ONE case of drunkenness at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon.

THE City Small Debt Court met this forenoon. Over thirty cases on the docket.

THE mails left Cape Traverse at noon today. They will arrive to-night.

HON. JOHN LEFROY and Neil McKelvie, Esq., of Summerside, are in the city.

REMEMBER the debate on the abolition of the Senate, in Y. M. C. A. Hall this evening.

THE annual meeting of the shareholders of the Merchants' Bank of P. E. Island will be held to-morrow.

A BARBER was fined in Ontario, under the Lord's Day Act, for shaving customers on Sunday. The case was appealed and conviction confirmed by the Ontario Bench.

AMONG the items in the Supplementary Estimates is the following:—'Removal of ex-Lieut. Governor Laird from Battleford to Charlottetown, \$1,524.

THE regular monthly meeting of Port la Joie Encampment, will be held at Old Fellows' Hall, this evening, at eight o'clock. A full and punctual attendance is requested.

THE estimates of expenditure on the P. E. Island Railway, for the coming year, is \$190,000, an increase of \$1,000. The increase is for locomotive power, train expenses, and maintenance.

A GENTLEMAN from Flat River reports having seen the 'Northern Light' yesterday afternoon, half way between Picton Island and Cape Bear. She had steam up, and was heading about south-east.

HON. MR. WURTLE, the Montreal director of the Credit Foncier Franco-Canadienne, announces that the directors in Paris have written to say that the enterprise in Montreal will be supplied with all the capital it requires or can lend out profitably.

THE Toronto Globe says:—Young Probs. didn't do as well as usual last month, being wrong fourteen times out of every hundred in the Lake Region. In the Maritime Provinces, however, ninety six per cent. of his predictions were fully or partly verified.

NEARLY A FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Friday last as the Western train was leaving Summerside, Mr. John T. McNally, Sectionman, while helping to clean the snow off the plough nearly met with a fatal accident. Being working close to the plough, in front, and not hearing the usual signal for starting the engine, Mr. McNally was struck by the plough which passed over his ankle and leg and dragged him a considerable distance before he got out of his perilous situation. His injuries we hear are not severe though he will be laid up for some time. Those in charge of trains should be very careful not to start them without sufficient warning to men working on the track in front of the engines.—Summerside Progress.

Personal.

GETAWAY is expected in England in May. The London Lancet says that there is absolute unanimity among medical men, whatever their other views on the drink question, that spirits, wine, or beer should only be taken with food.

GENERAL GEORGE McDONALD is called the 'father' of the English army. He is in his 98th year, and entered the service in 1805. He fought in the war of 1812, and was three times wounded at Waterloo. Admiral Robt. Leney, of the British navy, entered the service in 1797.

THE journal which Mr. Carlyle kept of his tour in Ireland in 1849, and which will see the light during the present year, had long been unknown to many of his friends. Mr. Froude is said never to have heard of it until recently. It is an autograph, and was given by Carlyle to a friend who, like him, is now dead. Mr. Froude, when the manuscript came into his hands a short time ago, was deeply impressed by it, and will write an introduction for it in the book form. It opens with a description of going on board a steamer in the Thames, bound for Dublin, one of his companions being the present British Secretary for Ireland, and is said to be written in the author's raciest style.

It is a fundamental maxim of the foreign policy of the English Liberals that Russia can do no wrong. Sir Charles Dike stated in the Imperial House of Commons yesterday that he had no reason to fear an outbreak of hostilities between Russia and the German powers, and that he did not believe that Russian officers were serving with the Herzegovinian insurgents. If we mistake not we have heard that story before. It was a Liberal Ministry that did not believe the tales of Russian atrocities in the Caucasus; but they occurred nevertheless. The next thing will be that Pan Slavism is a myth, and that there is no such person as General Skrobloff.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE BUDGET DEBATE.

SIR CHARLES SPEAKS

SIR RICHARD RECEIVES A CASTIGATION.

OTTAWA, March 1. Sir Charles Tupper, Minister of Railway, resumed the debate on the Budget yesterday. He spoke five hours to a crowded house and thronged galleries. He reviewed the trade policy of the country since confederation, and in eloquent terms clearly showed the wonderful success of the National Policy. He dissected Sir Richard Cartwright's speech, and replied to his insult to Sir Leonard Tilly in a manner never before heard in the Canadian Parliament. Sir Richard Cartwright's plight in this instance was a pitiable one. No public man ever before received such a castigation in the House of Commons. Sir Charles dwelt at length on the bounty to fishermen, which Sir Richard whined over and deplored; and said that the reason no bounty was granted to lumbermen and farmers was because they did not need it. Edward Hackett, Esq., M. P., has been appointed a member of the committee to investigate the result of the National Policy to farmers.

GENERAL NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 28. Ten Nihilist prisoners, including one woman, who have been on trial for some days past, on various charges, have been sentenced to death. They are the remainder of twenty-one prisoners, sentenced to various terms of penal servitude.

ATHENS, Feb. 28. The Chamber of Deputies, in spite of the Government's recommendation, has invalidated the election on the Island of Milo, by a vote of 112 to 95. This is the first trial of strength between the Government's supporters and the Opposition in the House.

VIENNA, Feb. 28. In the skirmishes with insurgents in Herzegovina, since the 16th inst., the Austrians have lost 116 killed and wounded, including 100 officers.

QUEENSTOWN, Feb. 28. The steamer 'City of New York' was signalled off Brow Head this evening.

LONDON, Feb. 28. A Cairo despatch says the reports that the Ministry consider the existence of slavery necessary for the Egyptian people, are unfounded.

In the House of Commons this afternoon, Sir Henry James, Attorney General, moved a resolution, declaring void the election of Michael Davitt to fill the vacancy for Meath, caused by the resignation of A. M. Sullivan.

Mr. Joseph Cowan, Radical member for Newcastle-on-Tyne, moved, as an amendment to the above, an address to the Queen, praying that in view of the arrest of, and subsequent return of Davitt to Parliament, that free pardon be granted to him.

It was ruled that Cowan could not offer a motion as an amendment to the resolution of Sir Henry James, but must give notice of such a motion.

After division Sir Henry James pointed out that the Government would not move for a new writ; but would allow time for Egan to claim the seat.

The resolution of Sir Henry James was carried by a vote of 208 to 20.

Mr. Cowan gave notice that he would introduce a motion in accordance with the terms of the motion offered by him to-day.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Feb. 28. The barque 'John Black,' of this place, which arrived at St. John this morning from Great Britain, after a voyage of 90 days, reports that during the passage Whitney Bell, of Sackville, was drowned, a British sailor died, Beatty, of Sackville, had an ankle dislocated, and John Sears, of Sackville, had both legs broken.

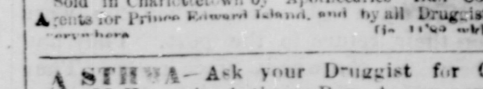
