TUESDAY

Mr. Foch MacDonald, Souris, was elected president of the P.E.I. Command and Canadian Legion, B.E. S.L., at the 23rd annual convention held yesterday at Georgetown under the auspices of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. Thirty-nine delegates were present representing the 24 branches in the Province. The total number attending the convention was approximately two hundred.

The report submitted by president Earl G. Cannon of Summerside indicated that the increase of membership this year over last year was considerable with the present membership standing at over 1,800. Mr. Cannon stated that the Legion in the Province was in a healthy condition, and that the work of promoting the Legion must continue. Since some areas were not yet fully covered, he felt that new branches should be organized, or the areas of present branches extended. Not only were the branches important, he said, but also the zone areas, which were designed to consider and dispose of problems in that area, and also to promote the work of the Legion on a wider scale.

Dr. J. K. L. Irwin of Charlottetown was elected President of the P.E.I. Medical Association at the closing session of a two-day annual meeting which terminated on Saturday. The business sessions were held in the auditorium of Prince of Wales College.

Other officers elected were: 1st vice president, Dr. John Downing, Summerside; 2nd vice president, Dr. J. H. Maloney, Charlottetown; secretary, Dr. T. A. Laidlaw, Charlottetown; treasurer, Dr. R. G. Lea, Charlottetown. Members of the executive elected were: Dr. George Dewar for Prince County (O'Leary); Dr. C. A. Coady, Queens (Charlottetown); Dr. George Inman, King's (Montague).

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan was elected to represent the P. E. I. Medical Association on the executive of the Canadian Medical Association with Dr. J. A. MacMillan as alternate.

WEDNESDAY

A grand total of 2,506 pupils were enrolled in the combined city schools yesterday, as compared with 2,436 last year, or an increase of seventy. Indications are that this total will be increased by 30 before all enrollments are recorded.

Following are the enrollments by schools for last year figures in parentheses; Queen Charlotte High 420 (NI), Rochford Square 560 (554), Queen Square 731 (725), West Kent 390 (545) Prince Street including 41 in Kindergarten, 415 (612) West Kent including 42 in Kindergarten 380 (545), West Kent Kindergarten will not be opened until later this month.

The number of Normal Training students registering at Prince of Wales College yesterday was 42, a drop of 20 over the previous year. It is pointed out that since the regulation calling for junior matriculation went into effect last year a great many of the students anticipating the teacher training course will remain in their home school to qualify in this respect before coming for the Normal Training Course at P.W.C. It can be assumed therefore that the number enrolling in this class will be up considerably next year.

The task of providing accommodation for some 575 delegates of the 18th General Council of the United Church of Canada which meets at Sackville, N.B., next week is a large one for the planning committee and the preparations required to move this large body of people to Prince Edward Island on the afternoon of the 18th has fallen largely to Mr. Sydney T. Green, Charlottetown, who is the Island member of that committee.

A strong physical education program makes for a strong Y.M.C.A. and offers one of the best possible mediums for character building and Christian educational activities with youth according to Wesley McVicar, Y.M.C.A. 'Pupils come to school to prepare their minds for life' Dr. Frank MacKinnon yesterday at the afternoon session of the Charlottetown Rural Teacher's Fall Convention being held at the Prince of Wales College auditorium. 'The period of years in which pupils learn easily is limited and a proportion of this time belongs to the school, the rest to the home and other outside influences,' continued Dr. MacKinnon.

In his address Principal MacKinnon also warned teachers against automatic grading, negligence in correction of faults and careless work, and over emphasis of the basic subjects such as English, Mathematics and History. He further stated that, 'It is the duty of the teacher to help children educate themselves.'
