4th Prince Liberals Name Candidates At Be'deque

BEDEQUE — Hon. J. George MacKay, provincial minister of highways and public works, and C. C. Baker, veteran of seven consecutive nominations, and a one-time minister of agriculture, were unanimously re-nominated as Liberal Party candidates at a convention in Central Be'deque last evening. They will represent the Fourth District of Prince County in the September 1 provincial election.

The nomination of Mr. MacKay as Assemblyman candidate was moved by Robert Carruthers and seconded by Aden Mulligan, while Mr. Baker was nominated as Councillor candidate by Frank Jardine, and seconded by Raymond Smith.

Mr. MacKay has been a member of the provincial government for the past ten years, and has been minister of highways for about half of that period. Mr. Baker last evening received his seventh provincial nomination in Central Be'deque Hall, which was unable to seat all of the large attendance of men and women attending the convention.

Dr. Roy Grant, president of the East Prince Liberal Association, presided at the meeting, and described the benefits of the provincial hospitalization plan as the greatest ever placed before any province.

Following brief acceptance speeches by the candidates, remarks were made by Premier A. W. Matheron, Hon. Eugene Cullen, J. Watson MacNaught, Aden Mulligan, T. J. Inman, James McCardle, the latter known widely as Prince Edward Island's "Grand Old Man of Liberalism", who recalls casting his first vote 63 years ago, in 1896.

Hon. Mr. Cullen, minister of agriculture, outlined the benefits of the Liberal agricultural program in P. E. I. and its relationship to changes in farming methods, machinery, and markets, and reported that present Liberal plans would result in continuing agricultural progress.

While the Conservative leader had been critical of the provincial deficit, his promises meant that he would have to further increase this debt, the premier said.

Mr. Matheron announced that a commission had been set up to study the problem of school financing, and that he could not make any promises in this regard until the report is received from the commission.
