

V. McDaniel Hurls 1 Hitter As Cards Win Twin Bill

Von McDaniel, brilliant St. Louis teen-ager, pitched a one-hit shut-out and Joe Cunningham slammed a game-winning home run Sunday as the Cardinals swept a double-header from Pittsburgh and drew within a half game of first place in the National League.

In the American League, New York Yankees and Detroit Tigers played for seven hours and 25 minutes at Yankee Stadium and settled for a split, the Yanks winning the second 4-3 in 15 innings after losing the first, 6-5. It left the Yanks' AL lead at 3½ games over runner-up Chicago, which edged Baltimore 4-3.

Gene Bakert's second inning double was the only hit — and Baker the only base-runner — the Pirates could manage off McDaniel in St. Louis' 4-0 first game victory. Cunningham's 11th-inning homer won the nightcap, 9-8 and meant a full game pickup by the Cards on league-leading Milwaukee, which defeated New York 5-3 after losing to the Giants, 2-0.

In other NL games, Brooklyn's defeat of Cincinnati 7-2 to move within 1½ games of the lead and Philadelphia swept Chicago Cubs, 3-2

and 7-1, to pull into a fourth place tie with Cincinnati, each 2½ games behind.

BOSTON WINS
Bouncing off the American's Sunday program, Boston turned up two four-run rallies to beat Cleveland, 9-8 and Kansas City won twice from Washington, 6-2 and 3-2 in 11 innings.

McDaniel, 18-year-old bonus beauty winning his fifth against two defeats, retired the first five batters and the last 22 he faced in his spectacular performance. Baker's hit was a liner that fell four and permitted only eight balls about four feet. Von Struck out to be hit out of the infield.

The Cards, trailing 8-5, scored three ninth-inning runs to tie the second game, then won it on Cunningham's homer off loser Ron Kline's first pitch in the 11th. Hoyt Wilhelm picked up his first victory in relief.

Johnny Antonelli scattered six hits in his last, his ex-teammates for the fourth time in the Giants-Braves opener but Gene Conley gained Milwaukee a split with a six-hitter in the second game.

Willie Mays had a big day with six hits in eight trips, including a home run.

GRAND SLAM
Carl Furillo's grand slam homer, eighth of his career, was enough for Johnny Podres to win his ninth for Brooklyn. Brooks Lawrence gave up the Furillo slam and took his seventh loss in 18 decisions.

Curt Simmons won his 10th and Jack Sanford his 14th in the Phils' sweep. Granny Hamner produced clutch hits in both games and Ed Bouchee wrapped up the nightcap for Sanford with a three-run homer.

Left-hander Billy Hoef went all the way for an unfortunate loss in the second game at Yankee Stadium. The Detroit star worked 14 1-3 innings, tying Pittsburgh's Vern Law for the longest stint of the season. But he lost his sixth in nine decisions when Mickey Mantle walked and scored on Bill Skowron's triple in the 15th. Bob Grim (10-3) won in relief for the second time in two days. Lou Slaughter's no-hit relief for 2 1-3 innings saved the opener for Paul Foytack (12-9) with Frank Bolling's 13th homer the decisive

blow.

TWO RUNS
Larry Doby drove in two runs to help Bill Fischer win his fourth in relief for the White Sox, despite homers by the Orioles' Joe Durham and Gus Triandos. The Sox' Jim Landis tied a major league record by striking out five straight times. Doby was the last to do it, fanning five times in as many tries while with Cleveland in 1948.

Ted Williams, hiking his league-leading batting mark to .376, slammed his 29th home run, a double and two singles to pace the Red Sox over the Indians. Rocky Colavito and Vic Wertz produced all Cleveland runs. Wertz hammered in five for a season total of 69 with two homers and a single and Colavito delivering three with two homers. George Susce won over Don Mossi, both in relief.

Ilex Kellner pitched a five-hitter and hit a home run in the A's first game victory which cost Washington's Chuck Stobbs his 14th loss. Hal Smith's single scored Hec Lopez with the 11th-inning run that won the second for Wally Burnette over Bud Byerly.
