The M. V. Savoy will sail today from Georgetown for Chandler, Nfld., with a cargo of pulp. She arrived in Georgetown Friday morning from Corner Brook, Nfld. She will carry a deck load of 210 cords. The M. V. Savoy is a steel vessel of 196 tons registry at Quebec City. Her captain is Mr. P. E. Ruel. Her cargo is being supplied by a group of eastern and central King's County businessmen who have a pulp yard situated at Georgetown. The M. V. Savoy is one of a number of ships expected to carry pulp wood from Georgetown this summer.

Clan Chieftain Visits Clansmen In Canada



A white-haired, 73-year-old grandmother, Chief Flora MacLeod, first woman chieftain in the 80-year history of the MacLeod clan, journeyed from Scotland to Canada to visit members of her world-wide family in Canada. Chief Flora will attend gatherings of the MacLeod clan at Dunvegan, Ont.; St. Ann's, N. S., and Charlottetown, P. E. I., before returning to her Dunvegan castle at the Isle of Skye. Mrs. MacLeod regards all MacLeods as her children, but is indifferent about the spelling of the family name. "You can spell it MacLeod or McLeod, but we're all the same family," said the clan chieftain.

She arrived in Montreal on July 28 aboard a Trans-Canada Air Lines' North Star plane. She was greeted on arrival by skirling bagpipers and a large representation of MacLeods from Dalkeith, Ont. She was accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. J. Wolrige-Gordon, and her twin grandsons, John MacLeod of MacLeod, the oldest twin by 40 minutes and heir to the clan chieftainship, and Patrick Wolrige-Gordon. SUMMER WARNING

- 1.—KILL FLIES. Screen windows, doors and outside toilets. Use fly sprays around house and barns. Protect food, dishes and cooking utensils from flies and insects. Keep garbage and waste covered. FLIES ARE CARRIERS OF DISEASE—perhaps of polio (infantile paralysis).
- 2.—USE SAFE MILK and WATER. Milk should be pasteurized or boiled.
- 3.—WASH FRESH FRUITS and NEW VEGETABLES before eating.
- 4.—KEEP OUT OF CROWDS—Stay away from persons with nose and throat infections.
- 5.—AVOID GETTING OVERTIRED—Too strenuous play, long swimming periods, late hours cause fatigue. Extreme fatigue makes an individual more susceptible to polio infection.
- 6.—AVOID CHILLING — Don't stay too long in cold water or play too long in wet bathing suits. Don't swim in polluted waters.
- 7.—KEEP CLEAN — Especially keep hands clean. Wash hands before eating and after going to toilet.
