England's Ultimatum Respecting Egypt

LONDON, Dec 23. The Cairo correspondent of the Observer says the British Government has informed the Egyptian Government that it will not attempt to re-conquer the Sudan nor will it permit Egypt to make the attempt either.

Craig's Doings.

MONTREAL, Dec. 22. The financial troubles of the manufacturing companies, fed by the absent president of the Exchange Bank, out of the funds of that institution, are the chief topics of conversation here.

Earthquake at Lisbon.

LISBON, Dec. 23. The first earthquake shock of Saturday occurred at 1.30 a. m., but was not generally noticed. A strange shock occurred at 3.30 a. m., and lasted twelve seconds, being accompanied by heavy rumblings, which awoke the entire population of the city.

Trial of Anarchists.

PARIS, Dec. 22. The anarchists who were arrested for advertising and promoting the projected meeting in front of the Bourse, on Friday, 7th instant, and other anarchists who were indicted for manufacturing explosives here, were tried, convicted, and variously sentenced to terms of imprisonment varying from one week to six months.

A Scandal Rumored.

L'Etendard says Mr. Charlebois told several persons that he gave the Prime Minister of Quebec \$5,000 in connection with the contract for the Parliament building. The same paper states that it has most positive information to the effect that Wurtelo, Provincial Treasurer, resigned his portfolio on Tuesday last, and that this action was precipitated by the exposure of Charlebois' De Beaufort scandal.

Vessel Ashore.

BOSTON, Dec. 23. It is thought that the schooner "August A. M. Smith," of Lockport, N. S., which went ashore off Little Nahant, yesterday, can be taken off by a tug with but little damage. The vessel left Murray Harbor, P. E. I., Dec. 3rd. There will be a loss on the cargo which consists of 3,600 bushels of potatoes.

France and China.

PARIS, Dec. 22. France is not disposed to negotiate any further with China before the occupation of Bac Ninh by French troops. The *Gazette* states that Sir Charles Dilke is about to visit the continent to moot the question of the Powers of Europe between France and China.

Steamer Ashore.

GLASGOW, Dec. 23. The Anchor Line steamer "Bolivia," from Glasgow for New York, has gone ashore at Wemyss, on the Clyde, and has filled with water. Her passengers took to boats, which remained alongside the vessel for several hours in bad weather.

Killed by a Boiler Explosion.

BRADFORD, Pa., Dec. 23. George D. Westerville, and William Mc-Norton, the former a prominent oil operator, were killed to-day by a boiler explosion, at a well near Allentown, Alleghany County, New York.

A Denial.

LONDON, Dec. 23. A correspondent of Reuters telegram company at Cairo denies that England is willing to despatch a fleet to Alexandria or permit the sending of an expedition to the Sudan by another power.

Strike of Coal Miners.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 23. The strike of coal miners of the third pool is being pushed, and only two mines are now working at the reduction, and it is expected the men will come out of them before forty-eight hours.

Suffering Jews.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 23. The Jewish Schools and Synagogue in G. Jaba, a suburb, of this city, were destroyed by fire this morning. Fifteen students were burned to death.

Town Burned.

NACHESVILLE, TEXAS, Dec. 23. The entire business part of this town has been burned.

Wants to go Home.

LONDON, Dec. 22. The Times understands that Sir Evelyn Baring, the British representative at Cairo, has telegraphed that he desires to come to England to consult with the Government concerning Egyptian affairs.

OTTAWA, Dec. 23. A proclamation is published ordering an election under, and in accordance with the prayer of petitioners, for the purpose of repealing the act in Prince County, P. E. Island. The three years term of the Act being more than up.
