett MacDonald who was present at the Charlottetown Hospital to identify the body of Mrs. MacDonald, said he had known the deceased (Mrs. MacDonald) "all my life."

RCMP Constable W. H. Smith identified the photographs taken by himself at the farm of Everett MacDonald.

The courtroom was cleared of the public, with the exception of the accused's parents, to hear evidence of RCMP constables G. J. Taylor and L. D. Rockwell, Fredericton, N.B., corporals C. A. Bungay and Robert Williams of the RCMP detachment, Charlottetown.

When questioned on the rumor Mr. Wood stated "we are always interested in expansion like any other company and we have thought of this since settling in Ker-ington."

"At this point," he added, "we have no definite plans."

Questioned further on a rumor that he had purchased the Aiden MacLaren farm at Brudenell with the idea of setting up a fertilizer plant, Mr. Wood stated "There is no truth in it. My brother purchased the farm strictly for farming."

"Furthermore," he said, "it is completely out of the question because it is too far away from the railway and we have to be near rails."
