**The Milk In the Coconut.**  
 Every boy knows the three eyes to be found in one end of a coconut, and many a boy has bored these eyes out, or one or two of them, with the small blade of a pocketknife so as to get at the milk in the coconut, which he has then drained out into a cup or drunk direct from the coconut itself. But there is a more fascinating way still of getting at the milk in the coconut.  
 By this other method the coconut is opened at the other end from the eyes. The coconut is struck all around gently and repeatedly with a hammer, or a stone will do, at a distance of about one-third of the way down from the top, about where the arctic circle would be on a globe.  
 A continual gentle tapping will finally crack the shell of the nut all around; not in a line exactly on the circle perhaps, but pretty near to it. Sometimes it cracks shell and meat of the nut, too, so that both can be lifted off together; sometimes it cracks out only a shell cap at the top, which is lifted off, and the cap of meat underneath is then cut out around with a knife.  
 And then there you are with the white lined coconut cup to drink from.
