Gardiner Is Challenged

OTTAWA (CP) — Agriculture Minister Gardiner was challenged Monday to disprove charges of "shillidugery" and "misappropriation of federal funds" in connection with a \$100,000 payment last year to an Alberta sheep breeder.

The challenge was issued in the Commons by E. G. McCullough (CCF—Moose Mountain) who referred to federal compensation paid to F. J. Rock of Drumheller, Alta., after his flock was ordered destroyed when it became infected with scrapie.

Mr. McCullough, who described Mr. Rock as "a big Liberal supporter in Alberta," said there are many "rumors" about the deal, including one that part of the flock of 674 sheep was not slaughtered but was sent to a Manitoba sheep ranch.

Speaking during the budget debate, Mr. McCullough called on Mr. Gardiner, not in the Commons at the time, to appoint a special House committee to investigate the whole deal.

He challenged Mr. Gardiner to table in the House certificates of slaughter for all 674 sheep said to have been infected by the nerve-killing disease.

LONDON (AP) — Dr. Edith Summerskill, physician and Labor MP, charged in the House of Commons Monday that people are being harmed by the radiation of television sets given off by television sets.

Health Minister Dennis Vosper told her a panel of experts had been set up to study the effects of such radiation. He noted a report by the government's radioactive substances advisory committee which he said showed that television sets do not constitute a personal or significant genetic hazard.

Dr. Summerskill reported: "People are receiving minute doses every day... I say it is wrong to allow innocent and ignorant people to suffer in this way. These people include expectant mothers and small children."

Vosper said the panel would consider a recommendation by the medical research council that the radiation from television sets be reduced as far as possible.

Mayflower Is Cheered

BRIXHAM, Eng. (Reuters)—Most of the population of this cliff-side Devon port turned out Monday night to cheer the Mayflower II as it floated from drydock into the harbor.

The full rigged sailing vessel, launched 27 weeks ago and fitted out in drydock, is a full-sized replica of the Pilgrim Fathers' ships. The sturdy craft, a gift from Britain to the American people, will go through stability trials here later this week.

It is expected to sail April 15 for Plymouth, Mass., repeating the 1620 Atlantic crossing. The voyage will take from four to six weeks.

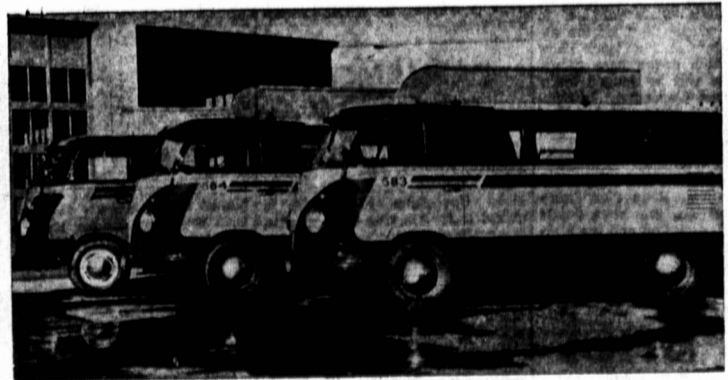
