Notes and Comments.

Farmers living in the vicinity of Milverton, Ontario, were a few days ago paid \$16,000 for fat cattle to be sent to the British market. The cattle made up twelve carloads. They were brought to market to be shipped. Why cannot we, living thousands of miles nearer Great Britain and having shipping ports of our own, obtain some of the trade by which the Milverton farmers prosper.

The Empire remarks that if, as is rumored, the Quebec Government intends to make up the deficit in the revenue by a tax on real estate and one on mortgages, stocks and bonds, it shows a courage and honesty in grappling with a difficult situation which will strengthen the DeBoucherville Ministry in public estimation. No direct taxes would be popular, but the determination of the Government to look to provincial resources for re-establishing financial equilibrium is beneficial to the whole Dominion. The finances are in excellent hands with Hon. Mr. Hall as treasurer, and whatever form the tax takes the business community will feel confident that the public funds will be properly looked after.

Prof. Thwing, in the current North American Review, argues that "not too long is vacation for the doctor, lawyer, editor, bookkeeper, clerk, seamstress, or candlestick maker. Those precious two weeks which are the standard period of annual rest for many hard workers are altogether too short. But the thirteen weeks which represent the normal summer vacation in college and school are long, altogether too long, for student and teacher." A contemporary anticipates that the teachers and professors will be up in arms at this doctrine. They will naturally refuse to admit that the present vacation is not needed for their intellectual good. If the charge be true that the student wastes the time allowed him it rather reflects upon the system which is supposed to be educating him, but which, from Prof. Thwing's testimony, seems only to keep him going like a machine during college term. In that case it would be the college, and not the vacation, that would need an overhauling.

A good story is being told at the expense of one of the messengers of the House of Commons. A few evenings ago Mr. Spenser White was entertaining a few friends in his apartments in the Commons building, when a game of whist was proposed. The speaker discovered that he had run short of playing cards, and summoning a messenger, instructed him to go to the Rideau club and get two packs of cards, giving an order for the same, and in his excess of zeal jumped into a hack and started for Rideau hall. On arriving there he announced that he was the bearer of a message from the speaker, and His Excellency, who was then at dinner, immediately informed that an important communication from Speaker White had arrived. Lord Stanley at once gave the messenger an audience and the latter gravely handed over his order for the two packs of cards. Of course His Excellency saw the joke at once, and with a corresponding seriousness of demeanor sealed up two packs of cards and delivered them to the messenger, telling him to present them with his compliments to the speaker. Needless to say the blunder has caused considerable hilarity in town.

OTTAWA LETTER
Some Interesting Items.

(Special correspondence of The Examiner.)

A correspondent of the Glasgow Herald says that "since the repeal of the Scott Act in Prince Edward Island the sobriety and morality of the place has become immensely improved. This tallies with experience in other parts of Canada, where the Scott Act was tried and found to be as great a failure as the Maine law in the United States. The Scott Act is a most atrocious measure, and it is surprising that any free people should ever have been left so far to themselves as to adopt it. Its effect, wherever it was tried, has been to encourage the vulgar informer, to foster mendacity, and to lower the moral tone of the people subjected to its influence.

Some well meaning but misguided people would introduce the principles of the Scott Act into Great Britain. Before that is done it might be well to appoint a commission to visit Prince Edward Island for the purpose of reporting.

On Saturday I observed a paragraph in one of the papers to the effect that—

Many of your readers will remember Faughnan, who, seven or eight years ago, was selling in Charlottetown his book, "The Life of a British Soldier." Faughnan was a great talker, and I well remember the "careful" he gave me the first time I met him. Up to mischief, I got hold of Sergeant Allan and told him what a wonderful man Faughnan was. Allan had not seen him, and as my description of the hero was perhaps a little too glowing to be natural, Allan dropped a few doubts as to the genuineness of Faughnan. One market day, a fine morning in summer, with the windows all open, I got them in an office on Main Street. You know that Sergeant Allan talks pretty loud—well, Faughnan talked loud, too. Allan, who still had his doubts, and would have been well pleased to expose an impostor, put three or four questions to Faughnan, every one of which Faughnan answered correctly. Allan was more than satisfied, he was delighted. They shook hands. I am not sure that they did not kiss each other; and then they compared their talk long and furiously—they both talked at the same time, while I was expecting the police to come in to enquire what the row was. Finally they talked themselves hoarse, and I have an idea they went away to get a drink, and that is the last I saw of them. I cannot remember the exact questions Allan put to Faughnan. The test was upon the position of Faughnan's regiment in some engagement in which both the old soldiers participated. Mr. J. R. Booth, of Ottawa, is credited with having just now the most timber float of any individual since lumbering began in the Ottawa Valley. Counting last year's and this year's out, he has 1,000,000 pieces now in the water. One of the largest rafts ever floated out of Ottawa left here a few days ago, owned by Robert Booth. It contains 230 ribs and is of the cut of 1889-90 and 1890-91, the average size being 60 feet. The timber was hung up last year and the year before, because prices were so low. Things look brighter this year, and the whole mass of timber was sold at a good price before it left the boom. It is in charge of an Indian pilot, and nearly all the crew are Indians from Caughnawaga. Four more rafts are now on their way down from the Upper Ottawa. All have been sold at good prices, and it is on its way to Quebec for shipment to England.

A large export of horses is going on this season from Montreal to the Old Country. Dealers predict that Canada will send 4000 horses across the Atlantic this season against 1900 last year.

The Markets.

THE situation in respect to oats and potatoes is practically unchanged. Both are moving very slowly—oats at 32 cents per bushel and potatoes at 18 cents. In Chicago oats are quoted at 31½ cents and in Toronto at 32½ to 33 cents. In Montreal as high as 34 cents have been paid. Sympathizing with a weakened demand in Boston, caused by larger receipts from the Western States, eggs here are reported dull at 9 cents per dozen, with the prospect of a still lower price on account of the approaching hot weather, which will, it is feared, necessitate a falling off in the shipments to England. Yesterday one of our local firms shipped for Liverpool by the Fastnet fifty large cases of eggs containing six thousand dozens and other large lots are being forwarded by other dealers.

It is unfortunate that England does not govern the price of eggs, and that refrigerator compartments for eggs have not yet been fitted in the steamers. The Montreal Gazette remarks: "Under heavy receipts and only a fair demand the egg market continues very weak and prices ruled easier to-day at 10 cents to 12 cents. Packers are busy pickling, but find it impossible to keep their store cleared up."

The Norwegian steamer Wergeland arrived at Chicago on Thursday morning last. She was the first steam-vessel to make the voyage from Norway to the Windy City and there was quite a celebration in honor of the event. The Wergeland left Stavanger on April 12. She arrived at Sydney, N. S., on May 4 and called at Montreal four days later. Drawing 14 feet of water when loaded, part of her cargo had to be transported by lighters to Kingston. There was no trouble at the Welland Canal. The voyage was in some respects an experiment and it is reported a successful one.

**World's Columbian Exposition,
Chicago, 1893.**

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has accepted the invitation of the Government of the United States to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in Chicago from 1st May to 31st October, 1893. As it is important that a very full display of Canadian products be made on that occasion, a general invitation is extended to Canadian producers and manufacturers in agriculture, horticulture, geology, forestry, fisheries, minerals, machinery, manufactures, arts, etc., to assist in bringing together such a display of the natural resources and industrial products of Canada as will be a credit to the country.

An Executive Commissioner for Canada has been appointed, who will have the general charge of the exhibits and the allotment of space, and the several Provincial Governments have been invited to cooperate with a view of making the exhibits as complete and satisfactory as possible.

The Dominion Government will pay the transport of exhibits going and returning, and for the cleaning of articles sent.

Entries must be made not later than 31st July. The reception of articles at the Exhibition building will commence 1st November, 1892, and all exhibits, except live stock, must be in place by 1st April, 1893.
