Churchill Says U. K. Can't Hit Defence Target

Would Enlarge Seaway Authority To Develop Non-Central Regions

OTTAWA, Dec. 6 (CP)—Opposition members proposed in the Commons today that the scope of the government's intended St. Lawrence Seaway "authority" be expanded to enable it to develop resources in Canada's non-central regions.

They urged that the new "authority" — which the government seeks to have parliament create for building and operating the seaway — give special attention, in the expanded form, to seeing that the big power-navigation project on the inland waterway system does not injure other parts of the country.

Seeks To Break Arms Deadlock

PARIS, Dec. 6 (CP)—Luis Padilla Nervo, president of the United Nations Assembly, indicated tonight he will attempt to break the East-West disarmament impasse by private talks with Soviet and Western representatives.

The four powers — Britain, France, the United States and Russia — completed closed disarmament talks today without making progress on major points of difference over arms reduction, proposed banning of the atomic bomb and methods of inspection to insure that disarmament is carried out.

Inquiry Into Cadets Deaths

GILLINGHAM, England, Dec. 6 (Reuters)—Bus driver George Samson, 57, sat weeping in a hospital room today as the parents of 23 boys killed by his bus Tuesday night gave evidence at an inquiry into the deaths.

He twisted his cap in his hands nervously as the parents quietly gave evidence as to identification of their children's bodies.

EDMONTON, Dec. 6 (CP)—Oil riches began at 80 for W.B.C. Chamberlain, an Edmonton district farmer.

A major oil find on his land two miles east of the city was announced today. It will bring financial security to the oil-rich farmer and his 74-year-old wife.

The police and Nationalist side won the battle. At least five persons were killed and more than 200 injured.

Discuss Sunday Closing At Trade Board Meeting

At the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last night it was on motion decided that the board recommend to the Town Council the enforcement of the by-law regarding Sunday closing of stores.

It was brought to the attention of the meeting by Mr. Ross MacKenzie of the Retail Merchants' Committee that there appears to be a steady growth of the practice of Sunday openings by grocery stores and even extending to clothing stores. The recommendation was to the effect that the Town Council instruct the police to enforce the Sunday closing of such places of business except those classified in the by-law as selling necessary articles which are in the nature of a service to the public.

1951 Proved Biggest Tourist Year For PEI

This year has been the most successful year for tourists in the history of the Province with larger numbers of visitors from the United States and other Canadian Provinces than ever before.

Some figures released by the Travel Bureau shows that in a majority of instances the total for the first 11 months of 1951 are greater than for the entire year of 1950. The car ferries Abegweit and Prince Edward Island brought 113,719 passengers to the Island from Cape Tormentine this year to date compared to 110,193 for the full 12 months of last year. The ferries also carried 37,685 cars to this year compared to the 32,915 for the full year of 1950.
