SAVAGES LED BY DESERTERS FROM CIVILIZATION.

That highly civilized men should desert their kind, join savage races and actually fight against their own countrymen seems almost incredible. Yet there are many instances of the kind, and in nine cases out of ten these deserters from civilization adopt all the worst traits of the people they join, and often surpass them in cruelty and cunning.

In Cochin China, where the French have been for nearly twenty years being carried on a relentless warfare against the blood-thirsty pirates who infest the coasts, and especially the great rivers, the naval and military forces every now again discover that the pirate chiefs whom they succeed in capturing are Europeans. One of these men had deserted from the French army, and says Answers, had become one of the principal lieutenants of the black flag or pirate force of the dreaded chief and mandarin Do Tich.

In the Soudan the Khalifa had a large number of Europeans under his orders, including the former Prussian sergeant of artillery Koltz, and a former Australian officer who bears the name of Inger; while his principle lieutenant, the celebrated Osman Digna, was the son of a French shopkeeper, was born in Rouen, and baptized in the magnificent cathedral of that ancient capital of Normandy.

Quite a number of other Frenchmen endeavored to join the dervishes in the Soudan to fight against the English and the Marquis de Moers, married to the daughter of Louis Hoffman banker, of New York, lost his life while on his way to Khartoum for the purpose of placing his services at the disposal of the Khalifa.

Another case is that of Oliver Pain, one of the most prominent leaders of the French commune in 1871. He was condemned to death for his participation in the insurrection, but his sentence was subsequently commuted to penal servitude for life in New Caledonia. He succeeded in effecting his escape, made his way to Europe and then to Khartoum, and offered his services to the Mahdi. For many years he was in high favor with the Prophet, but finally incurred his displeasure, and was buried alive.

Both in Egypt and Turkey there are quite a number of pachas who are nothing more nor less than deserters from civilized countries. Thus Omar Pacha was an Austrian by birth, and served in the Austrian army under the name of Mikail von Lottas.

Old Cherif Pacha, who was on numerous occasions Prime Minister of Egypt, was a son of that French General De Selves who reorganized the army of Mehemet Ali on a European footing, and embraced Mohammedanism with the object of increasing his influence over his troops. One of the most interesting renegades of this kind was old Sefer Pacha, whose real name was Count Koscielky, and who, while holding the rank of lieutenant colonel

in the Prussian army, had the misfortune to kill in a duel his commanding officer, Count Cleist.

This led him to expatriate himself, and, joining the Turkish army, he distinguished himself in the Crimean war as a member of the staff of the Turkish Commander-in-Chief, Omar Pacha. Subsequently the Count, who had meanwhile become a convert to Mohammedanism, under the name of Sefer Pacha, transferred his services to Khedive Ismail, of Egypt.

Then there is Mehemet Ali Pacha, who, after taking a leading part in last Turko-Russian war, was sent by the Sultan as one of the Ottoman plenipotentiaries to the Berlin Congress of 1878. He narrowly escaped being arrested on that occasion by the Prussian military authorities as a deserter, having at one time held a commission as a lieutenant in the Third regiment of Foot Guards.

During the last war between England and the great Matabele tribe under King Lobengula, the latter owed much to advice and assistance of an American of the name of Whittaker, a former sergeant of the United States artillery.

FRANCE AND ENGLAND.

The talk of war with France—for what reason no one seems to know—continues to creep into the columns of the most conservative English newspapers. England, the Englishman says, desires no war with France, but the republic is preparing to invade England.

On the other hand, you go to Paris and the Frenchman tells you that he does not want to go to war with England, but England is preparing to invade France.

Not only do the newspapers publish long accounts of the preparations for war by France, but the English reviews continue to print striking articles of the forthcoming contest under the heading of French preparation.

The Pall Mall Gazette prints a very warlike article, from an anonymous contributor. That the French Government is preparing for war there is no longer any doubt, says this alarmist. From every barrack around Paris that boasts a range comes the sound of rifle practice. It must be some urgent cause that leads the usually parsimonious Ministry of War to this waste of store ammunition. It hardly needed the plain declaration of the Journal des Debats the other day, that while France sought war with no one, she is determined to be ready for coming events, to convince us that these preparations are neither made to impress the electorate nor to increase her weight in the councils of Europe. Unfortunately France is one of the European powers of whom it can be truthfully said it is more likely to act when not in its senses than when it is. While the present Government is in power there is indeed no danger, but let the army, which it even now has great difficulty in restraining, make common cause with the "petite

bourgeoise"—maddened as it will be by the failure of the Exposition—and proletariat, whose increasing unrest is beginning to be shown by the strikes, and we may have our hands full before the army returns from South Africa.

Replying to the anonymous contributor of the Pall Mall Gazette the Paris correspondent of that journal says he believes no serious evidence can be brought forward to favour the contention that France is preparing to attack England.

On the other hand, he says, it is quite undeniable that France is making efforts not to be unprepared in the event of war with England. English apprehensions of French aggression have had an exact counterpart on this side of the channel. It is obvious the hour is a critical one, for French and English interests may easily come into conflict.

'Spectator,' discussing the frailty of the ties connecting the powers, says: 'Continental statesmen look askance at the new force of America, whose limits they do not clearly discern, and which, for example, can send black troops to China, and they mutter words about the possible Anglo-Saxon understanding, and would, if they could, gladly postpone all action, so as to have more time for reflection and combination; only, you see, Pekin is in flames, the Chinese Semiramis is on her way to Sigan, and a Russian general publicly reports that the Amur now flows through Russian territory. Japan has been helping Europe, but English observers are uncertain what her statesmen intend.'
